



Thanks for all the work that you put in on our behalf. It is greatly appreciated! I am sending my news article directly to you, because our section director, **Arnie Kopischke**, **WA0DFT** fell and broke his hip, and he is now convalescing, from surgery in a nursing home.

I have had the privilege of working in and on behalf of LAMP-Canada for nearly forty years. This year, 2010, we actually celebrated our 40th year of ministry in the far north. The number of first nation people in Canada is growing at a surprising rate. Statistics indicate that there are still 1.5 million children in

the isolated north country that have not heard the name of Jesus Christ. The missionaries of LAMP are the men and women who give of their time and resources to teach Vacation Bible School for a week in the villages. These individuals represent a whole cross section of Christian traditions and LAMP trains them in cross cultural work and provides the materials that meet the needs of the setting. I always warn those who accept the challenge to teach up north that after their first mission experience in this third world setting they will want to return again and again as God's Spirit moves them. It is what I call a holy addiction.

David Shortess, W7PTL Report:


A couple of years ago my wife, Ann, and I attended a Wycliffe Bible Translators (WBT) banquet. At the end of the presentation we were given an envelope that included a questionnaire. One of the questions asked was, "Are



you interested in volunteering?" When we got to that question, Ann exclaimed, "Oh, David, you should check that box! You have so many talents that the Lord could use." So I checked it.

After several phone calls and other preliminaries, the result was that I was accepted as a WBT volunteer and in October 2009 I reported to Orlando, Florida to the WBT national headquarters. I had been assigned to work there with Gary Peterson in the Wycliffe Discovery Center, an educational facility dealing with the history of the Bible, linguistics and Bible translation. I wasn't sure what my actual duties would be, but after I arrived, when Gary learned that I had written three books and edited a couple of newsletters (including the ARMS Beam for 12 years), he gave me the job of editing several hundred Word files that he had accumulated from e-mails he had received from mis-

sionaries over the years. These files included general reports from the field, games, skits and other things, all dealing with the challenges of missionary life in remote areas, linguistics and/or Bible translation. Gary wanted to use them in his educational outreach at the Discovery Center and elsewhere, but many were old (some in Word 94), poorly formatted and poorly written, some in Australianese (Gary lived in Australia for a number of years and married an Australian girl). They all needed to be thoroughly edited, both for readability and Word formatting.

I brought the files home on a flash drive and spent the following year working on them, emailing them back to Gary as I finished them. I thoroughly enjoyed the work, and when they were all completed I asked Gary how else I might be of use to him or WBT in general. The upshot of that was that I have now been assigned as a volunteer writer/editor in the Advancement Department of WBT.

That is the group of 80-some people concerned with "advancing" the work of WBT through fund-raising, promotion, advertising and the like. I am a part of a small sub-group of that department, five of us, who write and edit reports that come in from the field and which are used in the advancement efforts. In January of this year Ann and I flew to Orlando for a week to meet the others in the group and for my orientation for my new job. So far it has been great. Not only am I doing something I totally enjoy, I can do it "remotely," that is by email from my home in Washington State. This is not unusual. Three others in our sub-group also live well beyond the Orlando area. Another exciting aspect of this work is that the reports we receive are absolutely current, right up-to-the-minute.

I am so grateful to God for leading me into this most important and very rewarding work. Regarding the end times the Bible teaches us that "the gospel must first be preached to all nations." (Mark 13:10). The work of WBT in translating the Scripture into the heart languages of Bible-less people around the world is making that goal reachable. It is exciting to be an integral part of that effort.

Canadian Section Report:

Wayne Borthwick, VA7GF

The following report was received from **Chuck Winter**, **N7AAG** and his e-mails with Wayne.

Hi Chuck,

Thank you for your prayers. We spent Monday & Tuesday in Guatemala City working at TGN on the Omnitronix transmitter. After multiple problems we got it up and running and we immediately headed out for Chiquimula, even though travel here is dangerous in the evening. Got there at 2 am Wednesday morning and after a short night and breakfast headed out the transmitter site.

Lots of work to do there yet. The last two days have been hampered by slow acquisition of needed materials and the tools to work with but by this evening the complete ground system is in, the 3x8 in. tubing link coupled coils wound and mounted and the transmitter hooked up to the power. Tomorrow will work on putting the antenna together. Stringing it is going to be a challenge as it stretches over a gully with houses and a church underneath.

We appreciate your prayers and those of the guys on the net.


Hi All,

Just got back to my hosts house here in Chiquimula, Guatemala after a great day with answers to prayer.

First of all you may notice I am not back in Canada. I had to delay my flight due to slow progress here on this end, so am now scheduled to be back on November 2. As it turned out getting things done here in Chiquimula takes time due to lack of parts, transportation, flat tires, running out of gas, you get the picture. But the Guatemalans take it all in stride and do their best to go the extra mile for you. Needless to say I have been pampered here and will probably be a couple of pounds heavier than when I went.

The station is on the air on the new antenna, an extended pair of half wave collinear elements end fed from a match box about six feet up from the base of the 12m tower at one end. Yesterday I had two problems, too much RF between the transmitter and the studio that motor boated the transmitter audio and a link coupled coil that didn't have quite enough coupling to get the SWR down below about a 1.2:1, not bad for a ham TX but the limit for a this solid state broadcast TX. So I went back to basics and improvised a way to measure the antenna feed point impedance and lone behold it turned out to be 50 - j120, considerably lower than the NEC simulation I had run. So after some intense computer times this morn with PSPICE and Wheelers formula for L it came out that a tapped L to ground would

match very nicely. After figuring out tap turns we went out to the site and hooked up the 12 in. diameter coil and voila it was very close. So after sliding the taps a few inches we had virtually zero reflected power, PTL. The 3x8 in. diameter copper tubing coil is grounded so will protect the transmitter better from lightning energy although I would have preferred the better isolation from the link coupled coil. As for the RF problem in the audio, I took down a long power cable to the far tower that feed a beacon light, because I feared it was interacting with the antenna, as it paralleled the whole length of it and sometimes quite close. When we fired up the transmitter the RF in the audio problem was gone, another PTL.

So the 1Kw transmitter is fired up nicely at 500w carrier out, the match coil doesn't even warm and the signal was heard in Spain last night. Thanks for your prayers, the people here are very appreciative of the help and Edgar the station founder is overjoyed. Still have some work to do on the audio in the studio. This is a low budget station so there were a lot of things to clean up in the studio that I didn't know about such as grounding and electric power. We have tried for three days now to get an electrician to fix the neutral to the station. When I got here we had up to 138v on one side while the other was 105v. Every time you turned on the soldering gun the lights would get brighter because they were on the other side. Right now I have connected the antenna ground to the power line neutral at the transmitter-antenna and balanced the voltages quite a bit by running the neutral current through the earth back to the transformer!! At least we know we have a fairly low impedance ground for antenna efficiency purposes, hi hi.

Well, I won't ramble on more here but if you want to give send a signal report the web site is http://www.radioverdad.org. Frequency is 4052.5KHz and hours are 11 to 06UTC (I think). Thanks so much for your prayers. The Gospel is going out now in one more way.



1 Corinthians 2:9 NLT Greetings from Mindanao! Hope things are going well for all of you in ARMS.

We're experiencing cool weather here-in the upper 70's in the mornings and warming to the high 80's in the afternoon. But the hot weather is on its way. It will really start warming up in March, and April through June which are usually very hot months. My brothers in Minnesota keep us informed concerning the snow and cold there. It sounds as if there has been lots of snow this year!

Gloria and I are in the finishing stretch of our time serving in the Philippines. Our plans, Lord be willing, will be to return to the U.S. in July of 2012 and then officially retire from World-Venture in early 2013. I'll be 67 in June, 2012 so we feel this is the time we should make the move back home. The next 16 months will be exceptionally busy and challenging for us.

We're in the process of developing our leadership here to be able to take the helm when we leave, and putting into place all the systems that are necessary to ensure that Hope Mountain will continue to be self-sustaining and the vision for it to become a Center for Transformation that will impact Mindanao with the Gospel of Jesus Christ will move forward. We'd sure appreciate your prayers during this time of transition for our leaders and staff and for us. Often we feel overwhelmed by all that needs to be accomplished, but we realize that we must simply trust the Lord day by day. Blaan Audio New Testament Update:

We have received word that *Faith Comes by Hearing* has finished mixing the audio text of the Koronadal Blaan New Testament with the sound effects. This is not invasive to the listening but rather enhances the text. Examples would be crowd noises at Jesus' appearance before Pilate or the sounds of wind blowing during the storm on the Sea of Galilee. After that, the New Testament audio version was put onto the Proclaimer players.

Today many Blaans have cell phones, some have internet access, and some are even on Facebook. Seems amazing, but we even get e-mails from them.


Communication, Data, & Satellites:

Bill, Leon, and Galen are testing a satellite data connection. In the foreground is an amazing tool of modern technology. About the size of a small computer, this is actually a satellite terminal. The flat "lid" is the antenna which is pointed toward a satellite that is in a stable, geosynchronous orbit. Once the terminal finds the satellite no more movement is needed as the satellite never changes its position. The subscription communi-



cation service we buy satellite access uses the Broadband Global Area Network (or BGAN). With this technology, mother tongue translators are able to receive detailed help from linguistic consultants who are working with them via the Internet to speed the day when they have God's Word in their heart language.



A graveside funeral service was held at 2:00 pm Friday afternoon, November 5, 2010, Woodland Baptist Church Cemetery.




