CONVENTION REPORT: All too soon the present becomes history and so it was with the 1973 ARMS Convention at Western Bible Institute near Morrison, Colorado. But still fond memories remain within the minds of those who were able to attend.

The convention activities began with the setting. up of radio station WA申ZON/ under the leadership of Roland Brunsma Some mobiles were talked into the convention site, however the channel was switched inadvertently and Jay KøGAZ was left on a hilltop calling for help without being heard. P.S. He finally made it on his own. The registration table was manned by Ed WBldAKV. Fortunately there was plenty of room so that with a little reshuffling everyone had a bed for himself. The final count was 20 hams, 13 XYL's, 6 others and an ad. ditional 7 for the banquet.

Chuck WøETA, Convention Chairman, opened the evening meeting. He introduced Mr. Art Lowther, Business Manager of Western Bible Institute who gave a word of welcome to the convention and told of the founding and development of the school.

Next Jack Huey KøUED, Chairman of the Rocky Mountain Section, welcamed the convention. We might add here, that though the gasoline situation was not plentiful, it was available for those who needed it.

Chuck WøETA then introduced Mr. Gary Herr, manager of Radio Station KWBI who showed a slide presentation with tape narration of the building, operation, and ministry of Station KWBI (FM).

Another good slide presentation was givenby Warren Palmer W9LPW depicting the Missionary Tech Course offered by the Moody Bible Institute in the fields of radio and aviation.

Saturday morning while the XYL's met for a time of Bible Study and fellowship, the Hams settled down to business. Chuck WøETA, a man with many hats, acted as president pro tem in the absence of both the president and the vice-president. In brief some of the business items were--

Treasurer Gene Iliff WøJAQ reported on the income and expenditures during the past year. He reported a balance. of $\$ 343.49$ as of $7 / 24 / 73$.

K2CAC A1 Smith was asked to determine the status of the equipment and call of K3CBM which at last report was still licensed as the ARMS station under the trusteeship of K3JRD George Jackamonis.

A list of some 70 names of former members of ARMS who have not been heard from since before 1970 were reviewed to determine if anyone knew of their whereabouts or any reason why they should not be dropped from the mailing list and directory listing. Nine of the names were retained.

There was discussion of how to handle the application of Club Stations interested in membership in ARMS. It was decided to continue as we have during the past year by asking the club station trustee to sign the application and subscribe to the doctrinal statement.

The secretary (WøETA wearing another hat) reported on the status of the assignment made at the 1971 meeting concerning the sorting and filing of archives and secretarial materials. The task has been completed to the extent that all materials on hand have been filed. This does not mean that the files are complete, but at this point, additional information and memorabilia must come from interested persons with something to contribute.

K2CAC A1 Smith was appointed to pick up the activity of writing a brochure that will tell the ARMS story and can be used to acquaint interested people, both amateurs and nonamateurs, with the objectives and activities of ARMS.

WøEYL G1en Peterson was appointed chairman of a committee to review the Constitution and By-Laws of the organization. He is to select a committee and the committee is to report with recommendations in time that announcement of the recommendations can be made in the BEAM so action can be taken at the 1974 convention.

The Mid-Atlantic Section relayed word through K2CAC A1 that they would like to host the 1974 Convention. The invitation was accepted.

The meeting then moved to the school library. While waiting for the kitchen crew to finish their work, an impromptu session of sharing how ham stations have been used to help others developed. It was hard to stop this part of the meeting as one interesting story after another was related. A halt was called and Chuck introduced Edward Andrews WBØAKV, Wycliffe Bible Translators, as the speaker of the evening. Ed showed how a Bible Translator working with an unwritten language begins by identifying the sounds used in the language and then by using prescribed procedures is able to organize these sounds into an alphabet. Next the grammar of the language is analyzed and the audience helped Ed determine how to form the plural of nouns in the Paiute Indian language. Then on into translation of Scriptures where many sorts of problems arise and must be overcome. The goal is to produce a translation that is understandable in the language in which it is written.

Sunday found the group gathered in the morning sun on the lawn of WBI for a Bible discussion time under the impromptu leadership of K2CAC Al Smith. Following this many of the group joined a local congregation meeting in one of the class rooms for a worship service. (The regular chapel was in the midst of a renovation project.)

The crowning cap-stone of the convention was a picnic at the home of Chuck and Timmy Brockmeyer. Chuck led a caravan from WBI to his QTH. In a short time he barbecued a stack of hamburgers. FAR EAST BROADCASTING COMPANY -- Cheju, Korea June 30, 1973 Radio station HLDA is dedicated to beam the gospel of Christ to Asia! The dedication services on Cheju Island were a culmination of two years of work and prayer and a monument to the cooperation and sacrifice of many people who have transformed an empty strip of beach property into a radio station. In addition to FEBC engineers from other areas, four men volunteered to pay their own expenses, leave their families in America, and go to Cheju to help install the 250,000 watt transmitter. One of the volunteers discovered that he was the only person who could read the instructions which came with the Swiss-built transmitter, written in German!

TRANS WORLD RADIO -- Passengers on a morning bus transporting workers to factories and businesses were introduced to the daily German broadcasts of Trans World Radio by their driver. Reactions at first to the programs were not favorable. The driver, however, persisted. Each morning the radio was there, tuned to the TWR German programs. One morning, though, he forgot. Soon his passengers reminded him they were missing their regular program. The bus driver's intraduction had created a regular listening habit for his passengers each morning.

In the celebration plans are radio workshops and evangelistic tours of the country. We are feeling the need for more workers more desperately with each passing week. This Saturday we are having our first combined youth meeting. From this group, we pray will come national workers to reinforce and extend the efforts of those already serving.

C1aude Beachy W9BNI with the ORIENTAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY reports from Radio 4VEH, Haiti. Since last June I have been responsible as manager of Radio 4VEH. Obviously that entails considerable responsibility including at present, that of total administrative responsibility for the technical aspects also. The Lord has given us a fine national staff of about 25, in addition to the ten missionaries who are in one way or other involved with the station ministry. Radio 4VEH is one of several ministries here a medical work, a vocational Bible national church.

Just a word about our programming, we currently program about 200 hours a week in French, Creole, English and Spanish, beaming approximately 24.5 million persons in the Carribean of which 19.2 million are in Cuba, Haiti and Dominican Republic. We currently have two 10 KW transmitters on the broadcast band and three short wave transmitters giving us about 27 KW total power.

On the technical side, one of our recent challenges has been the diplexing of the two 10 KW transmitters, one at 830 kHz . and the other at 1035 kHz ., on one 280 ft . tower. The filters were made using about $\$ 900$ worth of glass capacitors and hand winding the coils with copper tubing. They are located at the base of the antenna and the two feedlines parallel each other out to the antenna. The result, you can lay your hand on the feed line at the transmitter without any burn when the other transmitter, 205 kHz . off frequency is putting 12 KW into the antenna!

In addition to physical strains are the spiritual pressures that come when one lives out at the 'battlefront'. Haiti is a country of voodoo and superstition. Over and over one becomes aware of the conflict between good and evil. While the Lord has given us a fine national staff (which is completely in charge of the 16 hrs. per day French and Creole broadcasting) the devil is always ready to create problems in interpersonal relationships or in involving some staff member in sin which leaves him powerless and uncapable of spiritual ministry. We appreciate your prayers in all these areas.

JAARS GETS A HAND FROM ARMS -- On Saturday, September 8, 1973 at West Chester Airport in Pennsylvania, JAARS held an event which they called "Missions At The Airport". The program featured rides in mission aircraft, demonstration of STOL operations, sky diving, day long contact with mission stations via Amateur Radio, and hourly presentations of a JAARS film in the hangar.

Mr. Bernard May, Executive Director of JAARS, explained that this was an exploratory program and they were seeking the Lord's will as to whether or not this would be an effective way of presenting the work of JAARS to the people. There was no doubt of the Lord's blessing for He provided perfect weather, and over two thousand attended the event. Over half of this number were taken on plane rides around the field with three JAARS planes and three borrowed planes operating continously from 9:00 A.M. until after 6:30 P.M.

A number of ARMS personnel were available to man the Amateur Ra dio Station which used the JAARS Club Call of WA4ZRS/3. Matt McGuigen WB2GTX loaned a three element beam which Bill Sasnett K4DNO erected on Friday with the help of George Jackamonis K3JRD. Contact was maintained throughout the day with Wycliffe bases in Brazil and Ecuador.

All preparations for the event were coordinated by members of the Marcus Hook Baptist Church under the leadership of its pastor, Rev. Randy Carroll.

It was a great day. Even the airport personnel commented on the effectiveness of the program. Our thanks to everyone who helped make it the success that it was and our gratitude for the Lord's blessing. -- D. L. Birx K3RYV
