Know your missionary organizations-

Malcolm, ZL1UE, and Rhema Broadcasting

A very regular checkin on the ARMS 20-meter Net is ZL1UE, Malcolm Williams, from Hamilton, New Zealand. Malcolm has been an ARMS member for a long time. In fact, in 1985, he and his wife, Jeanne, made a trip to the United States. They attended the ARMS convention in Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, and spent some time with

Charlie, K7AQ, in Oregon, as well as with some other ARMS members.

We really appreciate Malcolm's faithfulness to the net. It is something of a hardship for him to check in. When the net starts at 1400 Z (during daylight saving time in the U.S.) or 1500 Z (during standard time), it is about 3:00 a.m. the next day for Malcolm. He never seems

to mind, however. With the sun spots providing good DX conditions, Malcolm has been quite regular. There was a stretch of several weeks a while back when he didn't miss a single net.

He gives our net a true international flavor. While there are several Canadian stations who check in quite regularly, we consider them to be American in the sense that

was to appoint Parks Squyres, W7PKS, as net control station for Fridays. We wish Al well in his new responsibility. We know our net continues to be in very capable hands.



we are all located on the North American continent. Malcolm brings a true "overseas" DX dimension to the net. Along with that, of course, comes his rather pronounced New Zealand accent, which a few us State-siders sometimes have a bit of trouble understanding.

While stations on the west coast of North America probably can hear Malcolm's signal most clearly, he has

been copied quite well by stations throughout the U.S. and Canada, even on the east coast. Charlie, K7AQ, has worked him mobile from his location in the Phoenix area.

Perhaps the most remarkable contact Malcolm has made recently was with Ralph, WB7OOL. Pacific northwest

stations never copy can Ralph on 20 because he is too close. However. since he moved several years ago and had to take his beam down, most of relay stations around the country have a very hard time copying Ralph as well. A few weeks ago, Malcolm heard Ralph when no one else could, and he relayed Ralph into the net, all the way from New Zealand! Now that's really international cooperation!

Malcolm lives 14 km. (9 mi.) outside of Hamilton, a city of about 150,000 located in the district of South Auckland on the North Island (see map on the next

page). It is about 75 miles SSE of Auckland, the largest city on the North Island, with a population of over a million. Hamilton is situated at about 38° south latitude, roughly equivalent to

the north latitude of Sacramento, Calif., Wichita, Kan. or Richmond, Vir. It is located in the broad Waikato River valley at an elevation of about 500 feet. It is an agricultural area, receiving about 50 inches of rainfall a year.

Malcolm and Jeanne have four children, one girl and three boys. They have three grandchildren as well, all girls (see photo at left).

Malcolm and Jeanne live on a rather large spread and raise merino sheep (the curly-horned blokes). Malcolm is an electronics engineer as well. In addition to maintaining his own extensive antenna farm on his acreage, he is actively involved with the Rhema Broadcasting Group, a private Christian radio organization with headquarters in Auckland. Rhema Broadcasting is responsible for

maintaining 54 Christian radio stations on three networks, cated throughout New Zealand, under the names of Radio Rhema, Southern Star and Life fm. They transmit on both AM and FM, with their frequency allocations corresponding to those in the United States and Canada.

There are two stations in Hamilton, both AM. Radio Rhema operates one at 855 kHz, and Southern Star operates one at 576 kHz. Actually, they are run from the same transmitting facility, with two transmitters, but one tower. Malcolm and two other men are responsible for

keeping the stations on the air. They work on a rotating basis, with each taking every third week. Malcolm was responsible for the installation of the 576 kHz transmit-

ter, built by another local amateur, ZIAPW.

CHANGING LIVES FOR GOOD

Rhema Broadcasting is dedicated to spreading the Gospel of salvation through Jesus Christ throughout the country of New Zealand. They offer Christian music and teaching. A recent survey indicated that approximately 281,000 people listen to Radio Rhema, Southern Star and/or Life fm every week. That means that close to 10% of New Zealand's population listen to their broadcasts. Many of those are not self-described Christians, so this work is having a definite impact.

In addition to their daily radio programs, Rhema Broadcasting also publishes quarterly "The Word for Today," a daily devotional guide written by Bob and Debby Gass of Bob Gass Ministries, in Roswell, Georgia, U.S.A.

Rhema Broadcasting was founded by Richard Berry. In 1961, the Lord gave Richard a clear vision to establish Christian radio in New Zealand. In those days, there was no such thing as private radio there. On the contrary, there was strict government restriction on any form of private broadcasting, with no real possibility of private groups gaining licenses.

However, naively, Richard pressed on. God led him to a Salvation Army friend who had been wanting to build Christian studios, and they agreed to build

them in Richard's garage.

By 1971, Richard felt God challenging him to live on faith and to devote all of his time to establishing Christian radio. However, the Broadcasting Authority of New Zealand declined the Gospel Radio Fellowship (as Radio Rhema was then known) a broadcasting license. They felt the Gospel Radio Fellowship had failed to prove that such a station was in the public's interest.

In 1972 the Gospel Radio Fellowship changed its name to Radio Rhema. It received another setback in 1974, when a mobile studio was built in the hope that a temporary license would be granted to enable them to broadcast during the Commonwealth Games in Christchurch. Once again, the application was rejected.

The first breakthrough came in November, 1974. Radio Rhema was granted a "one-day only" license to broadcast in Christchurch, on the South Island. Equipment was scarce, and the night before the on-air date during a test run, their transmitter blew up! It was repaired minutes before the on-air time of 6:00 a.m. A crane was brought in to hold up a piece of wire for an antenna, and they were on the air. The day went smoothly, even though the volunteers involved had never before worked together as a team. Phone calls poured in.

The one-day broadcast caused a lot of excitement, and the response was encouraging. Nearly one year later, on October 10, 1975, Radio Rhema again had cause for celebration when they were granted another one-day license, this time in Wellington on the North Island. To make the broadcast, they had to move their equipment from Christchurch to Wellington—the move making broadcasting history in New Zealand.

After roadside breakdowns and ferry delays, the entourage finally made it to Wellington. In spite of continuing difficulties, miracles kept happening. It rained solidly for three weeks before the broadcast, giving the antenna a good

ground.

Regardless of all that had happened, Radio Rhema came on air in Wellington at 6:00 a.m., and all difficulties ceased. Transmission was loud and clear in most parts of Wellington. Despite the fact that Radio Rhema was unable to advertise widely beforehand, several thousand people turned out to visit the broadcasting site, and the telephone staff logged over 400 calls during the day.

For Christmas, 1976, Radio Rhema workers could not have wished for a better surprise. They were granted a license to broadcast from 6:00 a.m. to



midnight in Christchurch—this time for ten days. So now their mobile unit made the trip back to the South Island.

Radio Rhema's final hearing of their application before the Broadcasting Tribunal to obtain a permanent broadcasting license lasted a marathon four weeks. But finally, after experiencing 18 long years of prayer and hard work, New Zealand's first Christian radio station was given a permanent license to broadcast the good news of Christ. A ceremony was held on the front lawn of Radio Rhema's studios in Christchurch, on November 11, 1978, at 11:11 a.m.

The station was "switched on" by the then Prime Minister Robert Muldoon. Mr. Muldoon told listeners, "I have seldom opened something which has given me more joy." He traced the history of Radio Rhema, and paid tribute to the faith sustained by Radio Rhema members who had withstood many setbacks

and disappointments over the years. He ended by saying, "This is a faith that moves mountains." Radio Rhema was the first Christian radio station not only in New Zealand, but in the whole of the British Commonwealth.

Initially, Radio Rhema was only allowed on the air from 6:00 a.m. to noon on weekdays, and from 6:00 a.m. to midnight in the weekends. However, in November, 1980, Radio Rhema was allowed to extend its broadcasts to 18 hours a day. The ministry had grown to 35 full-time and ten part-time workers.

It was time to expand, and Auckland was selected as the next site. In October 1980, a three-and-a-half month temporary broadcast began. By February 1981, Auckland had six full-time workers. The next year, with the coming on air of Wellington and Nelson, it seemed that the trials and tribulations of the past were behind Richard Berry. However, in January, 1985, at the age of 44, he was diagnosed with terminal cancer. Despite gradually deteriorating health, Richard continued to maintain a vital interest in the ministry right up to the time of his passing in 1988.

In 1989 a major breakthrough took place in the Pacific. United Christian Broadcasting Pacific Ltd., an organization established by Radio Rhema, was awarded a license to broadcast Christian programming to Tonga. Broadcasting there commenced in 1991. Other autonomous UCB's were established in Australia and England in the 1980s.

February, 1991 brought with it an exciting opportunity when Radio Rhema was able to buy 30 radio frequencies scattered throughout New Zealand, all in one day! Many paved the way for Radio Rhema to come on the air in those areas. Others have yet to be utilized.

In January, 1994, the decision was made to move the head office to Auckland, and 30 staff relocated from Christchurch. By May, Radio Rhema was broadcasting from the Auckland studios to all 16 of its stations around

Missionary reports

Final closure on the three missing New Tribes missionaries

On Sept. 10, 2001, members of New Tribes Mission's Crisis Committee, and the wives of Dave Mankins, Mark Rich and Rick Tenenoff, agreed that, given the compelling evidence, it was time for a family closure to the 1993 kidnapping.

Information gathered by NTM and others, in years of painstaking and often dangerous investigation, has led to the definite conclusion that Dave Mankins, Mark Rich and Rick Tenenoff were killed by their captors in mid-1996.

Several guerrilla defectors and other collaborating witnesses have related essentially the same story. Early in 1996, one defector told a Colombian army officer he knew where the men were being held. He later led troops to the camp. Fleeing the military in fear, the guerrillas decided that Dave, Mark and Rick were a liability. On a jungle trail in the hills of northern Colombia, an order was given that sent Mark, Dave and Rick into the arms of their loving Lord.


U.S. and Colombian authorities continue to investigate the killings. Remains may never be found. Details may remain secret until eternity. But God has been in control. We have been changed, gaining a richer and deeper understanding of our awesome and powerful God.

area we were hoping to go. This group is known for surprise attacks at beach resorts or other places where foreigners are likely to be. Because of the danger, our directors advised us not to attempt the trip. As confirmation that we were not to

New Zealand.

In 1994, Radio Rhema became New Zealand's first radio network to link it's stations by satellite. It also installed a computer system which allows local break-outs for items such as local advertising and community notices.

Today, after 27 years, Rhema Broadcasting has seen one radio station grow into three radio networks in New Zealand as well as Christian Radio in Australia, U.K., Russia and the Pacific Islands. Radio Rhema now broadcasts to over ninety percent of New Zealand, has 34 operating frequencies (and many others yet to be utilized), over 22,000 members, and 55 full-time and 11 part-time staff. The ministry has much to be thankful for; but most importantly, all praise must go to God, who has never let His ministry down. "Your love, O Lord, reaches to the heavens, your faithfulness to the skies." (Psalm 36:5).

Malcolm Williams, ZL1UE, is proud to be a part of that ministry.

tell how they were feeling—they were just listening silently. At the end the leader, Paul, asked them, "Why did Jesus die on the cross?" and there were many voices that shouted out in unison, "So that we could be saved! To pay for our sins!"

Then he asked, "Why did Jesus say, 'It is finished!'?" And they shouted out, "Because He finished paying for our salvation! His work on earth was finished!" He went on asking a few more questions and they were shouting out the answers! Then he asked Totò, one of the believers who came from Kauyunan to be here for this day, to sing a song, and after Totò sang, then Paul asked me to sing. I sang them a song that we had composed and it started like this: "God the Son became a man, He came here to save those who put their trust in Him, He bought us with His blood, His blood that flowed was the price that He paid..."

As I sang I thought that I would choke with tears as looking around I saw so many in tears, but God helped me to sing without breaking down. After I was finished, I put my guitar down. As Paul was closing the meeting, I went to Arlene, who is the school teacher here, whose face was awash with tears, and I hugged her and she just sobbed.

Then something happened that has never happened since we have been teaching the Word here—people started standing up and hugging us and each other. One after the other, women were coming to me with tears streaming down their



faces and hugging me, Elsa, Jing Jing, Jen and Ginny. I won't forget Nelda—she hugged me so tight and said to me, "Thank you so much for coming here to live among us, because of you coming I am now saved!"

Nancy hugged me and said to me, "You and I are sisters now." Rito, Nelda's husband said as he hugged Rumiyu (one of the elders from Kauyunan who was

visiting), "I thought that there could never be salvation for me because I have killed a man, but I know now that there is salvation for me as I heard today about the thief on the cross who was saved!"

Others like Arlene said to us, "We will be with you forever now because we are going to heaven, too!" We heard just today that Erning, Nancy's husband went home on Sunday and composed a song that says, "Our salvation is complete— Jesus has saved us...!" and he is going to sing it on Sunday!

Last Sunday after they heard about our Lord's death for them, Rey told us that he saw Pidyo, Asyong, Rey Tony, and Babrio sitting in a little huddle outside with their cups of coffee which we have together after our meetings here. They were talking together for a long time, and from time to time Rey would walk over to listen to what they were talking about and he heard them talking about our Lord Jesus and saying

to each other, "There is no other way by which we can be saved apart from Jesus. He died to pay our debt..." Every time Rey walked over there, they were still talking about Jesus—there was nothing else that they could think or talk about apart from their Lord Jesus.

It is just amazing the work that the Holy Spirit is doing in the hearts of our new brothers and sisters here! Aling and Nancy told us this week, while we were working on the translation with them that they now feel such a freedom! They said, "Our Saviour has freed us from so much bondage," and for about an hour they told us about all the many things that they couldn't do before they knew the truth.

They said to me, "Do you know that we couldn't even pass ginger to each other? If someone asked us for the ginger (which they use a lot here in cooking) we would have to put it down near them and then the other person would pick it up-we couldn't pass it directly to them. Otherwise, we would be seen as opposing them and putting a curse on them from the spirits. If anyone sinned in the village and was caught in their sin, they would have to get ginger and cut it up and give some to every household because ginger is supposed to be cleansing and would cleanse the sin, and everyone would rub the ginger on their palms. But in truth, the ginger did nothing to take away the fear and the burden of sin and it gave no hope..." And they told me many more things that every day held them in bondage, but now they said they are so free, and there is no burden left at all because Jesus died for them and they are saved.

- We were open with the kids throughout the whole process. I've read of children older than mine who weren't really told until very near their parent's final hours. The counselor the girls see attributes much of the their positive emotional adjustment to that.
- Deb's death was not sudden; we had 27 months to process it as we lived through it.
 - There is no one to blame, as in a drunk driver or murderer.
 - Mommy didn't want to leave us.
 - The kids are old enough to help in the "home management."
- All the kids are old enough to remember Mommy well.

Now the "chores" before me on my return are so many that it's easy to feel overwhelmed. Each day a few more things get done, and slowly we'll get back into a routine. It felt good to work in the hangar today.

The kids have started school, and that is helping us get into the new order of things. Rachel and Ruth are going to an after-school day-care across the street from the school, and Rebekah wants to try and be home by herself for the hour until I come home each day. Changes continue as we deal with each new situation.

Dave Immel, KE4EW, Waxhaw, NC Vision 2025...

Two years have passed since the Wycliffe/SIL International Conference agreed that "We embrace the vision that by the year 2025 a Bible translation project will be in progress for every people group that needs it." This vision will not be realized without partnering with others. It will require team-



work, working along side churches, training nationals for translation, support services, and partnering with other mission agencies involved in Bible translation.

We feel the urgency for getting God's Word to those who haven't heard. Imagine your life without God...can you begin to understand the need of the people in those 3,000 language groups? Our desire,

our passion is that God's Word will be available and impact their everyday life—like it does ours. Where does each of the field entities, Wycliffe US, JAARS, begin? Who will be reponsible for all the various aspects? God has been laying the roundwork long before Vision 2025 was thought of. In many reas of the world the church has grown and interest has taken oot in the Bible translation task. The US Center for World fissions reports that cross-cultural missionaries from the eveloping world have increased from 86,000 in 1995 to over 52,000 by 2000. The evangelical church in Argentina has

resolved to recruit, train and send 2,500 missionaries to unreached people groups over the next ten years. We hear similar reports from other Latin countries, Asia and Africa. Within our organization we are seeing dovetailing affects in strategies. We are excited about what God is doing and how His Spirit is moving among His children around the world.

Our contribution will be to continue in our present roles. Patsy uses her secretarial skills during strategic planning sessions. She does work full time and yet always seems to find the time (and energy) to take care of the needs at home. I continue using my skills in the aviation maintenance area. Last April David wrote and asked if I would produce some of the Source of Light Bible correspondence courses in braille. Soon he began talking of a Bible school for the Blind. When he arrived he told me that the committee of Christ for the Blind, a part of his much larger International Christian Cooperative



ministries, Inc., asked me to be president of the as yet to be founded Christ for the Blind Bible College. This will entail periodic trips to Ghana and the production of courses in braille. They have also asked me to set up a curriculum for the school.

Our advisory board approved this ministry at a specially called meeting, and

we are beginning to prepare for a trip there next March, over the Easter holiday. We hope to take a small team of medical and rehabilitation people with us to help preserve sight, distribute used glasses and to assess the skill-training needs that we will need to address. The curriculum will consist of both Bible and theological studies, and work and life management skills training. It will be a sort of Christian rehabilitation school as well as a Bible college.

One weekend in October I attended the Heartland Christian Ministries Conference in Omaha with Leon Scott, director of Source of Light Ministries, Kansas. We manned a booth and did workshops Friday afternoon and evening and all day Saturday. Leon did a workshop on Understanding Faith Missions, and I did one on Ministering to the Disabled. Together we did a workshop on How Bible Correspondence Courses will Help your Ministry.

- for the choosing of students who will begin their training on a small scale.






Stan Poeschel, KD6WZA, and XYL make the big tour

The "Alcan" revisited

The Alaska (nicknamed the "Alcan") Highway was built in 1942 when the

Japanese were threatening to attack Alaska. In fact, they were already occupying some islands in the Aleutians, so the highway was built in less than a year.

In 1953 I started driving a fuel truck from Edmonton, Alberta to Fort Nelson, B.C. and on to an air base at Smith River, B.C. by way of the Alaska Highway.

This past summer I returned to the highway. My wife, Leone, and I left Kamloops, B.C. on May 31 and heading north through Prince George to Dawson Creek, mile zero on the Alaska Highway. On this trip we had our 95 Dodge dually pickup with a 10-foot slide-in camper. One of the reasons we did not want to take our 5th wheel was I wanted to check out the old road. When I hauled fuel up there, it was all gravel and very crooked. It now is straight and paved and a lot of the bad hills are gone.

We actually drove the old highway on this trip from Buckinghorse, mile 175, over the Trutch mountains to mile 200. We always wondered in the 50's why they put the highway over the mountains instead of in the valley below, and guess what, it's now in the valley.

We stopped at Fort Nelson to visit a couple that ran the *Lum & Abner's Lodge* at mile 233 in the 50's. We had a great visit, and they showed us some movie footage of those times. When we arrived at *The Poplars Lodge*, mile 425, the road was closed due to a collapsed culvert at Iron Creek, mile 595. We were there for three nights as they had to truck a bridge from Grande Prairie, Alberta, to bypass the washout. Apparently the culvert was the largest in Canada, measuring 63 feet in diameter. While at the *Poplars*, we ran into a couple from San Rafael, Cali-

fornia, who planned to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary at Dawson

City. Because they were held up, they celebrated with the whole campground with cake, coffee and music by some campers from Alberta.


include a stop at the Liard Hot Springs, mile 496. Muncho Lake, mile 456, is always beautiful and a stop at *Mukluk*

Another highlight of the trip was the bus trip into Denali Park. It was a 8-hour trip and lots of grizzlies, moose, caribou, doll sheep and wolves were spotted. Mount McKinley was cloudy so we didn't see it until the next day, which turned out to be bright and sunny.

glaciers, then through Glenallen to Valdez, back to Glenallen into the Yukon and down to Skagway. There were three cruise ships in Skagway and tourists everywhere. There was a lot of Gold Rush history there and very enjoyable.



I was born here in Knoxville, and I have lived here all my life. As a matter of fact, I can see my home place from where we live now.

I started my career as a respiratory therapist in 1972 as an on-the-job trainee. I studied on my own and was certified in

1974. I worked until 1991. In March of that year, I noticed that I was falling a lot in the stair wells and that my muscles were becoming very stiff. After a long ordeal, going from doctor to doctor, I finally was sent to a neurologist that specializes in neuromuscular diseases. His exam revealed that my reflexes where very spastic. After numerous tests I was diagnosed with spastic paraparesis. (It may possibly have a

genetic basis, but I have no family history of the disease.) I had to quit work that same year.

There is a medication which, when injected directly into the spinal cavity, eases the symptoms of the condition. A couple of years ago they implanted a pump in my abdomen which automatically and continuously administers the medication in the required amounts. It isn't a cure, but it helps. However, to complicate matters, since then I also have also been diagnosed with diabetes, so now I have to take insulin as well. At the present time I am pretty much confined to a wheelchair.

I met my wife, Andra, where I worked, at the East Tennessee Baptist Hospital, and we were married in October, 1973. Andra still is employed at Baptist as a registered nurse. We have one daughter, Kristin, who is 19 and a sophomore in college, studying to be a nurse.

I got my ham license in 1976, as a novice. Currently, I hold an advanced class license. Amateur radio is a big part of my life, especially since I am disabled. I keep a regular schedule with my dear friend, Fred, HH5FW, who is a missionary in Haiti. Several years ago I had the privilege of visiting Fred at his mission station.

Andra was licensed as a no-code technician in 1991. Recently she upgraded to general class at the Selby Hamfest in North Carolina.


For 25 years I was a lost church member, but in February,


