FRIENDLY...He/[She] operates slowly and patiently when requested; offers friendly advice and counsel to beginners; kind assistance, cooperation and consideration for the interests of others. These are the marks of the amateur spirit.

BALANCED...Radio is a hobby, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school or community.

PATRIOTIC...His/[Her] station and skills are always ready for service to country and community.

Over the past month (more so than usual) I have heard stories of new licensees being criticized and bullied on the air about their radios, knowledge, or operating habits. If the hobby is to survive and continue to honor it's roots, we as experienced Amateur Operators should be setting an example. The Amateur's Code above is something that we should all strive toward. Yes, we all have moments where we do things in error, but this code is something that should always be in the back of one's mind when dealing with new hams. Amateur Radio is not dead. Anyone who has been paying attention to the numbers can tell you, that there has been an influx of people getting into the hobby. Whether it be because of a desire or interest in emergency communications or just the attraction of tinkering that has developed with the "Maker" community, there are new hams nation wide that need the guidance of experience. All too often a new ham who is self taught or migrating to our hobby from another radio service, is simply not treated with the Amateur's Code in mind. The resulting effect on our hobby? We are turning away the future members who will help Amateur Radio live on. If we walked into a restaurant and were treated the way some new hams get treated, I can assure you, most of us would walk out and simply write the establishment off. This is certainly not a behavior that anyone interested in the proliferation of the hobby wants to see. Instead, I encourage all of us to temper that first reaction and contemplate what would benefit the hobby most before returning to a new ham. Other radio services? Think of them as "gateway drugs" to the best radio service one can get involved in. Encourage people to learn and pass the Amateur Radio exam. There are 959 active licensees in Berks County. How many of those licensees have been turned away unintentionally? What's the old saying..."You can catch more flies with honey than vinegar."

Reading Radio Club 2021 Hamfest

The Reading Radio Club held its 2021 Hamfest on Saturday, August 7 at Heritage Park in Sinking Spring. The Hamfest really started months before when planning began and RRC members stepped forward to take on various responsibilities.

By the time the Friday prior to the event arrived, a schedule of duties was devised and members were ready to execute the plan of action. The Friday crew (see below)

met at Heritage Park on Friday at 9:30 a.m. to prepare the site for parking, cleaning the area, especially the kitchen and restrooms, and distributing direction signs on major roadways leading to the event.

We decided not to use wooden stakes to hold the yellow caution tape that delineated the rows for parking. Instead, fiberglass poles that are less than one inch in diameter were used. This made the tedious job of driving wooden stakes into the ground obsolete. The use of the fiberglass poles that went into the ground really easily was a great time and labor-saver.

Saturday began very early. Although the event opens for vendors at seven a.m. and for buyers at eight a.m., people were at the park at 6:05 a.m. when I arrived. Surprisingly, this is a trend. Every year, people arrive earlier than the previous year. This must show how eager they are to attend the RRC Hamfest!

A Lebanon-based vendor, Souder Electronics, set up at their location adjacent to the train station building that we do not use. Across from them was Gene Niemiec, K2JKI and KJI Electronics, from Cedar Grove, New Jersey, another vendor who attends each year. Another vendor, Craig Buck, K4IA, from Virginia, mailed us door prizes to be given away at intervals during the morning. Craig sells a neat line of Ham Radio license exam and how-to books that are easy to read. Souder Electronics and KJI Electronics gave us door prizes as well.

Visiting us also was the American Radio Relay League Eastern Pennsylvania Director, George W. Miller, W3GWM. George and his XYL were positioned in the freight station and greeted hams entering the station on their way to dropping their door prize ticket stubs into a container. George brought along various ARRL books to give out as door prizes and included \$150 in ARRL gift certificates.

Thank you to these generous people for traveling to our hamfest and also for supplying us with door prizes! The RRC made some hams happy as well. Four Beofeng UV5R 2-meter/440 handhelds were handed out as door prizes as well as LED flashlights.

VE exams were administered by Harry Hoffman, W3VBY and his VE Team, starting at a bit before 8:30 a.m. By this time, it was evident that Dave Wiley, K3MXS and the gate and parking crew literally had their hands full as the parking area began to fill up with vehicles. Inside the freight station, Rich Ahrens, W3WJC was busy greeting hams and directing them to the ticket stub container. He was selling RRC baseball caps and shirts, as well as hamfest carry bags with the RRC logo on the side. The carry bags were donated to the RRC by Rick Rhoads, W3ALG.

The RRC Café workers (Mary Anne Nicholas, N3TVT, Alex Nicholas, Vickie Peiffer, Mike Peiffer and Janine Galiyano, K4AJZ) were busy selling breakfast items and coffee and later, lunch items, sodas and ice cream. The hot dogs with sauer kraut (optional) and other toppings and Jimmy Dean breakfast sandwiches were a hit. A big thank you goes out to the Scheirer Family, who donated most of the food items to the RRC. Very nice!

At the front table were the two cashiers and order-takers, Lori Scheirer and Jessica Landis, KC3PIG. On the side porch, Ron Waszk, K3RJW and Craig Wanner, W3CRG were handling the talk-in duties on the Reading Radio Club's own W3BN,

146.91/.31, tone 131.8 repeater. John Engle, AB3SR, provided the public address system.

It was fun to see all of the buying and selling taking place. In recent years, many clubs have decided to not hold hamfests, which makes the RRC Hamfest that much more desirable. Interestingly, many of the hams from outside of the area are repeat attendees who have come to our hamfest many times. Some are always looking for the same items, like tubes, boat anchor receivers or whatever. The ham who traveled the farthest was from the sunny state of Florida, Steve Carey, KD4SPC. Over 230 people attended, making this a record RRC event.

We enjoyed the nice weather which was in the 80s but very comfortable. The morning flew by and in no time at all it was noontime and things were beginning to wrap up. The VE Team finished testing, with 9 candidates out of 10 passing their tests. Two passed the Technician test and seven passed the General test.

Stuart Higgins, W2SLH and son Cameron Higgins, W2CMH, removed all of the fiberglass parking poles (about 60 in number) and took down all of the yellow parking

caution tape (too many yards to count). Trash and recycle bottles and cans were removed from the site by Harry Hoffman, W3VBY. Kitchen, restrooms and the interior of the train station were cleaned. The outside areas were also cleaned up. Highway signs were collected from area roadsides.

I'd like to speak for Harry Hoffman, W3VBY, Scott Scheirer, KC3PCS, and Dave Wiley, K3MXS and thank all the RRC members and guests who attended. We had a great time. As you may know, our hamfest is getting to be known as "The Friendly Hamfest". See you there next year!

RRC MEETING ON THE AIR (RRCMOTA)

Check into the **RRC MEETING ON THE AIR** on the Friday evenings that we do not have an in-person meeting. The net, on 146.910 MHz, starts at 8:00 p.m. with the latest AMATEUR RADIO NEWSLINE REPORT from the West Coast.

We then have an exchange of information that may be of interest to the members of the Reading Radio Club as well as those that are not RRC members.

The last part of the net is a roll call where we usually have 13 to 56 stations check-in and test their two-meter FM analog equipment. The roll call is last, so that late comers are not missed.

NOTE: The **C**ontinuous **T**one **C**oded **S**quelch **S**ystem, (CTCSS) frequency is 131.8 Hertz (3B). The CTCSS is often referred to as "PL" (Motorola's trade name).

The net has been in operation since Friday January 21, 1994, when we had 13 check-ins during that first session, over 27 years ago.

On Friday August 27, 2021, we had session number 1170. Rich Ahrens, W3WJC, was the Net Control.

The next RRCMOTA will be on Friday September 3, 2021, starting at 8:00 p.m., on the Reading Radio Club's 146.910 MHz, W3BN analog repeater. Art Becker, KB3LDI, will be the Net Control for session number 1171.
