

Fires Do Happen...

Last September 5th, an early morning fire completely destroyed the retirement home of Gordon, VE7BQA, and Muriel Tiessen, which was located on Shoswap Lake, Eagle Bay, British Columbia, sixty miles north of Kamploops. The Tiessens had been building the retirement home for the past eight years, and had become permanent residents of Eagle Bay in March. Ed.

The initial cause of the fire is unknown at this time, however, indication suggests fire started from the outside. Within minutes the fire was out of control and the five level split home was completely gutted an hour later. Gordon and Muriel...and Gordon's brother and wife, Fred and Ella (visiting from Toronto) were the occupants of the home when the fire broke out. Ella woke to the smoke and alerted the others. All escaped without injury. They were unable to save any of their belongings. The home was built by themselves in 1983. Upon calling emergency number 911, the Tiessens discovered Eagle Bay was without a fire department service. "What a helpless feeling not knowing who to call or what to do while watching your home being engulfed with flames." It was (continued on page 3, column 1)



And Tornados, Too

Last June 2nd, KA9000, John Racz' home in Bright, Indiana, was heavily damaged by a tornado about 11 p.m. while he was at work at the Cincinnati Airport (the airport is actually in Kentucky).

I finally got the word from W9OVY Eric Frank, who had received a letter from John in mid-December. There were several people who were aware of John's loss, but each assumed that someone else had notified the ARMS Nets. John has written a rather detailed account, so we will let him tell us what happened. Ed.

I'll try to describe that evening of Saturday June 2, 1990, as best I remember.

I was at work at the airport. About 10:30 p.m. we had got weather warnings about severe thunderstorms in the area with possible tornados. The local TV station weather man stated that tornados were sighted in Dearborn County, Indiana. This was at 11:00 p.m. just as I was leaving work. I was a little concerned because I live in that area. When I got to my truck in the parking lot, I turned on the 2 meter (continued on page 3, column 1)



"If there had been any wind at all, the fire would have spread to all ten homes located in the small bay." The Tiessens are especially grateful to nearby neighbour Dawna Murray for her assistance and to Wayne and Brenda Benson of Eagle Bay Mini Mart as well as the many friends and neighbours who came to their aid

rig to 147.285 MHz Lawrenceburg repeater to find out what was going on. It didn't take long to find out! A local ham, Dave, WD8NMZ, who also works with the Red Cross was already on the air in Bright, Indiana, where I live. He said that Bright was hit and that I should not try to get home at that time because all the roads were closed due to fallen trees, etc. Dave said that a Civil Defense Command Center was set-up in the Dearborn County Court House and I should go there, which I did. Several of the hams I know were manning the 2 meter repeater at the center helping the county civil defense officials. I tried to get my wife on the phone--no answer! So I checked in with the civil defense group to see if I could help.

About a half hour later I got a chance to talk to Dave again and asked him if my street was hit. He said yes, but did not know how bad or if anyone was injured—it was just to early to tell. I did give the names of my wife and daughter and asked him to see if he could find out any thing. Approximately 1:00 a.m. he called to say that they were OK and at the neighbors. I still could not get through on the phone. I found out later that my wife had called me at work about 5 minutes after I had left to tell me that our house was hit. Dave told me that local people were

getting into the area the back way on Indiana Route 1, so I headed home with the 2 meter rig on. It was surprisingly calm with the streets wet, just a few tree limbs blown around on the ground. The 2 meter rig was busy, but no reports of injuries! I still did not know how bad it was and really could not see anything. The real damage would not be realized until Sunday morning.

Approximately five miles from the area I noticed that there were no lights on in the houses. The closer I got, the more debris there was on the roads, but only when I got to the nearest intersection to my house did I finally see the devastation. I parked the truck in the North Dearborn Methodist Church parking lot. Some police and power company trucks were there, and I could see damaged houses and large trees blown down across the roads. At this point I was about two streets from Banberry Drive. I checked in with Dave, who was using the church as a local command post for the Red Cross. He said my street was hit pretty hard, but my wife and daughter were OK.

I borrowed a flashlight from Dave and started walking. I walked down the street behind ours toward the house. I really couldn't see much, but I did notice there was debris everywhere. Pieces of house siding, insulation, tree limbs, houses in various stages of destruction. As I got closer, I could just barely make out my house in the dim lights of the emergency vehicles a block away. From my neighbor's backyard I finally could see the house clearly enough to see that the whole roof and part of the top floor were gone!. The garage was gone! I called for my wife when I got to the house and she answered me! She was OK and so was my daughter.

My wife had contacted my son and his wife who live in Dayton, Ohio, and said that they were on the way to help. In the meantime I started my generator and hooked it to the refrigerator and freezer. We did not know how long the power would be out.

I met my son and daughter-in-law at the church and walked back to the house. We finally settled down and tried to get some sleep, around 3:00 a.m. We knew we had a lot to do Sunday morning and we were completely exhausted!

At sunrise we got up to check the damage. The devastation was unbelievable! TV newscasts couldn't describe it. We started cleaning up and continued for about two weeks straight. Besides the house, the radio towers and all antennas were destroyed. The rigs were all OK because they were in the basement.

We thanked the Lord for our lives and started the task of cleaning up. The Red Cross fed people like us for about three weeks. The county provided cleanup crew trucks.

A few days later my wife experienced chest pains and was taken to the hospital. The admitting doctor said he did not think she had a heart attack, but he put her in intensive care just to make sure. It turned out that she was suffering from severe stress.

Power was partially restored to the house the next day, so I loaned my generator to Dave to use at the church which did not have power yet. I also loaned him my 2 meter base rig with the power supply. The insurance company showed up with the adjuster Tuesday morning. The moving company came Wednesday to store the furniture and belongings that were not damaged. Wednesday night we moved in with church friends and stayed with them through the middle of August; then in a motel until September 24th when the house was finished.

To summarize the last six months, I think it best to say that the Lord was watching over us and the other people in this area. When we think how bad it could have been, I know God has shown mercy in Bright, Indiana. The tornado can down Banberry drive at bed time on a Saturday night. Some were in bed or getting ready for bed when it hit. The Civil Defense Director in Lawrencburg, Indiana, set off the sirens when the tornados were sighted in New Alcise, Indiana, about 15 miles west of Bright. My wife and daughter heard the sirens, and with the wind blowing and much lightning and thunder, went to the basement and were safe. The neighbors across the street got their six year old daughter out of bed and took her to the basement just in time. No one in Bright was hurt! The insurance company has replaced our material possessions, but only God could preserve our lives.

At present our lives are pretty well back to normal. . . . I've got a new HF verical up in the back yard and a 2 meter vertical up on what's left of the old tower--ten feet. I've a new tower in the garage which will go up this spring. At present I'm working the day shift on Saturdays so I haven't been able to check in to the Central Section ARMS Net, but will as soon as my schedule permits. . . .

Well, Eric, that's about it--God bless and 73's. Pass it on to the others!

EXPLANATIONS AND EXCUSES

It appears at this time, that there will not be a National ARMS Conference in 1991. I'm not sure just why, but I have a notion that the Middle East situation last August and the subsequent Desert Storm action took priority in much of our concern and prayers. Any thoughts and plans relative to an ARMS conference were put on the back burner. It seems that perhaps the best thing to do now is to encourage the individual ARMS sections to plan section conferences and to make one of the agenda items a period for prayers of thanksgiving to God. His hand of protection is evident in the very low percentage of battle casualties among the coalition forces. It is certainly a sad situation for the people living in the area, and who are taught so much hatred from early childhood. We need to pray that real peace—the peace of Jesus Christ—might be the future of all the people in that region.

Without an ARMS conference, the membership will not have an opportunity to take part in a business meeting, so we will have to be alert to opportunities for service to members and friends of ARMS. If you know of such opportunities, please let the officers and members of the board of directors know of your concerns.

Some of you probably noticed that the Treasurer's Report for 1990 was missing from the minutes of the last business meeting. Well, the report finally caught up with me, so I am including it in this issue.

There are a couple of loose sheets in **THE BEAM** this time, so be careful not to lose the dues notice and the directory update.

NET CONTROL STATIONS NEEDED

It has been mentioned on the Transcontinental Net from time to time that we need more Net Control Stations to carry on the net operation Monday through Saturday on 14.3075 MHz at 1545 UTC. It would be nice if we could have a back-up NCS for each day the net operates to take care of planned and unplanned absences. It's not difficult, and if you have the equipment and the time, it's a great way to get to know the ARMS members, to develop operating skills, and to have a lot of fun. Let Emil, W7FQ, our Communications Manager, or Charlie, K7AQ, ARMS President, know that you would like to give it try.

DUES DUE

You will find an unattached form in **THE BEAM** to be filled out and sent to Harry Campbell along with your \$5.00 to renew your membership for the year from June 1, 1991 to May 31, 1992. Missionaries are exempt from dues, but Harry would like to hear from everyone. With the recent postal rate increase, we would like to have your current mailing address to avoid paying for a round trip overseas for **THE BEAM**. Most US members' mail is now sent for 11.1 cents (last mailing was 8.4 cents), pre-sorted third class to a ZIP code address, and if not deliverable, it is destroyed. Overseas mail is sent airmail at a cost of \$1.35 per piece, and, if not deliverable, is returned to the sender. The cost to mail **THE BEAM**, first class to Canada was 52 cents and to Mexico was 42 cents. Apparently these costs will go up about 100%. The cost of renewing the mailing permit will now be \$75 rather than the \$60 we paid last year. ARMS renewal date is May 12, 1991, but I don't expect to renew it, since it cannot be transferred from one post office to another.

I have some returned mail that was addressed to African missionaries, and I can certainly understand the postal service checking the box marked, "Services Temporarily Discontinued," but I have about a dozen pieces of mail that were returned with boxes marked, "Moved, Address Unknown," "Unclaimed," "No Such Address," etc. I hope you can see why we are asking for your latest mailing address.

The main attraction was a presentation by Bruce Dillingham, Manager of the North Central



HCJB Engineering Center Elkhart, Indiana

Fear not: for behold I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Savior, which is Christ the Lord (Luke 2:10-11).

The first 100,000 watt shortwave transmitter has been broadcasting this gospel message around the world with great clarity and strength since the first of June. HCJB's French Language Service Director's son, Oliver Dossmann, reported from France that the programs sound like local FM radio. Praise God with us for performance beyond our expectations.



At the transmitter site in Pifo, Ecuador, HCJB now has 12 transmitters with a total of 1,030,000 watts of power on the air for more than 100 hours

each day. In order to add the megalanguages (those with more than one million speakers) assigned to HCJB, it is imperative that more transmitter power be added.

Five more 100 kilowatt transmitters are in production here at the engineering center. The second two transmitters designated for Ecuador are scheduled for delivery in 1991, two go to Trans World Radio and the fifth to another missionary broadcaster.

In October several HCJB missionaries delivered a portable studio, produced at the HCJB Engineering Center, to Georgia in the U.S.S.R. The Georgian Christians were trained in recording programs that will be sent to Quito for broadcasting back into Georgia to reach the lost there for Christ. They have not had the privilege of having Christian broadcasts in their mother tongue. Pray for the programmers as they share "the good tidings of great joy" via recorded broadcasts from HCJB.

Nineteen HCJB missionaries, 14 volunteers, five workers from other missions and one employee serve on the staff at the engineering center. This team works together on the production of the 100 kilowatt transmitters, the assembling of portable studios and designing and building portable FM transmitters for use in countries unreached by gospel broadcasts, along with upgrading the design of the 500 kilowatt transmitters headed for production.

At the HCJB Engineering Center here at Crown International in Elkhart, Indiana, this has been another year of great rejoicing and thanksgiving for all that God has done. A special thanks to you for helping make the production results a reality, and we thank God for each of you and how He has used you to encourage and uphold the team serving here in Elkhart. . . .

-Dick (K0FMF) and Beverly (K0FME) Long, who we first met at their cabin near Woodland Park, CO at an ARMS picnic in March 1967. I think Dick was at the other end of the longest distance contact I ever had between earth stations when they were in Sarawak, Indonesia. we were close to being exactly on opposite sides of the earth. I've forgotten what they call those opposite points.


