Empire State Games 2004 What Do I Do?

I know some of you are hesitant to volunteer for a communications assignment during the 2004 Empire State Games because you don't know what the task involves. Well here is the skinny. As a registered communicator (the result of filling out the ESG 2004 application) you will be identified by your distinctive colored cap and Tee-Shirt (supplied at no charge by ESG). Armed with your 2004 ESG venue pass, HT,

The MS Walk is always a fun event and helping out is a good way to spend a Sunday Morning. You get some time in the sun and fresh air (such as it is in Binghamton) and an opportunity to practice your skills in Tactical Communications. If you have never done spare charged battery, headphones, BNC/TNC/SMA-to-PL239 adapter, note pad, pencil, and whatever personal items you might require (sunglasses, sun screen, water, bug spray, ear plugs, etc.) you'll arrive at your assigned venue about a half hour before the start of your shift. You'll identify yourself to the venue director as his ham radio communicator (record his name and time of contact in your note book for later reference). Locate your operating position per the venue director's instruction or lacking such direction locate yourself in his/her immediate vicinity and never out of his/her sight. You are at the venue director's service to handle emergency communications and other logistic communications that may become necessary as requested by the venue director or ESG control.

At a few venues, (as determined by a pre-event technical survey) you may be able to monitor the ESG 2004 control frequency without being able to effectively communicate. At those locations there will be an installed outside antenna and its termination point will be identified to you so that you can interconnect to it as may be required (that's why the adapter is so During the communication event the important). communicator is to be seen (Re: the colored cap and shirt) but not heard — thus the need for headphones or earplug so as not to disturb those around you as well as to improve your reception since many of the venues are This might be a good time to experiment noisv. developing a noise canceling mike. A single layer of sponge type material over the microphone will greatly reduce background noise without destroying your communication audio quality.

Oh, one more thing. You may possibly learn something about the sport in progress at your venue, make a few new friends, and actually have a good time providing this very visible public service. Why not pick up an application and get on the communicator list today? It really is a lot of fun. — Jack, WB2GHH

New Directions in Communications

We understand through the Amateur Press that some Hams have been experimenting with new types of modulation in an effort to overcome the shortcomings inherent in Single Sideband (SSB) communication.

One of the more promising trials in this direction has been heard on the Amateur Bands and although technical details are sketchy some details have emerged. This brief article summarizes what is known of this new and promising avenue of experimentation.

Single Sideband Modulation — as most of us know — is an effective mode for communications, but it suffers from several serious deficiencies the chief of which is distortion and a loss of fidelity, especially in the presence of atmospheric noise (static). Moreover, when used near the Maximum Usable Frequency (MUF) or during frequency-dependent propagation anomalies portions of a SSB signal may be absorbed or distorted thus hampering effective communication. An additional (though admittedly minor) problem occurs when through accident or carelessness the wrong Sideband is selected for transmission or reception.

A new technique of Modulation offers relief of all the above problems. Based on analysis of signals modulated using this new technique it appears that certain well-known principles of redundancy and errorcorrection used in Digital Networks have been expanded to the realm of Analog Voice. Specifically, it appears that an ordinary SSB signal can be subjected to analysis and inverted thus presenting a mirror-image of the original Sideband. This signal is then input into a second SSB Exciter which is locked at a frequency above the original LSB signal (or below the original USB signal). The two signals are then transmitted (in phase) several kilohertz apart and can be considered Symmetrical Reflected Sidebands (SRSs).

Thus far there seems little benefit in this mode, but the really clever insight is to transmit an additional (third) Reference Continuous Wave (RCW)tuned to the average of the Integrated Sideband Frequencies (ISFs). The RCW is easily boosted in power since it is — after all — Continuous Wave and no Power-Averaging takes place. The RCW thus provides a fixed reference against which one or the other of the SRSs may be averaged and demodulated. Moreover, effects of fading and propagation may be minimized by careful selection of the SRS selected for averaging.

The results thus far seem encouraging although we note that the expense and complexity of maintaining three separate Radio-Frequency Exciters locked closely in frequency and the addition of the Analysis Circuitry required to generate the SRSs will likely preclude the use of this new technique by any but the most dedicated Amateur (and possibly Commercial) users. *adapted from the Journal of the Bialystock Institute*
