I've just received the latest edition of THE BEAM, which was forwarded from our old address in Chiapas which reminded me after these months that I haven't changed my address with you folks.

Continuing to serve with MAF, we are now here in the Yucatan peninsula, flying a Cessna 180 in a program of airborne evangelism and airborne medical clinics, in conjunction with work of the National Presbyterian Church. Our work is practically all on the national level and there is no serving of missionaries in a supply ministry because there are none to serve. This is the extending arm of the local church. We count it a real joy and privilege to take part in the growing of the national church.

With no missionaries around we have had no need for the very competent facilities of ARMS. But at the same time I've certainly missed the wonderful fellowship. I've been operating for some time now under the call XE3MF (Missionary flyer), but that will change within a few weeks. 15 meters is the prime band with 21.420 the frequency. Having just read in the BEAM about the 21.390 at 2400Z I hope to see if I can hear any of the fellows. Equipment

is a TR-3, RV-3, Quad, "V" beam, and a 20000' long wire under construction, aimed up the east coast, for 40 and 75 meters.

Again thanking you for all you've done in times past and trusting the Lord for great things in the future, if I can be of any help or service from down this way, just say the word. Greetings to all the fellows along the way. 73's & 99's.
