ANNOUNCING THE QUARTERLY MEETING OF ARMS AT PHILADELPHIA COLLEGE OF

BIBLE ON MARCH 14, 1964 AT 10:00 A.M. WITH RAY CODDINGTON OF EL2F

AS SPEAKER. TO BE DISCUSSED: NATIONALIZATION-CORPORATION-NEW SKEDS!

We shall be looking for as many as find it possible to join us there. We shall be expecting all of you to join us in prayer for wisdom here.

Just what is an amateur? Have you ever thought of a definition?? Several months ago, the ARMS group was invited to participate in the missionary program at Faith Bible Church in Vineland, New Jersey. At the conclusion of the ARMS presentation, the pastor, H.Dalton Meyers

gave his definition as follows:

"The word 'amateur' has --in many respects -- lost its original and beautiful meaning in this current materialistic age. For today the word connotes a meaning that suggests lesser skill and ability than a professional. In reality, however, I believe that the word amateur suggests some thing more than a professional; because the word means 'love for one's work'. There seems to be a certain professionalism today that indicates a lack of vital concern for others. One answer to this area of materialism is a re-surgence of good old-fashioned amateurism. True amateurism. Amateurism that means love as these men of ARMS are expressing it.

"These men and women are in this work because they love ham radio. They are in this work because they love the people they are serving. And above all, they are engaged in this ministry because they love the Lord Jesus. The Word of God says that Paul was an amateur. In II Corinthians 5:14 he writes of himself: 'For the love of Christ constraineth me'. He was not inan apostolic ministry because it was the professional thing to do or because it was an appealing status; for as far as status was concerned, he 'counted it all loss'. Rather, he was a lover of Christ. And these people are doing this service because they love Christ. They are not paid to do it. In fact, they requested that no offering be taken. These men are amateurs in the true sense of the word.

"And so may we be amateurs when we realize the love of Christ; when we thus judge that if one died for all, then were all dead and in that He died for all that they which live should not henceforth live unto

themselves but unto Him who died for them and rose again'.

"Some of you have baked cakes and provided other good things for our dinner tonight because you love the Lord Jesus. Some of you may have simply shared a ride to the service tonight or to Sunday School because you love the Lord Jesus. It is apparent that in every area of life we can be amateurs because we love Him and are alive in Him.

"Let us pray that we will be true amateurs. 'We love -- because

NOT A TIME FOR PRAYER? Sometimes the Lord directs us to activity for Him

"To answer your request to tell how God led me to get on the ARMS net--It all started early one morning in December. ON THE NEWSFRONT !! In the current issue of "Africa Now", magazine of the Sudan Interior Mission, is an article entitled 'Radio Hams and Missions' .: "Radio 'hams' (amateur operators) scattered over the USA and 13 foreign countries have formed a volunteer network to aid communications between mission fields and home base. Amateur Radio Missionary Service(ARMS), began in 1957 with 16 members, now has some 300 members who run about 35 schedules a week, relaying messages for nine mission boards. "In addition to handling urgent communications on behalf of mission offices, ARMS provides a personal link with home for individuals. Lonely missionaries have been able to talk to their parents and friends at home thousands of miles away, comments Dr. William Mierop, ARMS president. Grandparents have even heard the first gurgles of their grandchildren

"ARMS" was first licensed in 1958 and has headquarters at the Philadelphia College of Bible, 1800 Arch Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, USA. It now has three recognized nets in the USA and prospects of a fourth. Eager to expand its services wherever government regulations permit, ARMS invites Christian amateur operators around the world to write for information on

how to participate."

A picture is included of an SIM missionary on a remote station making radio contact with headquarters on an improvised transmitter/ receiver. The comment follows; "Missionaries often must depend on radio for urgent communications."

WORLD'S FAIR AT NEW YORK \*SPRING \*1964 -WYCLIFFE PAVILION \*-The big news for '64 is the Wycliffe Pavilion at the World's Fair. Work is well under way on the building itself with Dr. Harold Key overseeing the whole project. A huge mural is being painted by a Canadian artist who has done much work and research on the tribal activities in Peru. The painting will depict the tribes before the Word of God reached them and then how it has transformed their lives. There will be movies, artifacts, literature, and several Wycliffe workers present to acquaint the public with the work of WBT. The pavilion will be near the Billy Graham building and the terminal for the aerial car that transports people around the fair grounds for a bird's eye view. The continuous tape will play the Gospel message over and over as long as the operator turns the handle. Allthe missionary has to do is prepare the tape cartridge and insert it. Missionary Electronics, Inc. Box 75, Syracuse, N.Y. is not in the business of manufacturing, it is involved in designing, developing, and furnishing electronic equipment which the Lord indicates on the mission field. Manufacturing of devices they develop is done by Electronics Aids, Inc. now located at P.O.Box 293, Canastota, N.Y. New device -Model TR-1L.
