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## Memories of Ray Solis, KI6QME/SK

The world lost a really good man Monday night, lives were much the better for having known him! August 6, 2012. My friend, Ray Solis, lost his battle with heart disease while waiting for a heart I hope that everyone who reads this and everyone

I met Ray through Amateur Radio and Emergency Preparedness. He was one of those rare people with whom you instantly feel a kinship. Ray had a smile you'd never forget and that smile was seemingly always there. Despite daunting medical problems, not the least of which was a heart that was failing so badly he was near the top of the transplant list, Ray always had a smile and a positive attitude.

You could even "hear" the smile when you talked to Ray on the radio. Ray was a dedicated amateur radio operator who was active with various organizations including The San Fernando Valley Amateur Radio Club and Amateur Radio Emergency Service. Ray would check in to the Lake Balboa Emergency Preparedness Net (sort of a meeting over amateur radio) most Sunday mornings. We never knew where Ray would be operating from, except it was almost guaranteed it would be far from the beaten path. You see, Ray liked to hike and run in the mountains. On Sunday mornings, Ray was up hours before the sun was. He'd pack 40+ pounds of ham radio equipment in his backpack and be off to explore the Angeles National Forest. Just before 9:00 AM he'd stop and set-up antennas and connect his radio and be ready to call in to our net. When I called for check-ins, I'd hear something like "KI6QME from 4000-feet above Sylmar."

Ray loved to experiment with different radios and antennas. That experimentation paid off big time a couple of years ago at the Angeles Crest 100, a grueling 100-mile running race through the mountains of the Angeles National Forest. Ray could easily have run the race, but instead he chose to volunteer his radio skills to keep the runners safe. When a female runner failed to check-in at her next check-point, Ray and others started searching. Ray applied his knowlege of the mountains and his radio skills and was able to locate the woman, who had become disoriented and lost her way. Ray was able to set-up his radio and call for timely aid for her. When Ray was praised for his actions, he shrugged off the attention with his usual smile and humble

I learned a lot from Ray, although he never intended to teach me anything. Ray taught by example. Despite overwhelming medical issues, Ray only talked about the good things in his life, his volunteer work, his hobbies, his friends, and mostly his family. Ray also spoke of his work at Cal State Northridge. He talked of the students and how he loved the interaction with them. I think they energized him, because Ray always seemed to have an abundance of energy. I heard that during a recent extended hospitalization, Ray, despite being really sick, insisted on walking the halls and greeting other patients. Of course, he had to have a nurse accompany him, and, I'm told, more than one nurse couldn't keep up with him.

I only knew Ray for about three years. In that time, though, he made a greater impression on me than have others I have known for much longer. Ray was a religious man, and although I'm not, I know that his faith and that of his family, carried him through his incredible battle and will carry his family as they try to move forward following this huge loss. I will truly miss Ray as will many, many others whose

who knew Ray, will make sure they sign their donor cards so that the next "Ray" won't have to lose their battle. In California, you can register as a donor at Donate Life.

The traditional closing salutation in amateur radio is "73." So I'll close with this one last time, KI6QME, 73, KI6YOW clear.

Emergency Preparedness, Amateur Radio, and so very many of us, lost a dear, dear friend this week. Ray Solis was waiting for a heart transplant that didn't come through in time. Ray was part of our Lake Balboa EP Committee, and of our Sunday Morning Lake Balboa EP Amateur Radio Net, and filled in as Net Control just two weeks ago. Dan Tomlinson has written a lovely tribute to Ray, and it is on his website at www.KI6YOW.com. I hope you'll all take a few minutes to read it.

I'd like to add a personal note. Ray (together with Bill North), rescued me during a thunderstorm at Stoney Point in the north end of the San Fernando Valley after an EP class where we had been out locating and rescuing a mock 'victim', (manikin), in the deep brush, diagnosing his medical problems and treating him on site. But I turned out to be the true victim - got a severe charlie horse in a thigh muscle, and had to be almost carried back to the car in the pouring rain. If it hadn't been for Ray and Bill, I'd have been hours getting back, I'm sure!

Also, Ray was the kind of guy who, even though he wasn't part of our Neighborhood Council, nor part of an upcoming CERT class, showed up at 5:30 in the morning to help Rick Pederson and me set up 150 chairs for that CERT training, and then stayed around to help with refreshments and registration. And, he showed up on Sunday morning at 6:30 to see if we needed any more help!

As Dan said earlier, Ray had such a positive spirit, I think we all believed he'd make it through for the transplant. His energy and spirit were boundless! He was one of the kindest people I have ever known, and we will miss him terribly.

It is with tears flowing that I write this.

I first met Ray at a CSUN preparedness event when he visited our ARES booth and expressed a strong interest in Amateur Radio. I was immediately taken by his enthusiasm and warmth, characteristics that we would come to know as his hallmarks. He got a license manual and signed up for the next available Technician class. I canned him several months later when I was planning a course at Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital. Despite the distance, he jumped at the chance to participate, and when he showed up on the first day of class with his license manual looking as though a truck had run over it, I know he had been devouring the material. Sure enough, on exam day he was the first to hand in his test and, naturally, he had aced it.

Soon thereafter, we started seeing Ray everywhere ARES meetings, exercises, event support and upgrade classes. He quickly progressed to General and then to Extra. The story has been told many times about his going to find a lost runner during the Angeles Crest 100, a grueling race that he himself had completed twice in the 1990's. What you may not have heard was that Ray joined a weekly VHF simplex net each Sunday morning, checking in from one or another spot in the mountains where he hiked and ran. In true Ham fashion, Ray experimented with different antennas, radios and power levels during his morning excursions to find out what worked best under what conditions.

When the need for a heart transplant became apparent, Ray never looked for sympathy; in fact, on breaking the news to his ARES friends, he was the cheeriest person in the room. It is rare to find someone who invariably sees his glass has half full, even when only a few drops lie in the bottom of it. He took joy in the support of his family and friends and found the good side of life everywhere he looked. It was a great privilege for me to get to know Ray and to call him a friend and fellow Ham I will - and we all will - miss him dearly.

Ray Solis, KI6QME, was an amazing and truly unforgettable human being. He so exuded positivism and cheerfulness, one wondered if he was for real. The more I got to know him, there was no doubt in my mind that he was the real deal! Just imagine being as physically fit as he was, constantly running up into Angeles Crest (often performing net control duties on the Monday night ARES net from some 4000 foot mountain top), and then being hospitalized with heart problems, and being told he had to have a heart transplant. He remained upbeat and positive and even checked in to the net from the hospital, and later at home.

It was my great pleasure to have known him. Ray was an example to us all.

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## Uses and Capabilities of Amateur Radio Service Communications in Emergencies and Disaster Relief CONCLUSION

The amateur radio community and the emergency response and disaster communications communities all agree that amateur radio can be of great value in emergency response situations. Amateur radio carries with it a wide range of advantages that allow it to supplement other emergency communications activities during disasters. This has been demonstrated time and again in a wide variety of emergency and disaster situations. Amateur radio emergency communications require not only stations in a position to originate the emergency message, but also an alternative to the commercial communications infrastructure impacted by the emergency. This alternative infrastructure is the network of amateur radio operators and their stations that relay messages, build and maintain repeater stations and repeater networks, operate HF message networks to send messages greater distances than are practical with mobile or transportable transmitters, and develop new technologies to improve the reliability of these networks.
