

BOOK REVIEW

Between Silk and Cyanide by Leo Marks

Although this might seem a strange title for a book reviewed in a Radio Club Newsletter, the subtitle "A Codemaker's War 1941-1954" adds a bit more detail and the content is fascinating. The author, Leo Marks, joined the British Special Operations Executive (SOE) in 1942 as a "code expert" after first failing to make the cut for the famous group working at Bletchley Park. Bletchley's loss was SOE's gain and Mr. Marks weaves an exciting and sometimes humorous tale of his work in London and the agents and missions with which he was involved.

Because he had overall responsibility for codes, Marks had an overview of activities in many theaters of the war

but his relatively "low" position in the hierarchy of OSS permitted him access to the day-to-day details of activity. Although Marks was not a communications expert, he developed an acute awareness of the danger that surrounded the Morse Operators behind enemy lines and his side of the story will be quite interesting to anyone with an interest in radio.

Overall, readers will find this book a pleasant and diverting read with enough excitement to keep the pages turning and enough history and detail to challenge the mind.

Between Silk and Cyanide (ISBN 0-684-86422-3) is published by the Free Press and lists at \$27.50.
