





## Minutes of the Business Meeting of the AMATEUR RADIO MISSIONARY SERVICE

June 30 1990 at Houghton College, Houghton New York

Present: There were 20 members at the meeting.

- 1. The business meeting of the 1990 Convention was called to order at 10:30 AM (DST) by Vice President Bob Kurtz, WA2CYO, who then offered the opening prayer.
  - 2. A radiogram from President Charles Cox, K7AQ, was read by Bob, and he welcomed the members to the meeting.
  - 3. The minutes of the June 24, 1989, meeting were reviewed and approved.
  - 4. The treasurer's report by Harry Campbell, KK4CB dated June 1, 1990 was reviewed and approved.
  - 5. OLD BUSINESS:

The \$2000 project which was approved at the June 24, 1989 meeting is apparently inactive. At any rate, there was no report on its status. It is not known what the project is.

## 6. SECTION REPORTS:

Don Fallows, VE7DYI, reported on the West Canada Section. Jim McAuley, VE4ID, reported on the Central Canada Section.

The reports were similar, in that there is little Section activity.

Russ Karsjens, WAONPH, reported on the Midwest Section.

Bob Kurtz, WA2CYO, reported on the Eastern Section which is active with regular nets on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 7:00 AM and Saturday at 9:00 AM.

It is recommended that a written report be submitted from sections that do not have a representative at future meetings.

### 7. OTHER REPORTS AND NEW BUSINESS:

Duane Tullar, KA2GCL, reported on the Eastern Section 9:00 AM net. There were several check-ins who passed along their greetings to those at the Annual Meeting.

Al Smith, K2CAC, suggested that care be taken in handling traffic with missionaries to make certain that FCC regulations are being followed in NOT carrying on business transactions. Of course, where third party traffic is illegal there is this further restriction. It seems that missionary nets are being monitored with self-appointed policemen breaking in and stating that illegal business is being carried on. This seems to be a type of harassment that is on the increase. Al stated that when a missionary is at a remote location with no radio communication other that ham radio, and no telephone, that important matters should be handled without concern.

The question of reporting finances to the IRS was raised. Norm Hinkle, W2NNJ, stated that reporting yearly is a requirement and that the IRS Form 990 is to be used. Although there was no motion, the Treasurer was directed to act on this requirement.

There was discussion of the Transcontinental Net activities. There were two specific recommendations:

1) Net control should give check-in numbers as well as the station ident of the station being called to make a transmission. This will enable those waiting their turn to have a better idea when their turn is due.

2) Net control should give more opportunities for checking in during the net such as asking for other check-ins or pausing.

There are problems with a 20 meter net trying to reach all parts of Canada and the U.S. Wendell Lewis, K1RPE, said that strong interfering stations from Florida often make it very difficult for him in Maine.

Bob Kurtz, WA2CYO, introduced the subject of a new ARMS logo. His viewgraph presentation included logo changes by many industries over the last few years, and he presented several suggested new ones for ARMS for further consideration. There was a lively discussion, both pro and con a change, but no action taken at this time. This item should be included in next year's business.

The term, "ARMS Christian Fellowship Net," was brought up as to its use by the different sections. Al Smith, K2CAC, made a motion that net control operators may use "ARMS Christian Fellowship Net" in net identification. It was seconded and carried.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried that the location of the next annual convention be determined by the Executive Committee.

The meeting was adjourned after a closing prayer by Mary Rittgers, NOBBL, at 12:00 noon.

#### SECTION REPORTS

### **Midwest Section**

Thursday, August 16, 1990 was a sad day for the Amateur Radio Missionary Service and especially for the Midwest Section. NWOG, "Bill" Berntsen died at St. Joseph's Hospice in St. Paul. WOEYL, Glen Peterson sent the following obituary that appeared in the August 18, 1990 STAR TRIBUNE.

William B. Berntsen, 74, chancellor and former president of Northwestern College in Roseville, died Thursday at St. Joseph's Hospice in St. Paul.

He suffered from a rare disease called amyloidosis, which causes swelling in the feet and ankles.

Berntsen became president of Northwestern College in Minneapolis in 1965. At the time, the college was facing severe financial difficulties and declining enrollment. Berntsen made the difficult decision to temporarily close the college so he could begin rebuilding.

Seven years later, the college reopened at 3003 Snelling Av. N., with 200 freshmen. After years of steady growth, it has reached an enrollement of more than a 1000 students and offers more than 30 bachelor's degree programs.

Berntsen became chancellor in 1985; David O. Ericksen succeeded him as president. Berntsen, a native of Chicago, studied sacred music at Moody Bible Institute there. He graduated from the University of Northern Iowa with a degree in music education and earned a master's degree from Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill. He studied for his Ph.D. at the University of Minnesota and was awarded an

honorary doctorate in 1975 from the International College in Honolulu.

From 1938 to 1942, he was associate pastor at Burton Av. Baptist Church in Waterloo, Iowa. He was ordained in December 1939 and was associate pastor at Scofield Memorial Church in Dallas, Texas; Jefferson Park Bible Church in Chicago, and the First Baptist Church in Denton, Texas. He was invited to join the Northwestern College faculty by its founder and first president, W.B. Riley, in January 1946. He was chairman of the music department until he became president.

Under his leadership, Northwestern broadened its educational objectives to become a Christian college of the Bible, arts and sciences and vocational education. It sold its 3.9 acre campus near Loring Park and bought a 100-acre campus near Lake Johanna. It added more than \$14 million in new buildings and equipment.

Berntsen led the college to full accreditation in the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

The Northwestern College Radio Network also thrived under his leadership, increasing its outreach and power and adding stations in the Twin Cities; Waterloo, Iowa; Fargo, N.D.; Sioux Falls, S.D.; Madison, Wis.; and Duluth.

Berntsen was a member of Colony Park Baptist Church in Edina and was choir director there for many years.

He is survived by his wife, Beryl; a daughter, Debbie Lang, of Blaine; a sister, Ruth Berntsen, of Buffalo Grove, Ill., and one grandson.



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

## **Rocky Mountain Section**

One of the paradoxes of amateur radio: You can meet for the first time a longtime friend that you have never met before. Had that experience? Several participants of the Rocky Mountain Section of ARMS shared that experience the last weekend in August.

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Many of us have monitored the transcontinental 20 meter NET frequency, 14.3075 MHz, for word from WOODW, Art, who has made three trips to Yellowknife, Northwest Territories, Canada, this past year. Here is Art's report:

When Peter was delivered from jail he immediately went to his praying friends, Acts 12:17 ASV, and told them, "Report these things to James and the brethern."

Good news of God's working needs to be shared.

- 1. With your continued support our personal needs are met and we are able to pay for the expenses UIM incurs in mailing out the LISTEN paper which goes to about 5000 Navajos, also we are able to pay mission headquarters maintenance of \$95.00 per month. Besides this we are able to help the Navajos in spreading the gospel amongst the Dogrib Indians up North. We promised you this financial REPORT and here it is with our thanks. You are indeed our partners in the work. May God bless you abundantly!
- 2. Good news is that several independent sources say that the godly lives of the Navajos who go North are eye-openers to the Dogribs. They see what God can do in Indian lives, in place of drunkeness and immorality and superstition.
- 3. Good news is that several Dogribs have accepted the Lord as the Navajos have preached. Last summer three Dogribs were baptized.
- 4. Good news too is that Emalou was able to teach in three DVBS programs in our home area while I was up North. It was a real joy to her as two Navajo girls indicated their desire to trust Christ as Saviour.

### Prayer Requests.

- 1. The Mission station the Navajos have been building up at Fort Rae, NWT, Canada, is ready for occupancy. Please pray with them now as they seek a Navajo couple to do missionary work up there.
- 2. As I was up north with the Navajos this summer I was able to teach Bible stories to small groups of Dogrib children. They had never heard them before. They have no Bibles in their homes. Please pray for these children as we will be

sending them Christian literature each month.

3. May we burden your hearts further? There is another Indian village up North where there is no Christian testimony. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police there say it has the busiest police station in all Canada, and this tells of the sinful conditions that exist. Will you pray for this place called "ASSUMPTION," that God will enable us to encourage Navajos to enter this needy field also, and establish a testimony for the Lord there.

In the Northwest Territories of Canada distances are great and sources of assistance for travellers are few and far between. I work with Navajos who go up there as Missionaries to the Dogrib Indians, to whom they are related linguistically.

They work at Fort Rae and the Yellowknife NWT hams have put up a 2 meter repeater there in the government TV repeater tower. This repeater is 65 miles from Yellowknife and serves those who wish to use it as they travel the 190 miles from Yellowknife to Fort Providence. There are no service stations between Fort Providence and Yellowknife, so 2 meters surely helps.

I work with the Navajos here often in the summer months and it sure helps to be able to contact the missionary in Yellowknife from Fort Rae almost any time I want to, through the repeater.

The laws on what you can use ham radio for, seem to be more liberal in these remote places and we would find it very hard to get along without the two meter rig up there. It has saved us many miles of travel and we thank the Lord for all that goes into making this convenience possible. Glad to be able to use 2 meters for the Lord.

Russell was born in Chicago, Illinois in 1921. Born again at the historic Chicago Gospel Tabernacle. Traveled for seven years with Lance Latham in the White Shirt Brigade across America. Served in the South Pacific during World War II in the Navy.

Graduated from Talbot Seminary (Biola) in 1949 and California Baptist Seminary in 1951. Served in two pastorates before going to the Orient as a missionary. Ministered in the Army camps of Chiang Kai-shek in Taiwan. Became a cinematographer for Biola with eight film credits. In 1954 he returned to Hong Kong as a missionary until 1958. Returning

on furlough he joined the Heaven and Home Hour. Today he is Pastor-at-Large of the broadcast heard since 1933 nation-wide and overseas. He has earned his B.A., ThB, and B.D. degrees and has been honored with an F.R.G.S. from London and an Honorary Doctorate of Divinity from Madras, India. He is married to Virginia Killman and has two grown daughters and three grandchildren.

First, it is with sadness that I must report that Herb Jacobs, VE5HF, Shellbrook, SK, passed on to Glory, November 2, 1989, at the age of 82. Born February 28, 1907, Swanmore, Hamps, England, Herb went into the University Hospital in Saskatoon for major surgery, but did not recover beyond a week after the operation.

Herb was much loved in the community of Shellbrook--a gentle gentleman. He was very active in his church, St. Andrews Anglican Church, Shellbrook, as a warden, Lay Reader and choir member. Herb and his dear wife Alida, celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1987.

Herb will be missed in the Saskatchewan Radio community. He was an active member of the Northern Saskatchewan Amateur Radio Club where he helped with many club activities and regularly acted as net control for our evening 2 meter net. He was a regular on the 80 meter Saskatchewan nets.

I had the privilege of introducing him to ARMS several years before I actually met him. We were both Lay Readers in the Anglican Church Diocese of Saskatchewan. Two years ago, I was conducting services about twice a month in Big River, Saskatchewan. It was a two-hour drive and Herb used to keep me company on two meters on my way to Big River. I passed alongside Shellbrook and then would stop in for tea and cookies on the way back.

Herb's wife Alida asked me to represent his amateur friends as a pallbearer. I can report that his funeral service was a beautiful, victorious witness for Jesus Christ to the community of Shellbrook. Please pray for Alida as she continues to make necessary adjustments in her life.

Now, about myself. In my career as a Flight Service Specialist, I have had the opportunity also to serve the Lord in remote areas of Canada. Mexico: from XE1MP, Gerald Pieper, Apartado 5-378, Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico.

June--May is the hottest month in Mexico. So the Lord permitted us to visit some of our supporting churches in May.

While we were in the USA some professional burglers broke into our home and removed \$4,000 worth of goodies. Our house has a masonry fence with very sharp steel rods on top of the fence. Plus two junk yard dogs in attendance. But these professional burglars know how to overcome these barriers. Insurance will cover about \$2.000. We did have a considerable amount of Gospel film on videotape. All gone! Plus video player, TV, stereo, kitchen equipment, etc., etc.

You lucky people in the USA can still mail a letter for 25 cents. The 1500 peso stamp on our letter figures out to 53 cents. Oh well, money is only paper!

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Bonaire: from PJ4CR, Chuck and Barbara Roswell, Transworld Radio, Bonaire, Netherlands Antilles, Caribbean.

June - Chuck is very busy with the Frequency Department and trying to work ahead on the "Bonaire Wavelengths" programs so there will be programs while we are away on furlough. Pray for wisdom as he does his work.

"Bonaire Wavelengths" is a ten minute program aimed at the hobbyists that are interested in shortwave and the DXing (long distance reception). It is sort of like holding a carrot on a pole in front of the horse to encourage him to pull the wagon. The carrot ("Bonaire Wavelengths") does attract listeners to tune in before and after the program and then they hear the messages contained in those programs.

The building for the remote-operated, enclosed antenna switching unit is started. When finished, it will provide quick, reliable switching of the signal from the transmitters to the antennas. Our present "switch bay" is 26 years old and is simply worn out! The new one will also reduce the amount of time required for changing antennas and thereby make more time available for the broadcasts. The new switching unit will be enclosed (indoors) and not subject to the effects of the weather.

A 100 kilowatt shortwave transmitter is now under construction at Elkhart, IN, with our engineers working with engineers of HCJB and FEBC. This will eventually replace our aging 250/100 kilowatt shortwave transmitter.

September - "Bonaire Wavelengths," the shortwave listener and radio hobbyist program that Chuck hosts, continues to attract listeners in North America to our shortwave broadcasts. Chuck has even been asked to speak at several shortwave listener meetings and conventions.

Chuck has been having problems with his throat. This is a real problem when you are doing programs, so would you pray this condition will clear up?

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### Madang, Papua New Guinea: Immel Update

September 1990 - It's just past 9:30 in the evening. A comfortable cool breeze is moving the night air. In less than 30 minutes the generator will be turned off leaving us only the light of two kerosence lamps to light our small living area. Tired from the day's activities, we'll soon retreat to bed and seek a good night's sleep under our mosquito nets. We don't seem to notice the strange night sounds or the large darting bats much anymore. We are adjusting to a new lifestyle, new culture and new language. The orientation course we are attending is doing a good job in helping us make the transition. We are cooking and eating a lot of fruit and other locally grown food. Our group cooking is done on a wood-burning stove. Water for showers is also heated by wood and applied to the body via a bucket with a unique shower head. It really works quite well.

We are here with nine other families and three single people. There are nearly 20 children so the girls have made many new friends. They attend school everyday and are seldom bored or seem to miss home. We attend classes each day on language learning, tropical medical problems, and learn to do practical things like cook, operate the radio, repair

sewing machines, and give shots to name just a few. We spend each Wednesday afternoon swimming in a beautiful bay nearby to sharpen our swimming skills.

At our course location, we have an impressive view of the blue Pacific Ocean, the city of Madang and the lush green foliage and coconut palms as we look out to the East.

Some of the local people are involved as our Tok Pisin language teachers and other act as a "host" family or "was famili." We visit and eat with them weekly before moving on to our five week village living phase in late October and November. We are finding the local people very helpful and understanding of our learning situation and they try as they can to help us.

Last Sunday we attended a local church service for the first time and found it somewhat different than what we are used to, but yet the focus of worship was the same. We could sense a spirit of oneness even though we understood only portions of what was being shared.

Having been here only a short time, we can see the importance of taking the few months to learn how to best identify with the people and culture of Papua New Guinea.

### Items of Praise:

- Our flights all the way from Denver were full but pretty much on time. Our luggage made it all the way in good shape.
- We seem to be adjusting and have been feeling well for the most part although Patsy has been bothered with a slight headache for several days now.
- I was able to have minor surgery taken care of in Denver on short notice.
- For Government leaders in Papua New Guinea who want the people to have God's Word available in their mother tongue.

#### **Items of Prayer:**

- For continued good health during these busy days of orientation.
- For open minds to absorb Tok Pisin, the trade language of Papua New Guinea.
- For a good experience and that we would be able to sleep comfortably while in our village-living phase.
- For open hearts to how God would use us to minister to those we serve.

Thank you all for your prayers, financial support and encouragement as we have made this big move. You make it possible for us to be here supporting the on-going task of Bible translation. May God bless you.
