June 26th at 6:00am on site at the west most parking structure, people started to gather, at least Ray KI6QME did early, excited and ready---to---go! Without Rays help, Don and myself would have been in trouble.

We started erecting antennas, a new method used this year pretty neat and SAFE thanks to Don, WG6H & Ted , KE6EIT – show up at a meeting and hear more!

We finished setup @ 11:00 and started racking up QSO's. Not long after the Hospital went dark! No power! They knew we were up and running on generator just across they parking lot, and ready to help if they needed us.

Later in the afternoon Susan, Hospitals' emergency services coordinator (our go between), stopped by letting us know all was AOK at NHMC.

When asked in May and early June Those wanting to operate on the SSB side was low, however on the CW side there was an abundance so we setup in advance 2 CW stations focused on 40 meters 20 meters. Then the SSB had antennas (2) for 10 thru 75 meters.

One of the CW stations used our Hustler 4BTV (4 band trapped vertical) for 10,15,20 and 40 the second CW station used the Cushcraft A3S/ with Rotatable dipole on 40. One feeding a TS870S the other CW Station was our newly donated TS430S (from Mark N6GMG). Word from a few I spoke to was

Then on the SSB station where we had an A3s 10--20 meter beam and my W9INN 10 – 75 meter, I know the 75 was working well when we switched to it about 11pm, Ginger AB6YL as ops and it was like she was at a carnival at one of those shooting galleries, just knocking down one duck after another.

Over on the UHF/VHF side, Marv K6HCJ graciously let us test out his new 5---element 6---meter beam, which worked very well. We had a 2---meter wheel from W6IST along with a 4 element 2 meter from K6AWB. When 6 opened up it was HOT!! Many folks were on this station, many under the guidance of Clara, KJ6CNO.

Allan, W6IST again setup his demo station, THE ATV.. Was again an outstanding success! Thanks Allan!

Thanks to Ray, KI6QME we send out 12 Radiograms thru the National Traffic System, one of which was to the Section Manager David, N6HD 200 points for those 12! Thanks Ray!

Johnnie, W6HTY running our Satellite station, (Demo and educational stop) had about a 14+ hours of a manned satellite Q & A station. Many sat down and learned the ins and outs of the station setup, software used became familiar with AMSAT.

All of this was a hands on training and many satellites were heard buy the students. I must say through his perseverance sitting at the SAT Station for 14+ hours gave many folks the opportunity to pick Johnnies brain as to AMSAT, general ops, equipment needed, etc. That in it was a major success, Hats off to Johnnie W6HTY!

Now over to the GOTA station, here we had a little trouble, we were missing a piece from the R7, so that antenna was out. We managed to pull a 20---meter dipole out of someone's bag and improvised, the dipole was very low and other stations on 20 (CW & Phone) which made it difficult BUT not impossible, we achieved QSO's, not as anticipated but we did get some. This station was running under Jims callsign, KJ6CNK.

In my opinion, The number one enhancement was thanks to Pat. KG6GCZ and Jack, KG6GCI, we again, had a working network, so we could all see who was doing what, and more importantly how we were doing as a whole. (Continued next page)
