
Dear desire of every nation, Joy of every longing heart.




PRAISE 'N PRAYER

When does a light bulb burn out? Now there's a question that dates back to Thomas Edison. Of course the answer is, "when it happens."

One of the larger structures that belongs to the IT Wireless dept. where I work at JAARS, is a 90 foot



poking things up into the sky.
In the day time,

the antenna tower is quite visible, but at night it could be missed by a pilot approaching the JAARS landing strip. Thus we

have two bright red lights that come on at sunset and go off at sunrise. When these light bulbs burn out, as is expected occasionally, we waste no time in getting them replaced.

This is somewhat involved with the use of a manlift machine once the tower is lowered to about 20 feet. The first check was on whether the photo sensor mounted on a platform at 20 feet was still working



okay. My job was to check that the light control circuit was working, and since it was functioning properly, my boss, Bill, and another man, Gerry, used the manlift to change the burned out bulbs.

Christmas is beginning to happen for Sally's 5th grade students. Fifth grade is given the major speaking

and singing parts in a big Christmas musical, which means a lot of time is devoted to rehearsals. This is something Sally is used to, since the school at Bagabag in the Philippines did the same thing every year. In the midst of all the rehearsals, Sally is trying to squeeze in some science lessons. Just now



the students are learning about light, both heavenly and earthly.
