1978 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

Boone, Iowa was a fun place on July 14th, 15th, and 16th-the 1978 Arms Convention was the reason.

The Iowa ARMS members did a fine job of hosting the convention.

Friday afternoon was spent getting trailers parked, getting registered, and all the other chores associated with getting settled in for a week-end.

After dinner, W9KWJ, Harry Baumgarten, recounted for us many of his experiences on the mission field in Peru. Harry seems to have been the troubleshooter for everything on the compound from stuck doors to the multikilowatt electrical generating system.

Saturday morning the Midwest Section met their regular schedule at 0830 CST on 3.907 mHz.

At 0900 WØMI called the transcontinental net and with the help (??) of the 27 hams at the convention proceeded to acknowledge: W3PWH, WB2SQX, WA3TCE, WAØTCU, WØAPV, W7FQ, WA7MKH/Ø (Walt was set up about 20 feet away from Wayne), KØSIV, WA7AFC, K6GRS, and W3EAN.

After the net, the Business Meeting reconvened and the minutes indicate action taken.

WØMI demonstrated solar powered operation of his station.

In the evening we enjoyed the account given by Miss Lois Crawford of the 50 year history of Radio Station KFGQ, Boone, Iowa-the second oldest Christian Radio Broadcasting Station in the United States. (KMBI, Moody Bible Institute in Chicago is six months older). Miss Crawford received her First Class Radiotelephone License in 1926 and was the first woman to have passed that FCC examination. She was recently inducted into the Hall of Fame of the National Christian Broadcasters. She has written the story of her family and Station KFGQ in a booklet entitled "When God and Papa Ganged Up Against Me, There Was No Hope For Me".

It just so happened that her niece Ruth Crawford Brown had returned on furlough from her mission work in Japan, so she was drafted to give a report also.

Sunday morning, the group met in the Chapel. Don Berggren, KØOAV, led the singing; Dury Miller, KØUBI, led in a very interesting Bible Study / Demonstration; an inspirational testimony time followed.





Four simple words I can't forget-Four words that made me pray.


They turned a mirror on my soul,

Editor's Note: Gene Iliff, $W\emptyset JAQ$, former ARMS Treasurer, received the following letter from Ken Gillon, VK6ZA, and passed it on to me at the convention. Let me share it with you. $W\emptyset ETA$

Dear Gene,

You will be surprised to receive this letter from me after so many years of silence. In fact I have your letter of Feb. 19, 1974 in front of me as I write. But of course it is my fault that I did not keep in touch since leaving Sydney in December 1975. I guess the ARMS newsletters addressed to me at Sydney must have all gone astray, because the postal people in this country are not particularly careful with one's mail after he leaves a place and transfers or goes to another place. They don't bother to forward mail unless you pay them a fee for doing so. Anyway to make a long story short, I applied for a transfer to Radio Australia, Darwin about the middle of 1974 and I was told that my transfer would come through early in 1974, but then cyclone "Tracy" came along and completly flattened the city of Darwin, including the Radio Australia complex, so that was the end of my transfer to Darwin. Then in the middle of 1975 the Government decided to relocate the Darwin transmitters here in Carnarvon, and I applied for one of the Technicians positions, and we (my wife and myself) moved to this place in December 1975. If you look at a map of Australia, you'll find Carnarvon on the west coast about 600 miles north of Perth, the capital of Western Australia. It is just north of the 25th parallel. They call Carnarvon the Sun's Winter Home, and that's about what it is - beautifully warm in the winter with the sky almost always clear with a blue sky. The average rainfall is about 10 inches a year. It is the only place on the Australian coastline where the desert reaches out to the coastline. The nights can be quite cold, sometimes dropping down to 8 degrees Celsius. The town's water supply comes from a river called the Cascoyne which flows under the river bed most of the time and has to be pumped out. When it rains further inland in the catchment area the river then flows above the river bed for a couple of months and then sinks down again. This way there is no evaporation, so we enjoy the sunshine and get our water supply at the same time. Sometimes we don't get a "river", like last year, and then the water supply has to be rationed. This year we got four flows.

Gene, I wonder if you could kindly send me the latest ARMS Directory and BEAM as I have no idea what has been going on since 1974. I hope to get my cubical quad antenna erected on top of a tower some time during this winter (our winter that is) and then I hope to contact some of the other members of ARMS. I couldn't set up an antenna in Sydney because I was always living in high rise apartments and there was just no way of getting an antenna up.
