Tower News

At the request of the Board, Ron, AA2EQ, presented a proposal for refurbishing the 100-foot tower at the Club Shack. This tower has been up for a number of years and the Club has periodically spent money on maintenance and upkeep, however the arrangement of a tripod of telephone poles surmounted by sections of tower is showing its age and several members have suggested that the unit is coming to the end of its useful life. Ron (who is trained in Mechanical Engineering and who has climbed the existing tower many times) agreed to examine the structure and propose the steps that the Club might take to maintain a 100-foot tower.

Ron's presentation was thorough and the conclusion is that the timber members need replacement while the metal sections at the top are damaged from the torque and flexing of the tower. Although the guy-wires are sound it is not advisable to simply re-tension them because there is too much "give" between the timber and metal sections combined. Continuing current maintenance might add another three years to the life of the system, but then it would have to be replaced. After considering the condition of the system and the fact that we just renewed our lease for the hilltop, it was proposed

to allocate funds for replacement now.

The proposal is to use standard Rohn tower sections throughout and to go by the engineering specifications for a 140-foot tower although our plans are only to install a 100-foot tower. This approach allows us the opportunity to increase the height in the future, if the club desires. After discussion funds for refurbishing the Tower were included in the budget for 2002.

Esther Valky, AA2AP, Scholarship

Hedy, AA2MU, reported on the BARA Scholarship to honor Esther Valky, AA2AP, Silent Key and for many years a Club Member who inspired us as members and welcomed newcomers into our ranks. Details on the eligibility and rules for the scholarship are still being worked out, but the 2002 budget includes initial funding for this memorial.

2002 Budget Passed

Many thanks to the members who turned out for the budget discussions. Besides the Tower Allocation and the Scholarship Allocation (both mentioned previously) the bulk of the budget was for the usual operating expenses of the club. The Tower and Scholarship funding are not contained by dues and projected Hamfest revenue so the budget draws on the funds we have in the bank. There was some discussion and the budget passed with no objections and the support of the club as represented by the turnout at the meeting was heartening.

Another BARA Award

Continuing to wrap up items from the 2001 year, our president George, K2CM, presented a BARA Award for 2001 to Bill Coleman, N2BC, for the many things he has done for the club at the Shack, in running the Hamfest, and for service as an Officer and Board Member. Bill has been a fixture at BARA events for many years, but because he was (uncharacteristically) absent from the Christmas Party Jack, WB2GHH, could not present the award at that time.

ARES Notes

At the January BARA Meeting, Jack, KB2YEN, our local EC spoke briefly noting that one of his priorities is to establish an accurate ARES roster for our area. Since the current registration is badly out of date, Jack is requesting that everyone register again and we include an application with this issue of the *BARA Facts*. Emergency Service has received a lot of favorable attention since the events of September 11th and the FCC and others have gone on record with support of Amateur Radio. Please do your part to support this effort by taking

a moment to fill out the form, fold it up (it's pre-addressed), tape it closed, and stick on a stamp.

Jack also remarked that there is interest in running another exercise similar to the Y2K Preparation he coordinated in 1999. We look forward to hearing more about this in the future.

"Dolly"

From the Radio Rescuers Journal Entry #2.

Not too long ago, at the Orlando Hamcation, I happened upon a balloon type '27 triode. Just your garden variety A.C. tube. Probably dated to around 1929. It had lots of dust and some kinda smeary stuff on it, making it look really bad. I offer to pay a buck for it, and the guy behind the table says "sure."

Off I go with my little treasure to hopefully use it to give life to a rather dormant Doerle 'Regen I was reconstructing.

Old glass tubes are a funny sort of device, with a charm all their own. Mostly they are mirrored with a silvery internal coating, and I would be a liar if I told you that I knew what caused it or even what it was.

Just one of those mysteries I choose to retain as a Very simple devices they are, little more than a dim lightbulb with extra wire stuffed in to form an anode, filament, an indirectly heated cathode and a gridiron. All this is mounted internally on a single glass pillar, usually bearing the hand written mark of some unknown quality inspector. A cypher of a sort, usually a number or a number-letter combination. Locked in a vacuum of time for the life of that tube.

I wonder if they had any idea how long some of those tubes would last?

Well, after coming home, I began to work on cleaning off that tube, using dishwashing liquid and a soft cloth. The smeary stuff came off, but the dust had hardened into a thin filmy concrete which took a little elbow grease.

"Uhh-ohh", I thought as I began to hand polish off the surface: "there goes any decal or print on the envelope!" But I consoled myself with the knowledge that at least I would still have that classy silvery stuff, whatever it was.

And then I saw it! Behind the silver! There was an area in that silver coating that was very thin, exposing the central pillar of the tube. Almost like looking thru a keyhole, the silver framing the view. There, written on the pillar for all to see, a single name.

"Dolly".

No cypher, no number, no arbitrary letter, but a name! Immediately, this became no ordinary tube! It became a link to a person. I began to wonder who this person was. Did she work part time for RCA to get thru school? Did she fare well thru the Depression just about to befall her? Did she take pride in that tube as she carefully painted the five letters of her name on that tiny, tiny pillar before it was sent in for the envelope and evacuation process? Am I getting carried away?

I had a suspicion that of all the '27s in the wide world, THIS one would be among the best performing. It had to, it bore her name...and it is.

Remember, whenever you affix your name to something, that something may last well beyond your puny years. Remember too, that the performance or quality of that thing will be forever inextricably linked to you. Whatever you do, do your best.
