Space Station Contact a Success!

On Friday, November 16th students from St. James Middle School in Johnson City made contact with the International Space Station through the Club Station at Kopernik Observatory.

By all accounts the activity was a success and you could feel the excitement in the room as the footprint of the station came within range and the crew at Kopernik made their final tests and adjustments.

John Kray, KA2CNG, was the main force behind arranging the contact and began the process about three years ago. Richard Crow, N2SPI, handled the technical details of operating the radios and working the students through the contact. Jerry Babcock, KG2FY assisted with setup, logistics, and a myriad of other duties. Many other amateurs helped with assistance and support. Ford Drake, AB2HS, arranged links to the SVARA VHF and UHF machines so that the contact could be heard throughout the valley.

A large audience of students, parents, and local amateurs joined the St. James students who had studied and prepared for the big moment. Many people throughout the Valley took time off from their morning work and activities to listen in and some invited non-amateurs to listen in with them.

Although the contact lasted only ten minutes (including a last-minute frequency change due to interference) the students were able to ask a number of questions. Amateur Radio also received some favorable exposure and we applaud the team that made this contact a happen!

Oliver Sacks is best known as a writer on the strange and something wondrous things that happen within the human mind. As author he is probably best known for the book on which the movie Awakenings was based. His latest book, Uncle Tungsten, Memories of a Chemical Boyhood is a very personal memoir of his boyhood in England between the wars. Although not strictly a "radio book" it will likely awaken pleasant memories for anyone who played with batteries, chemistry sets, and wires in childhood.

Dr. Sacks was fortunate to have been born into a family of distinguished scientists and inventors. As a child his parents and relatives encouraged his interest in science and technology. One uncle in particular — Uncle "Tungsten" — was a pioneer in the design and manufacture of incandescent electric lamps and the romance of the metals used to make lamp filaments is a central theme. Sacks weaves a tale that summarizes the scientific discoveries and personalities of the 18th, 19th, and early 20th century and he writes with eloquence and feeling of a time when scientific discovery was charged with promise and unadulterated by cold war fears.

If you are looking for a good book as a Christmas gift for someone or for yourself this book is well worth checking out. *Uncle Tungsten* (ISBN 0-375-40448-1) is published by Alfred A. Knopf and is available at \$25.00.
