#### **Bad News**

On Tuesday, 7 September the Town of Binghamton held an Informational Meeting on our request to use the Town Property on Hance Road. Unfortunately the meeting did not go well. Several of the nearby property owners in the immediate area objected and they mobilized support among their neighbors. The objections were the usual ranging from cell-phone and TV interference to our towers being an eyesore and a hazard to aviation. Although these objections could be met and argued on a reasonable level (and believe me we tried), there was a lot of emotion wrapped around the issue and reason did not make much headway.

More significantly, environmental concerns were raised and it was suggested that BARA would be responsible for any "mess" uncovered while excavating the foundations for our towers. Since the site is a former landfill with a soil cap it is unlikely, but not impossible that something might be uncovered while excavating and BARA certainly does not wish to assume responsibility for a mess created by someone else.

The Officers, Directors, and Members present at the meeting deserve thanks for their presentations and defense of our request. They worked hard in a difficult situation. A Public Hearing on the matter will be held on 21 September at 7:01 PM, but the situation is not very promising. — Thanks to Bob, KC2DSS, and Paul, N2NCB, for the details in this report

This month we recall 9/11 and how the actions of a determined few disrupted this country and brought about the death of many thousands of innocence. But if death and destruction marked that day, sacrifice and dedication marked the response. Among the responders were many of our number and it seems appropriate to take a moment and consider our role in Emergency

And this is where we fit into the picture. As

Communications.

Ham Radio may well be the finest hobby in the world, but much though we enjoy our avocation, our purpose is much more than a Hobby or a Technical Challenge. There are reasons why Ham Radio is special, reasons that go beyond the pleasure of communicating with others, the excitement of DX, and the thrill of Radio. Those who are not familiar with Hams need to understand what sets us apart and we ourselves sometimes need a gentle reminder.

Communication is vital to our world. The flow of information permits resources to be moved where they are needed most and assistance to be rendered wherever required. From things as mundane as moving tires from a warehouse to a service station to crucial police, fire, and ambulance calls, our daily activities are supported by a network of communications. At times this system is slightly disrupted by weather and we feel some inconvenience and mild annoyance. At other times power failures, ice storms, floods, or hurricanes cause extended and more troubling disruptions. As Hams we are trained (and expected) to step into the breach and provide a backup for disrupted systems whenever needed. Today — with the possibility of terrorism very real and very present — the possibility and repercussions of such an event become more significant and require greater vigilance and preparation on our part.

It's true that technologies like cell-phones, personal wireless, the Internet, and cable television provide alternate paths to traditional wired and wireless systems, but these new technologies are also subject to failures and are themselves fully loaded in normal circumstances. Likewise, without a plan for integrating technologies into a functioning and interconnected system we are left with tools, but no abilities.

Amateur Radio Operators we have at least a passing

familiarity with various modes of communication, but — more importantly, we are not bound to a single path. Just having the ability to operate on HF and VHF bands immediately allows for local, regional, national, and international communications that can be integrated as quickly as you can say "Net Control"

That is significant. One of the lessons driven painfully home by 9/11 and other events is that while government and private agencies are able to communicate at the agency level, inter-communication between agencies can be difficult or even impossible. Incompatible equipment or protocols and the very nature of license grants to agencies tend to restrict wireless inter-communication because frequencies are assigned and often "locked". Un-channelized Frequency Agility is not their norm. It is for us!

The nature of our resources is also significant: Government and Commercial users can literally pour money into their systems and use raw power to hold the solar gods and sprites of propagation at bay. On the other hand, a DXer (even one running the legal limit) has to know how to "work the bands" and squeeze the best advantage out of less than desirable conditions. In an emergency and under jury-rigged conditions our adaptability and resourcefulness might make the difference between communications and silence.

Herein is a key: agencies assemble at a known point and are dispatched as required. If communications fail, this process is disrupted. As Hams our first instinct is to troll the airwaves: to check the Emergency Frequencies and scan for the nets that form. As the networks form we can act from where we are or dispatch to wherever we are needed.

Insurance is something that the prudent person buys — not because he or she knows it will be needed, but because it might be needed. So it is with us: The "big one" may never happen, but if it does we will be needed (and needed badly). For that day (and may it never come), we must prepare.
