# Emergency Communicator Response Times Have Changed

Over the next few months we hope to see a series of articles addressing the need for Emergency Communicators and encouraging participation in this most important of Amateur Activities. Herewith is the first in the series, penned by Jack, WB2GHH.

The need for a heightened level of security now includes amateur radio volunteer communications. Why all the fuss? Well, access to a sensitive area such as a large gathering of people, communication center, weather service facility, telephone company, water works, or other "secure" place by a person who intends to cause additional mayhem or confusion in the guise of an "emergency communicator" could prove disastrous.

In areas where homeland security activities are more apparent, identification cards unique to the emergency situation and/or passage documents are issued at a marshaling point at the time of the actual emergency. Communicators who arrive to help have their identities verified via photographic means or by being personally identified by a previously cleared communicator (or other responder), are allowed access to the marshaling point. They then receive specific instructions as to their assignment and the passage document. Only those persons carrying the passage document (which may identify the specific assignment area and access duration) are allowed into controlled areas. I have had personal experience wearing a short term identification tag. By design, the printed information on the identification tag faded away in less than twenty-four hours thus eliminating the need to assure return of the identification tag to a control point or concern for later unauthorized tag use.

There has always been a requirement for background checks of RACES communicator applicants. It's possible that some future type of unified application review program will apply background checks to ARES and SKYWARN communicators since their communication assignments could be made to areas not previously considered sensitive. Then again, maintaining a communicator type relationship in RACES and ARES and SKYWARN (in addition to observer training) might lessen the administrative and security burden during times of actual deployment.

Whatever the future holds in terms of identification of communicators and access to controlled areas, I hope all able bodied amateur radio operators will continue to offer their communication services to their Emergency Coordinators and to continually test their personal communication capabilities and equipment to assure the effectiveness of communications when they have the chance to serve.

How do you do that? In the Broome County area K2DLB is ARES EC. I myself am the RACES coordinator. Check into the various nets: The Early Bid and the STAR nets (146.73) allow you to check

out the VHF gear. NYSPTEN (daily at 1800) on 3.925 is an informal net that can help get you into the traffic handling mode. Listen up on Sundays (0930 on 3.9935). The RACES message format is the same as the NTS format with an additional "authorization". This NYS wide net may be a "stiff", but listen up and check in (the BGM area is in District 4). The Cracker Net (3.921 at 1900); the "7 to 9 er" Net on (3.821 between 1900 and 2100) are great social gatherings and include stations from around the northeast. The above are PHONE Nets, but CW Nets also exist. Try the NYS Slow Speed Net (my kind of net) on 3.590 at 1830. If you feel "too old" for that, then check into the QCWA (Quarter Century Wireless Association) net on 3.917 at 10:30 on Sunday and have a talk with some other "more experienced" hams. Everyone is welcome. — DE Jack, WB2GHH

### The Pictures are Better on Radio

The sounds of radio are ever present in my memories and the sounds of WQMR (Quality Music Radio) of Silver Springs, Maryland are etched into my memory.

At 1050 on the AM Dial WQMR was a fixture in the Washington, D.C. area and surround and a favorite of my father whenever he was driving. The music could only be described as *beautiful* and great names like Percy Faith modulated the carrier. I remember in particular the tag line "broadcasting from the top of the *World* Building" and the towering skyscraper and transmitting antenna that the strong and easy tones of the announcer conjured in my young mind. But while the listening was sweet, I especially looked forward to Sunday Afternoon when my family would take a long drive through the rolling landscape of Virginia or Maryland while WQMR broadcast an afternoon of music from the New York stage.

It was magic: An announcer in a box at the theater set the scene and described the action on the stage — almost a play-by-play of the theater — cutting to the house audio whenever the orchestra started to play and the cast joined in. *Oklahoma, Paint Your Wagon, 1776* — I remember hearing them all, and more. To this day, I can picture Ben Franklin declaiming on the rising sun carved on the back of John Hancock's chair during one of the climactic moments of *1776*.

Ah, the memories. Am I disappointed now to realize that the stage was just an illusion created by an announcer spinning Cast Recordings in the Control Room and embellishing between songs with his voice and my imagination. And the *World* Building? Well, that was real — all eight stories, plus a penthouse topped by an AM tower (on the top). It was really called the *World Building*. But it was bigger in my mind.

Disappointing? No. It was all real, though it was real only in my mind. And Quality Music Radio may live only in my memory, but it is still real — as real as it once was.

### Volunteers Needed for Endangered Bat Research

ARRL Amateur Radio Direction Finding Coordinator Joe Moell, KOOV, is asking radio amateurs in the Northeast to assist in a wildlife radio-tracking project from mid-April to early May. Forty bats will be trapped, tagged and released. Initial tracking will be by aircraft. When breeding locations are determined, the bats' activity will be monitored from the ground. The tiny transmitters are on six spot frequencies between 150 and 151 MHz.
