

My morning walks now include taking my son's dog, Boogie, to the Park.





Don has been a faithful Net Control for the Eastern Section of ARMS since the 60's.






Howard King, WA7SXM, of Longview, Washington, has been checking in on a regular basis. Propagation has improved and he puts a good signal into the Yakima Valley.

Planning is going on for Ethnic Radio stations in Bolivia and Peru. The Lord willing, Ray hopes to travel to Colombia, Peru and Bolivia this year if things open up again.

One of the greatest blessings of ministry in these countries in the last 45 years is the wonderful friends that we have. That makes it all worth it. We are indeed "co-laborers in Christ."

Ray's eye surgeries for cataract/glaucoma went very well. The pressure is down and with glasses he sees much better than before. We have both had the COVID vaccinations.

It has been over a year since we have seen our boys and families. Both have had members come down with COVID. Our oldest grandson planned to be married this month but postponed until July. We look forward to being with everyone for this celebration.

Papua-New Guinea

MAF Technology Services PNG was launched in 1956, five years after MAF first established its operations in Papua New Guinea. David Spendlove, one of MAF's first technicians, says: "In the olden days, before computers, satellite, mobiles, solar power, emails and WIFI, if a mission wanted to send a message to Australia, it could take days before they got a reply."

It became clear that PNG needed a reliable communications network. Initially, the team set up a hydro-electric power station to transmit radio from Rugli in the country's Western Highlands.

In addition to spreading the Gospel, MAF's technology has proved critical in life-saving emergency situations. When MAF installed a high frequency radio and alarm system for *The Hands of Rescue Foundation* last year, Dr Barry Kirby's work was transformed enabling him and his team to reduce drastically maternal mortality across the 600 islands of Milne Bay Province.

MAF recently broadcast a live COVID-19 Q&A with Dr James Gahare to some 80 radio stations throughout PNG.

Words From The Editor A Note from the Secretary/Treasurer


ARMS membership runs from June 1 of one year to May 31 of the following year.
