The August presentation will be by Jim Stitzinger, WA3CEX. His talk will be on the "Rockwell Collins HF-80 Amateur Station" one of the finest pieces of equipment ever built for Amateur radio. A picture of Jim and the HF-80 radio, rack-mounted, is attached.




The July presentation was **Burt Weiner (K6OQK)** with the history of the WA6TDD and K6MYK repeaters in Southern California. Art Gentry, W6MEP built the first truly automatic repeater, K6MYK, which operated from Mt. Lee (above the Hollywood sign) beginning back in the late 50's. Burt followed this repeater with the installation of WA6TDD on Mt. Wilson, back in the very early 60's.

Burt has been involved in Amateur Radio since the early fifty's while in Jr. High School. He built and maintained the WA6TDD /WR6ABE repeater on Mt. Wilson, which went on the air in 1962. His professional background is in broadcast engineering, antenna systems and measurement systems design.

SOTA

I would like to share with you my adventures with my new SOTA hobby! First, what is SOTA ? It stands for Summits on the Air. It begins with a ham activator who sets up a ham station on a specially designated peak. The activator then has a QSO with a ham chaser who is located at their shack using hf, vhf or uhf, using any mode except for repeaters.

It was started by John Linford, G3WGV on March 2, 2002. SOTA has spread all over the world and is big in Europe. It is also growing fast in this country. And there are lots of fine looking awards and accessory trinkets.



Since I love to hike and participate in contests, I was attracted to

SOTA because it was a way of putting the two together. The summits can be reached by any one as long as you activate the summits by human power for the last 100 feet. You can drive to many of the summits.

So, how has it been going on my treks? So far, I have made 59 chaser points sitting at home in the shack, and 9 activator points from reaching summits and setting up a radio station and making at least 4 QSO's on each peak. The total points are calculated based on the elevation of the summit and the number of QSOs.

My second summit was to Mt. Pinos, near Frazier Park. After driving up to a parking lot at Mt Pinos, I hiked to the summit carrying an hf transceiver, portable chair, fiberglass pushup pole, 20 meter dipole, 17 meter dipole, 40 meter dipole, rg58 coax, lithium iron phosphate battery, paper, Ipad to find the summit location, pens, rope, cardboard to set on my lap as a table for the rig and paper, battery cable for my rig, headphones, adapter, a tarp for the ground, and water and lunch.

So how did it all go? Well, first I broke the top part of my pole. So instead of the dipole apex being 16 feet up, it was 10 feet up. Then, I noticed my homebrew power cable had severed the positive connection on the power pole. So my hope for 10 watts became 5 watts. Luckily, my radio has built in batteries! Did I mention it was windy up there; well my paper log went flying around.

Then there was another problem! When I tried to send a dash my key was occasionally sending dots. Despite all this, I made 5 contacts and I only needed 4 to claim a summit.

All in all, I had a great time making my contacts, and in addition the hike was beautiful and the view was spectacular. If this mini contest/field day sounds fun to you, all you have to do is:

1. Go to http://www.sota.org.uk/ to get familiar with the program.

2. Register for an account for your logs at: <u>http://www.sotadata.org.uk/register.aspx</u> (section is w6)

3. Find out who is on a summit at: <u>http://www.sotawatch.org/</u> and click "more spots."

4. For more help, there is a SOTA talk group at: <u>http://groups.yahoo.com/group/nasota/files/</u>

Or just listen at 14.062 +/- cw and maybe 14.3425 ssb. The best time to listen is during daylight hours.
