It has been suggested by some who have seen it, that by adding the usual QSL format under the ARMS information, you can use it as a QSL card and provide a point of ARMS contact at the same time.



Let me introduce to you WB5BRD Ray Hooper--the man (Ham) in the picture. Ray made the effort to pose for us in a sitting position, but he operates his station while lying down and this is just a part of his inspiring story.

Like most of us Ray began life by being born. Unlike most of us this event, for Ray, took place in Mena, AR which is his present QTH. At the age of twelve he went through the formality of joining a church and being baptized, but now, as he

looks back on those days, he realizes that he was not a true believer at that time--there was no real change in his life.

As a young man he joined the U.S. Navy and became a typical swabby-going with the crowd and living a worldly life. One day he regained consciousness in a Navy hospital following a very serious operation to repair a severed blood vessel. The little WAVE nurse told him that he had died three times the preceding night during surgery, but each time the doctors had managed to bring him back to life. "When she told me that," says Ray, "I knew that if they hadn't revived me, I would have gone straight to HELL." That's when he began to realize that God was working with him. Under the conviction of the Holy Spirit he cried himself to sleep many nights. Still he held back and resisted, because "I was afraid I couldn't live a Christian life for God."

Several months later he made a blind date with a YL who said she would date Ray if he would go to church with her. Ray went to church with her and again the conviction of the Spirit came upon him. During the altar service he hurried to the altar and turned his life over to GOD. "I'll never forget the load that rolled off my heart that morning," explains Ray. It is not surprising to learn that a few months later that young lady became his XYL. They were married on Mothers Day in the Church of the Nazarene in Hastings, Nebraska.

After his discharge from the Navy he went to work for Swift & Co. and later was transferred to Ft. Smith, AR. As a young couple they helped in the church and worked with young people. After a time he met a salesman who was a Gideon. This man sold Ray on the worthwhile work of the Gideons and encouraged him to join the Gideons International. His service with the Gideons helped him very much in a spiritual way and launched him into Christian witnessing. In time he served as chaplain and treasurer for his Gideon group.

While at work on January 10th, 1965, a piece of heavy equipment began to topple and Ray attempted to hold it. The result was that Ray sustained severe back injuries—the nerves on the left side were severed and the spinal cord was nearly severed. For eight days there was little hope, according to the doctors, for his survival. Christian friends formed a prayer chain and 24 hours around the clock prayer was being offered for his recovery. Praise the Lord, God brought him through and after several surgeries he was able to walk a little. In 1969 he fell and again injured his back when some of the fusions were torn loose. So much arthritis had set in that the specialists said they couldn't do anything more than give him drugs to combat the pain. He is to sit only briefly and a car ride of any distance must be done while lying down.

Lying down all the time became tiresome and doing nothing but reading all day became boring. With this, discouragement and depression began to creep in. Then a fellow who lived 6 or 8 blocks away began to visit Ray. The fellow talked to Ray about Ham Radio and soon gave him a manual and a code oscillator. Two weeks later he gave Ray the Novice test. Ray passed the theory portion and also the code at seven words per minute. "I was thrilled to no ends," says Ray. The fellow set up a rig and an antenna and Ray went to work. As he began working people from all over, requests started coming for QSL cards from Arkansas. The thought occurred to Ray, "why not put scripture verses on them?" And so he did. In seven months he had sent scripture verses into all the 50 states. By the time he received his General Ticket this past February, he had sent cards with II Chronicles 7:14 and Romans 8:28 into 76 countries of the world. "Praise the Lord," says Ray, "now I have sent them into over one hundred countries" countries."

It all started out as an ordinary contact with a VE7--but as the QSO continued Ray learned that the man thought of himself as an atheist. Ray witnessed to him on the air and then sent along his QSL card. Three months later Ray heard him on the air and contacted him again. After a friendly QSO Ray closed with another witness. A few days following the second contact, Ray received a letter from the VE7's XYL thanking him for his witness. She said her husband had started going to church with her and the children. She reported that during the altar call he appeared to be under the conviction of the Holy Spirit and had just stood and gripped the seat until his knuckles turned white. She asked Ray to join her and Christian friends all over in praying for her husband. Recently Ray has received another letter from the man's XYL. She reported that she had given birth to a child that the doctors said could not possibly live. She said, "Bro. Ray, I witnessed to the doctors all through the delivery and kept telling them that God was with us and that I and the baby would be o.k." Now the baby is growing like a weed and is as strong as a little mule. As wonderful as all this has been, she went on to report an even greater miracle--her husband has now surrendered his life to God. "Praise His wonderful Name," exclaims Ray, "if my afflictions were for just this one soul, it is worth it all. But I'll keep on witnessing and sending cards as long as God lets me live."

Ray lives on a small farm in a 14' x 70' mobile home. He has a lovely little lake about one hundred yards in front of his home. Every once in a while, the XYL goes out and catches some nice fish from this lake. His youngest son is a licensed Assembly of God minister. He and his wife are working in Oklahoma City. Ray's oldest son has been missing since August 2, 1972. Please pray for him.
