## ROGER STUBBE HC1RT INJURED IN ECUADOR

ARMS member, Roger Stubbe W $\varnothing$ ZMU/HClRT, was injured last November by an electrical explosion at the transmitter building of missionary station HCJB in Pife, Ecuador.

Roger and Ray Isbelle were changing a breaker in an electrical panel. It was of foreign make and they were exchanging it for an American-made breaker. Something didn't fit properly, and in the juggling process, one of the copper wires became detached and fell across the 480 volts with several thousand amps. Roger said it was like 50 ace welders all turned on at once in front of their faces.

Both men received burns, but Ray was not so bad and was dismissed in a couple of days from the HCJB hospital in Quite where they had been taken. Roger was burned on the face but glasses protected his eyes. His glasses were ruined. The most severe burns were on the left shoulder when his shirt caught on fire. His upper left arm also was burned.

The news of the catastrophe was received in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, by Francis Finck WøQCB, who reported it on the Midwest ARMS net Saturday morning. The accident had occurred the previous Tuesday.

On Saturday evening Jay Sudenga KøGAZ, ARMS member at George, Iowa, made contact with Roger via the Halo Net through Mac McCloud HClMX. Mac, who is also with HCJB, called the hospital and soon Roger's father, Mr. Enno Stubbe, of George, Iowa, was talking with his son directly by HAM RADIO. K $\varnothing$ GAZ then called Roger's optometrist in Worthington, Minnesota, to order a new pair of glasses which he received by airmail within one week.

While Roger was hospitalized for several weeks, he had a transmitter in his room and a beam installed so he could talk with his friends and family stateside. He is now doing fine following skin grafts and is back at work where he is engineer and superintendent in charge at the Pife site.

We praise the Lord for Amateur Radio and the help it gives to loved ones in times like these.
