John and Ida took the lead on Friday morning as we headed for Minneapolis by way of Des Moines. Saturday morning, Dan gave a very interesting and enlightening seminar on "Digital Communications," which was

While the ARMS members were in the business meeting, the spouses were renewing friendships and enjoying their time in Bible study under the leadership of Liana Nordell.

Following lunch many took the tour of Old Fort Snelling while others viewed pictures of previous conferences, talked ham equipment and missions, or just relaxed.

Saturday evening we gathered at Nazareth Hall to eat a delicious chicken dinner. We enjoyed the beautiful tenor voice of David Fryer as he sang, "He Is the Theme of My Song" and "It Is Well with My Soul." His piano accompanist was Northwestern Chancellor, NW0G, Bill Berntsen.

This transmitter may eventually find its way to Saipan where it would become part of the cooperative effort of four well known missionary radio groups: HCJB/World Radio, Far East Broadcasting Company, Transworld Radio, and ELWA. Rocky Mountain Section To Host 1989 Conference

Meeting will be at the Foothills Conference Center a few miles west of Denver, Colorado on June 23, 24 and 25, 1989.

ARMS conferences were held there in 1969 and in 1973 when it was known as Western Bible Institute. The facilities have been expanded and modified during the past three years. Christian TV Channel 41 went on the air this past summer and joins Christian Radio KWBI FM 91.1 with studios on the Foothills Conference Center campus.

In the summer of 1985, Western Bible College joined Rockmont College to form Colorado Christian College. The Rockmont campus was chosen for the site of the new college. Because the Western facility had proved to be ideal for conference activities in the past, it was felt it should continue serving the Christian community as a fully equipped, well staffed conference center.

The ARMS Conference will again fall on the ARRL Field Day weekend. It might be an opportunity for ARMS members who are so inclined to take advantage of the location to make some contacts. Think about it!



known as "The World by 2000." Their goal is to make it possible by the year 2000 for every man, woman and child on earth to hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ in a language they can understand.

Orbra said that HCJB had chosen to use their own staff to design and build the transmitters. Crown International of Elkhart donated space and facilities for HCJB to develop the equipment needed and the HCJB engineering center was established there in 1987.

A new "series switch modulation" scheme has been developed which is much more economical and efficient than presently existing designs.

After breakfast Sunday morning, we gathered in the Robertson Chapel. Don Berggren, K@OAV, led us in singing a number of gospel songs and choruses that were really inspiring. WN@G played for the group singing and insisted that we sing the old songs. (Perhaps that's why I enjoyed it so much.) Dr. Charles Elling, an Egyptologist who has spent a lot of time in the Holy Land, brought some thought-provoking facts in his message from I Samual 17, the Bible account of David and Goliath.

Minutes of the Business Meeting **Amateur Radio Missionary Service** June 25, 1988

Gordon Pearce, VE5HP, Chairman

The meeting, held in one of the classrooms at Northwestern College, was called to order by the Chairman at 11:59 a.m., with approximately 30 ARMS members present. The Chairman, Gordon Pearce, led the group in prayer.

The Chairman, in his opening remarks, expressed our appreciation to the people of Northwestern College for their kind hospitality and helpfulness, and to the members of the convention committee and the Midwest Section.

The members of the convention committee were Don Berggren, KOOAV, and XYL, Barbara; William Bernsten, NW0G; Dan Nordell, WA0LUV, and XYL, Liana; Glen Peterson, W0EYL; Dick Walquist, WD0CYH; and Russ Nelson, NDØB.

The minutes of the 1985 business meeting were read, and the Chairman suggested that his wife, Dorothy, deserves commendation for the faithful help with the 1985 convention. There was a further recommendation from the floor that all of our XYLs that were involved deserve commendation. The minutes of the 1985 convention were then approved with the two suggested changes.

The Treasurer's reports for the 1986, 1987, and 1988 fiscal years were read. There was some discussion from the floor regarding the method of recording the savings account and the interest income. It appears that adequate funds are on hand to meet our forseeable needs.

It was moved and seconded that the Treasurer's reports be approved as read. Motion carried.

The Treasurer reported that 133 ballots were received for the election of officers for the term beginning in 1988. The officers elected were:

Section Reports: It will be noted that some of the Section Directors were unable to be at the convention. In these cases, the reports were made by other individuals.

Canadian Section: Gordon Pearce, VE5HP

Not many members are active at the present time. There was a section picnic last summer at the home of Peter, VE4PP, and Adeline Thiessen.

Central Section: David Hoff, W9GGK

The Central Section is quite active. The net meets each Saturday morning with a good number of members checking in.

Eastern Section: Al Smith, K2CAC

The net meets regularly with several checkins. Net control stations are WA2CYO, WA2OJN, K3RYV, and others. A section picnic is planned for this summer.

Midwest Section: Jay Sudenga, KØGAZ

The net meets weekly on Saturday mornings with an average of 15 checkins. There is a different net control station each week. A section picnic was held at Worthington, MN last summer.

Northwestern Section: Ralph Ohling, WB7OOL

Ralph was not able to attend the convention, but it was stated that the net meets weekly on Thursdays. It was estimated that there are eight to ten checkins.

Rocky Mountain Section: Chuck Brockmeyer, WØETA

The net meets weekly on Saturday with four or five checkins. Chuck also mentioned the Navaho Missionary Group that meets daily in the "Four Corners" area in Southwestern U.S.

South Central Section: George Jackamonis, K3JRD

The net now meets twice weekly with up to five checkins. K3JRD and N5JOG serve as net control stations. They are reaching out to some operators in Mexico. George will be moving soon to a new location that will permit him to have a more efficient antenna.

Southeast Section: Ed Brown, KA4LME.

Harry Campbell, KK4CB, is section director. Ed reported that the net meets weekly on Saturday with several checkins.

Southwest Section: Bill Russell, KA7BRU

Bill was unable to attend the convention. There presently is no net activity in this section.

The following prayer requests were mentioned, and these items should be in our prayers as the Lord reminds us:

Paul, KA7TWX/HR2, and Minda Kleman have returned from Honduras as Minda faces a difficult pregnancy.

Loran Long, TI2LDL, has returned from Costa Rica for a gallbladder surgery which has probably been accomplished by this time so that he is recovering now.

The Chairman, after some discussion regarding interest in the continuation of our ARMS activities, asked those who are interested in continuing to express their interest by raising their hands. The response was enthusiastically unanimous in favor of continuing.

During the discussion relative to an adjustment in the amount required as dues, the Treasurer indicated that the income comprised of dues and contributions has been adequate for our needs. He pointed out, however, that the \$3.00 annually collected as dues would not cover our needs without help from contributions.

It was moved and seconded that the annual membership dues be adjusted to \$5.00. Motion Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the convention committee be reimbursed for the costs incurred in providing the 1988 convention in accordance with established policy. Motion Carried.

After discussion regarding our next convention, none of the sections had volunteered to host the gathering. It was moved and seconded that the Executive Committee be authorized to explore possible locations for the next convention and to reconsider having national conventions yearly. Motion Carried.

Orbra Bliss, W9GEK, called our attention to the need for a more complete brochure or booklet to use in recruiting and to provide information for those who inquire about our organization. He mentioned contacts he has made at the Dayton Hamvention and other places with well qualified hams who would be a very definite asset to ARMS. He has felt a very real need for such material.

Another suggestion called for provision of our nets for supplying more information to casual newcomers that drop in from time to time. In other words, "Be more aggressive in carrying our banner."

Lunch time came, and the group began to break up. More time was needed but not available.

Meeting adjourned sine die.

Additional Notes to the Printed Minutes

I feel some additional background would be helpful to members who were not able to attend the Conference.

The change from annual conferences to one every three years took place after the 1979 Conference because of the gasoline crunch. That problem no longer exists. There really wasn't enough time to discuss the pros and cons of annual vs. triennial meetings, but a large majority of those in attendance were in favor of annual meetings.

I know from personal experience that, under the three year schedule, if you missed two consecutive conferences, you did not get to attend one for a period of nine years!

Several of those in attendance spoke with me after the business meeting stating that due to the nature of their work they couldn't schedule with confidence their attendance at a conference even three weeks in advance, but if conferences were scheduled annually they could be quite confident they would be able to attend at least one in three years.

There were some "soft spoken" suggestions that perhaps the Rocky Mountain Section should consider hosting a conference in 1989. Being the only attendee from the section, I hesitated to commit the section. Since returning to Colorado and talking with several of the Rocky Mountain Section ARMS members and with the encouragement of the Executive Committee of ARMS, the Rocky Mountain Section has decided to host the 1989 ARMS Conference. This summer Art made two trips, to Fort Rae, NWT with a group of Christian Navajos. They have been working with the Dogrib Indians in that area for several years. The Navajo and the Dogrib Indians are linguistically related.

Art says he really appreciates the two-meter repeater which the Yellowknife hams have installed on the government TV repeater tower about 65 miles out of Yellowknife with the permission of the government. There are no gasoline or service stations along the 190 miles from Yellowknife to Fort Providence and the communications available over the two-meter repeater is more than just a convenience.

Some of Art's praise and prayer requests:

Good news is that several independent sources say that the godly lives of the Navajos who go north are eye-openers to the Dogribs. They see what God can do in Indian lives, in place of drunkenness, immorality and superstition.

Good news is that several Dogribs have accepted the Lord as the Navajos have preached. Last summer three Dogribs were baptized.

Good news too is that Emalou was able to teach in three DVBS programs in our home area while I was up North. It was a real joy to her and two Navajo girls indicated their desire to trust Christ as Savior.

The Mission station the Navajos have been building at Fort Rae, NWT, Canada is ready for occupancy. Please pray with them now as they seek a Navajo couple to do missionary work up there.

As I was up north with the Navajos this summer, I was able to teach Bible stories to small groups of Dogrib children. They had never heard them before. They have no Bibles in their homes. Please pray for these children as we will be sending them Christian literature each month.

There is another Indian village up North where there is no Christian testimony. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police there say it has the busiest police station in all Canada. This speaks of the sinful conditions that exist there. Please pray for this place called Assumption. Pray that God will enable us to encourage Navajos to enter this needy field also and establish a testimony for the Lord there.

A Word from the President An Interpretation

He was in for a surprise because Billy and I had taken a degree together. I was able to speak directly on the subject and get a word in for the Lord. I overheard my contact chatting with other fellow after our QSO, relating the whole tale. Let us move in on these opportunities, fellows, and be real missionaries ourselves!

That doesn't mean that we should just wade in without the exercise of due caution. Let's be tactful and subtle, but let's get that message in for the Lord. Then follow up with the printed Word. If a fellow enjoys a conversation with you on the air, he will be happy to get your card, and if it contains a Scripture portion or a tract he will accept it graciously and read it.

May the Lord grant that from our hobby the work of spreading the Gospel worldwide will be facilitated and also that we shall have the pleasure of bringing many precious souls to Him!

She was recently inducted into the Hall of Fame of the National Christian Broadcasters. She has written the story of her family and Station KFGQ in a booklet entitled "When God and Papa Ganged Up Against Me, There Was No Hope For Me."

Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico: "Hurricane Gilbert did not do any damage in the Guadalajara area. It just barely rained. We are getting near the end of the rainy season and the earlier rains have caused considerable damage to the highways. Landslides are frequent. <u>Harrah, WA</u>: Here are some excerpts from a letter recently received from N7AAG, Chuck Winters.

Dear Chuck.

I was surprised to find a short devotional in the current issue of the Beam that I seemed to recognize. Sure enough . . . it was one I had written for our GBC publications, "Daily Devotions." So I'm tucking in a few more from my file that you may or may not find useful for future Beams.

These several pieces use ham radio—or radio communications of some kind—as an illustration for a scriptural truth.

Our radio link between Harrah and our year-round mountain camp in the Cascades uses commercial business band equipment. Seven years ago we were told a radio link to our camp was impossible. "Ham" determination and the grace of God proved otherwise. We run a hundred watt linear at each end. The camp base uses a vertical antenna and I've cut a ham 4-element yagi to frequency on this end. This summer I installed a CSI vox telephone patch so that calls can be initiated and received from the camp station. The system has been a lifesaver on several occasions and is the only contact our caretakers have with the "outside world."

My ham shack is upstairs in our church building . . . tucked away in one corner of an old classroom. Four antennas vie for space on the church roof: the commercial yagi, a 80-40 dipole, a four-band sloper and two-element Gem quad. A month ago we set up the TenTec Triton IV on the church platform and "let" our church family listen over our shoulder while we talked to one of our missionary families in Bogota. We just helped a young missionary wife obtain her Novice ticket so that she could help run the ham radio for her medical doctor husband at their remote hospital in Eastern Honduras.

Hope the enclosed might be of some use.

THE WONDER OF IT ALL

Scripture Psalm 42:1-11 Chuck Winter Harrah, WA

It was my first attempt to make "ham" radio contact with our missionary-doctor friend in Eastern Honduras. I had the right time and frequency and I could hear Dr. Marx—WB7ARA/HR3—talking with a station in Winston-Salem from his medical facility in Ahuas, Honduras.

Over and over again I tried to "break in" to the conversation. The minutes dragged closer to the hour mark. A cassette recorder was running and I had high hopes of taping my *moment-ous* first-contact with my friend. It was working towards being a momentous *flop*.

My finger was already on the power switch. I would shut things down and try again another day. And then—faintly at first—I heard the doctor's voice calling me. I rushed through mystation I.D. and blurted out: "Sam, it's me! It's me, Sam!" I was so excited at actually making contact that the cassette recording would later reveal I had jumped up and down and shouted—to no one in particular—"He heard me . . . He heard me! He actually heard me!"

These many years later there is still that same excitement when I make radio contact with missionaries or friends half-a-world away. I am amazed afresh that radio signals can travel the way they do and carry useful and often important information. Even the daily morning radio contacts with our camp elicits the same wonderment.

I'm ashamed to admit that my "prayer contacts" often don't evoke that same excitement and fervor of spirit. Even in the light of the fact that my prayers transcend the heavens and are heard clearly and distinctly by my Heavenly Father . . . they can become commonplace.

David wrote in Psalm 51 of losing the joy of his salvation. He had not lost his salvation, but he certainly had lost the **joy** of that salvation. He prayed, "Restore unto me the joy of Thy salvation" (Psalm 51:12). And I must pray, "Oh, Lord, restore my vision and revive a fervent spirit within my heart." May I long after this communion with my Father "as the hart panteth after the water brooks" (Psalm 42:1a). May that wonder be rekindled as I pray in Jesus' precious name.
