1973 ARMS CONVENTION

The 1973 annual meeting of the Amateur Radio Missionary Service, hosted by the Rocky Mtn. Section, will be held July 27, 28 and 29 on the campus of Western Bible Institute near Morrison, Colorado.

The campus buildings and radio tower of Christian radio station KWBI-FM may be seen on the left from Hiway 285 as one begins the mountain ascent. The best route to follow to reach the campus is West Hampden Avenue (hiway 285) to Kipling St.; south on Kipling to Belleview; west on Belleview 4 1/2 miles to the school's entry drive.

A coeducational, nondenominational, independent and evangelical school; Western is an associate member of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, and offers four degree programs leading to a Bachelor of Biblical Science Degree or Bachelor of Biblical Education Degree.

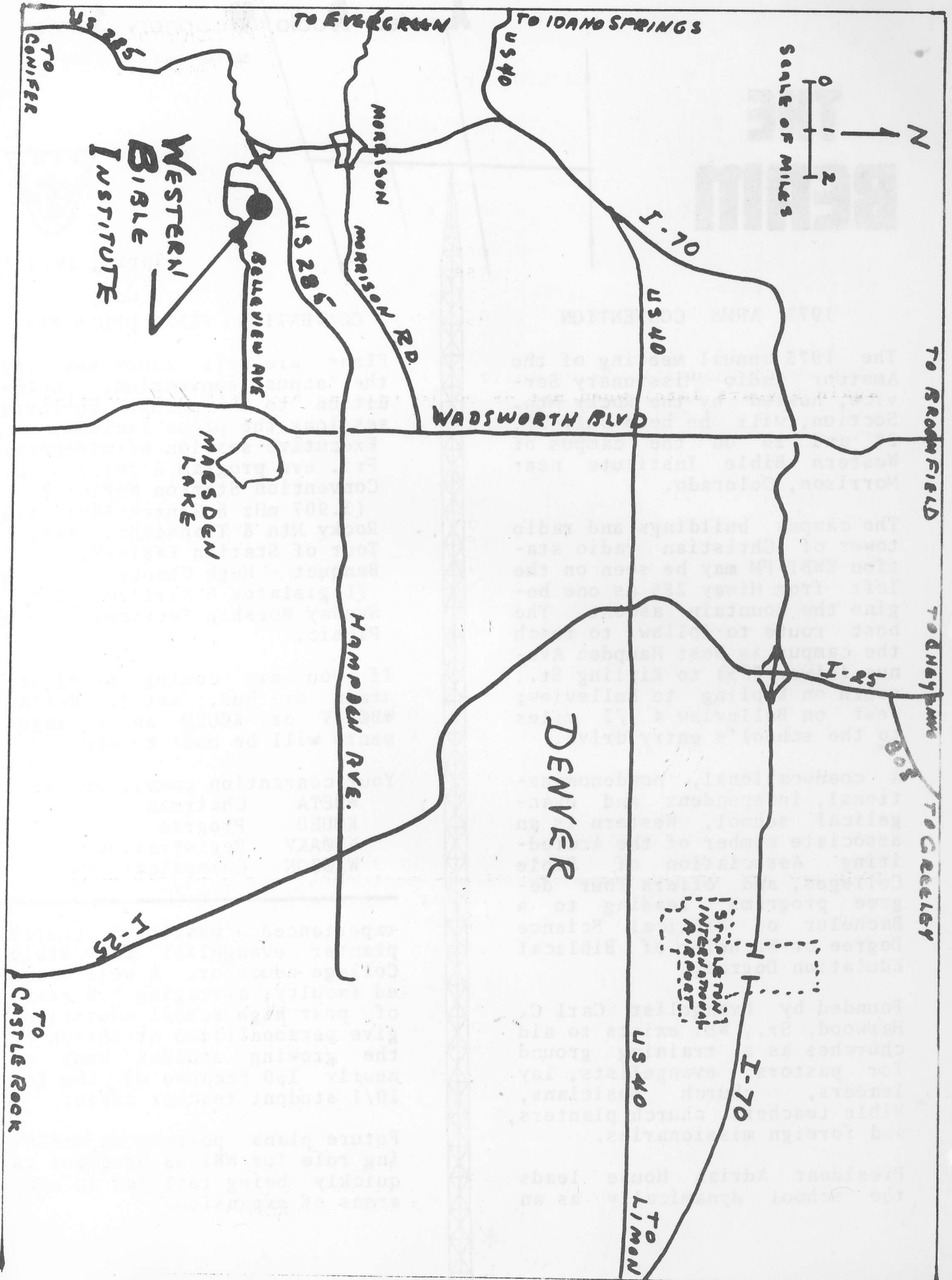

SAILING WITH SAILER

Strange as it seems, black soot and brilliant diamonds are both carbon. Diamonds are crystals of carbon. Carbon crystals do not form unless the carbon is pressed very hard and heated very hot at the same time. Diamonds are harder than anything else we know about. Their name comes from a Greek word that means "unconquerable."

My thoughts jumped to the description above when John Sailer, K6PZL, told me that his life verse was Romans 8:28 -- "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose."

John found this verse particularly real when he was hospitalized with rheumatic fever while in the Navy about 25 years ago and again 9 years later when hit by polio leaving him with only partial use of one arm and partial breathing ability. "Romans 8:28 is much more helpful than theological why's and wherefore's," declares John.

Your Editor, WBØAKV, in his B.H. days (before hamming), was first introduced to John by KL7DTJ, George Ryon. John had consented to lend his station so that George could use it for demonstration purposes at an Open House in the office of the North America Branch of Wycliffe Bible Translators near Santa Cruz, California. A couple of years later John was instructing me (newly WB6WYL) on how to tune a transmitter and helping to get my first station on the air by supplying some odds and ends from his surplus pile.

"My aim in life," John states, "is to serve Him in whatever way possible." Right now this seems to be to teach young people in a framework of Christian principles. John (from a wheelchair) is teaching math and chemistry at Monte Vista Christian School near Watsonville, California. John admits that his biggest help in the classroom is the overhead projector.

The Ham bug had bitten John and he was almost ready for his General Class ticket when struck by polio in 1956. When he returned home from the hospital a year later, he brushed up on theory and code and got on the air. One of his most thrilling contacts came soon after getting his ticket. It was contacting Shell Mera, HC7RP, shortly after having read "Through Gates of Splendor." These contacts have continued through the years and right now are with HC7DO.

John gets on the air, as time permits, with friends. He particularly enjoys helping missionaries in South America with phone patches. Occasionally he is able to work out schedules between missionary parents and their children at the school. He also has enjoyed meeting on Saturday mornings with the West Coast ARMS members and helping whenever he can.

John's XYL, Lorna, teaches English at the same school. Their oldest son, David, with his wife and son moved to Greeley, Colorado last summer. He is working as a computer operator for a firm

that serves several banks. Their daughter, Christine, is in her fourth year of five years at Biola College as a nursing major. Their youngest son, John, is a junior at Monte Vista Christian School.

John, K6PZL, sums up his activity on the air as follows:
"I've had the usual birth, death and general traffic handling that most hams know, rejoicing with those that rejoice and weeping with those that weep."

ARMS member, Arnie Kopischek, WAØDFT is planning to leave for Borneo on May 28th for a short term missionary project involving electronic assistance to a Mission Station located in that area. He and his wife are also planning to visit the Holy Land on their route back home in September.

By the time you receive the next issue of the BEAM, a new ARMS President will have been elected. It has been a real privilege and honor to have served as President for these two years, and I wish to again thank all those who have given so willingly of their time and effort to the work of ARMS.

This has again been a good year and one of its high points was the 75 meter rally on the night of March 2nd celebrating the 16th anniversary of ARMS. A special treat was having two of the founders -- Dr. William Mierop, K2JEI and Rev. Sherman Milligan, WA2CNK -- as participants in the rally. How the Lord has blessed the work these men began!

While it is uncertain that I will be able to attend the annual meeting near Denver, I would urge each section to be represented if at all possible. Let us all continue to provide radio communications for those who are serving in Missions, and let us give our incoming president and his staff our wholehearted support for the coming year.
