

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Its vacation time in the Great Northeast. Hedy (AA2MU) and I just got back from a two week stay at Kring Point State Park on the St. Lawrence river in Jefferson county, NY. The WX was great, 90 F and sun during the day, clear and star lit at night. The days were great for swimming and fishing and the nights were great for....you guessed it....RADIO BY CAMPFIRE LIGHT!

Going on a vacation? Take your radio gear. Make your vacation a "mini DXpedition". Dipoles pack light and are easy to string up almost anywhere. No trees around? Try a base loaded vertical on your car's bumper. Not an HFer? Take a portable 2 element quad and small power amp to work VHF/UHF from your car. Just don't go without! No room for your full size HF rig or VHF rig? Take a QRP rig. With a little hunting and pecking you can work more than your share of contacts.

In our particular case we strung up a 40 mtr and 20 mtr dipole. The 40 mtr dipole was also used for 15 mtrs with a little help from a tuner. The first week DX was kind of slow. After a few nights of a downhill slide on the number of contacts I found myself switching over to 10 mtrs while still on the 40 mtr dipole just to see if I could hear any local activity. To my surprise 10 mtrs was open for single and double skip propagation - at midnight! I heard South America stations working stateside. Too bad I didn't have my 10 mtr dipole strung up; but 10 mtrs is dead right now - it'll probably be dead again by tomorrow.

After the next day's fishing I checked 10 mtrs again and found it still WIDE OPEN - the band was jammed. I grabbed by dipole - the one I SHOULD have put up the first day with my 40 and 20 mtr dipoles - and stayed busy for 4 hours straight. I literally ran out of ink in my pen trying to write down all the contacts I had been working (plus got a sore set of fingers from so much writing). The best part was that this was repeated 4 days in a row staying

HOT (the 10 mtr band that is!) from about lunch time to about midnight or 1:00 AM in the morning! A real chance of pace for me was that it was all on PHONE - no 30 wpm CW thru heavy QRN.

Hedy seemed to be more interested in S'MORES on the campfire until some stateside started calling for 10-10 #s (Hedy is a 10-10 member). To all you OM out there...NEVER give your mic up to a YL under these conditions while expecting to get your mic back!!

All we have to do now to make next summer's vacation even better is figure out how to keep Hedy on the air while she is sliding around on water skis at 30 MPH!

Remember - vacation means radio FUN!

NEW PHONE NUMS FOR ARRL

Some telephone numbers have changed at HQ (although the previous numbers also will work for some time). The important changes are: main number, 203-594-0200; main facsimile, 203-594-0259; circulation department facsimile, 203-594-0303; comptroller facsimile, 203-594-0298. All "800" numbers remain the same.

LICENSE INFO UPDATE

Do you know someone who is anxiously awaiting a brand new (first) call sign? Recent FCC rule changes allow new hams to start operating as soon as the license is granted, and the Commission is now making licensing transactions available on a daily basis (see June 1995 QST's Exam Info column on page 115).

Unfortunately, the FCC's phone lines are often busy, so tell that eager new ham to call ARRL at 1-800-326-3942, between 8 AM and 4 PM Eastern Time, to easily and quickly find out their new call sign.

If the VEC is, like the ARRL/VEC, using electronic filing, licensing information will likely be available 7 to 10 days after the exam.

HAM RADIO SHOW ON THE RADIO!

* The syndicated AM radio show "The Ham Radio & More," now in its fifth year, has gone "worldwide" via short-wave broadcast station WWCR.

The show on WWCR is tape delayed, and aired twice per week, Mondays at 0700 UTC on 7435 kHz, and Saturdays at 2100 UTC on 12,160 kHz.

The show is also available on satellite Spacenet 3, transponder 9, 6.8 audio, and on 41 local AM radio affiliates of the Talk America Radio Network. More information can be had by calling the originating station, KFNN, in Phoenix (602-241-1510).
