On the Lighter Side


Greetings in Christ’s name from the Pacific Northwest.

“QUIET PLEASE!” A sound of muffled voices is hear, then a flood of dots and dashes fills the room as station W8ZRL of McKinley high school, Cedar Rapids, Iowa goes on the air.

The main objective of the club is to acquaint its members with the theory and practice of radio in its many fields, and to help the members to get their amateur operators' licenses from the government.

Starting only las year with only one licensed amateur operator, the club drafted its own constitution, providing for election of officers and rules of procedure. Now the club boasts of four licensed operators, called “hams.”

The first operator and president of McKinley's club was your reporter, who received his license and call “W9YWL” last October. A former member of the Roosevelt School Radio Club, Tom Ecklund, “W9AXN” recently joined the McKinley club. ***Francis Finck, “WØQCB”, received his license last Wednesday.*** Other members are working on completing the licensing requirements.

The boys have built an experimental transmitter, but a more powerful one is now under construction. Morse code practice and discussion of the fundamentals of radio are covered at every meeting in the Technical Foundations conference room, on the fourth floor of the McKinley school building. Meetings are usually scheduled for every Thursday at 7 o'clock.

The amateurs exchange greetings and cement friendship begun over radio communication and “Ham” conventions held in various cities every year. Not only have the country's “hams” built good will among themselves, but they have been of service to their country in time of distress.

Hard Times? By ARMS Member Dennis Jones KKØDJ

I have been hearing from friends, neighbors, family and fellow Hams their consternation regarding the changes that the COVID-19 Virus restrictions have beset them and their families with. As I hear these and wonder out loud to my wife Nola, she reminds me that most are just venting their frustration in the restrictions and would like to be back in a normal set of life circumstances.

In relation to the complaints and such I have been hearing, I of course respond first by adding these folks to my prayer list that the Lord will help them through this trying time. Some have asked why I seem to be unfazed by this dilemma and that's what I am writing this for!

Life sometimes brings changes that change us as people. As I look back upon my life and I recall the utter desperation of separation that Navy life brought, I especially recall that during my training at the U.S. Navy Submarine School in Groton, CT. The school was quite difficult for me academically as well as the psychological testing that is done. I didn't take the time then to assess what being onboard a vessel that can stay at sea for greater than 90 days submerged might be like.

My time in the Navy was B.C. (Before Christ) as the Holy Spirit did not open my mind and soul to the Truth until I was 35 years of age. So read this with that in mind.

Upon graduation from Submarine School, I was given orders to report aboard the U.S.S. Haddo (SSN 604) that was presently at the end of it's reactor core replacement and ship updating in Pascagoula, MS at the Ingalls Shipyard. I reported aboard and was relieved to hear it would be a couple of months before we put to sea. This had dual considerations though. Yes, I had at least some time to get ready to prepare myself for my first undersea experience.

Let me skip to the event that began the experience. One thing that is done to "newbies" at least at the time I was in was to have us (me) be the last down the hatch prior to submerging the boat. I thought I was prepared for this and indeed there was a cadre of my fellow shipmates awaiting my quick travel down the ladder as the boat submerged. I

remained topside until the last minute and as I closed the outer hatch door there was water coming in at a pretty good rate. I got that hatch closed and was struggling a bit to get the inner hatch closed but no one dared to help me. This was a test of the mettle of new submariners and they didn't want to disallow my competing it. I was finally able to swing the inner hatch closed and dogged it down with the spinning wheel on the hatch door. I leapt from the top run of the ladder I was on and hit the removable aluminum plate floor with a thunk. As I stood up, applause was granted this new submariner in that I 'passed' muster.

Those fellow shipmates knew that my insides were torn up and my brain was on alert as I had just closed myself and my shipmates into a steel coffin. The truth is you do indeed get used to it, but that first closing of the hatch is key to success.

How does all of this relate to how we're doing in how we traverse through this COVID-19 virus lockdown? Well, I didn't know myself until I read an article a gentleman wrote online regarding the fact that there is at least one group of people who are not suffering the same as others during this time of lockdown. He said that nuclear submariners were that group.

As a qualified submariner, I did become accustomed to living in quarters that define the word close in its most minuscule variation. Until I was qualified, I slept in the torpedo room as all pre-qualified submariners do. I slept on the bottom rack right next to a nuclear tipped Subroc torpedo. I slept with excessive loud noises and the lights on all the time. Further, I was standing watch 8 hours on and 8 hours off. Learning to sleep in that 8 hours off was quite the challenge!

Hard Times

Along with my new accommodations, I worked in a small radio room that was approximately 8' long and about 3' wide complete with transmitters, crypto equipment, amplifiers, receivers, teletype machines and a full range of publications to keep up.

Once qualified, my sleeping quarters were moved to a top rack in the bow compartment just above the diesel equipment space which was visited hourly by the watch who is responsible to check various things in that space. A sleeping space or as the Navy calls it, a “rack” in a 593 class boat such as the Haddo, is a 6' long by 30” deep by 28” tall square aluminum cavern with a thin mattress and a lumpy pillow. I learned to be thankful for that old mattress and pillow and especially the thin curtains to provide some privacy. However, I didn't learn to always look when I was arising from sleep. One morning (which could be anytime really on a submarine) I rose to take the watch. I swung out of my rack and as I was in habit of doing, swung down to land on the deck. I just happened to awake at the time that the watch shipmate was down in the diesel equipment space. As he normally did, he left the hatch open. I dropped down to the deck below my intended landing place and found myself crumpled up in the diesel equipment space with the watch stander who was laughing so hard he couldn't stop. Yep, didn't do that again!

The boat's premier outing after the shipyard period was to the Exuma Sound in the Bahama Islands. This is a nearly fully enclosed very deep large sound in which submarines do their post-yard periods or new boats going to sea for the first time. Various tests are run for various reasons to make the boat fully ready for war at any moment.

The one test that we succeeded in completing without incident taught me a resolve that I believe prepared me to withstand this time of voluntary lockdown. That test was a full speed run (submarines are faster than any other Naval Vessel) at test depth (which is an undisclosed percentage less than crush depth. Having come through that and then stepping on mother earth with glee at the sub base in Charleston, SC gave me a feeling of accomplishment that nothing has yet to exceed.

Hasn't there been something or some event in your life that seemed insurmountable and impossible? If not, then this voluntary sequestration could be your life's test that all of your future life events might be measured. The key here is to keep yourself from being pulled away or pulled down by events or circumstances you are presently going through, have been through, or will go through. Jesus is our Lord. He is our Savior. He is our God. He is our Spirit within us. Imagine now what it would be like to have gone through a similar life circumstance as I did *without* Him and REJOICE that you will NEVER have to do that if you know Him.

Look back at the past month of our life with the COVID-19 virus and take account of what you have had to do and how well you have traversed through it. It might get harder in the coming days, months but hopefully not years... so we all need to keep our present course toward Him and weather the storms as best we can because He is with us and will be there on the “other side” as well. In this time also encourage those around you that are struggling. Especially those whom are your brothers and sisters in Christ.

We are blessed with freedom like no other country and that freedom comes at a price. Many died to give freedom to us. Let us revere their sacrifice of life for us and sacrifice our freedoms in part for a short time. Adhere to what our leaders ask of us and remember that doing so will save the lives of our neighbors. Remember... our second greatest commandment is to love them as yourself. This is a serious disease that can kill many in a few days or hours. Don't let the enemy dissuade you from persevering and seeking personal freedoms instead. We're all in this together brothers and sisters... let us press on and hold His hand through it. He will get us through it!
