A Thread Across the Ocean

In a day when it is taken for granted that news spreads at the speed of light it is startling to remember that things were not always so and that as recent as a hundred and fifty years ago news spread at the pace of sail, steam, and foot. The Western and Eastern Hemispheres were divided by an ocean and news of the old world took weeks to arrive. To give just one example: Andrew Jackson, the Hero of New Orleans, was celebrated for his victory in a battle fought *after* peace was declared simply because it took so long for word of a treaty to arrive in the New World.

Samuel Morse's Electromagnetic Telegraph promised to annihilate distance and to tie cities together with webs of wire and so it did, but the oceans still remained barriers to communication. Many sought to bridge the waters with wire and some successes were realized, but it was until 1866 that the

Atlantic was finally spanned with cable and the

The task was not an easy one. Along the way were setbacks and failures as the technology was stretched to its limits. Several times the entire project was delayed as the promoters re-capitalized the venture and the Civil War brought work to a halt for the duration of hostilities.

Cyrus Field was the man who dared to dream and the motive force behind this enterprise. A Thread Across the Ocean by John Steele Gordon tells the story and tells it very well. In 240 pages (including Notes and Index) we are presented with a careful picture of the people and personalities involved as well as a credible overview of the technology and the problems that had to be surmounted. It is a story of technology stretched to the limit; of invention, advance, and false starts; of men, and money, and enterprise.

It is also the story of perseverance despite failure and failure again.

If you have an interest in technology or in the human forces that drive change, you will find this book rewarding. If you like to study communications technology, you will find much of interest inside. If you like a tale of adventure, you will be amply rewarded.

A Thread Across the Ocean by John Steels Gordon (ISBN 0-06-052446-4) is available in paperback for \$12.95



Knot a Bad Idea

Winter can be hard on Antennas and sometimes the best-rigged Sky-Wire parts and falls. When the temperature has fallen with the Antenna you might not feel like running a new wire and you might not have a pair of Wire Rope Clips to effect a temporary repair.

In such cases a knot called the Carrick Bend

may be just the ticket. It is strong and designed to transfer tension along a straight line. It also happens to be the knot of choice for sailors when making up a towing line at sea or when a Wire Rope parts.

As can be seen from the graphic, the Carrick Bend is similar



telegraph united the Old and New worlds. to a Square Knot.

Begin by cleaning the Antenna Wire as well as possible so that the wires will make good electrical contact. Then form a loop in one wire and weave the other wire in and out of the loop, over and under the wires. When complete and tension is applied to the wires, the knot may upset (appear non-symmetrical), but this is not a problem as the knot will tighten as it upsets and the tension is distributed along a straight line.

If desired, the loose ends of the wire can be bound to the Antenna Wire. A short jumper across the knot may also be added to assure a good electrical path.

As is always the case with knots, a little practice now on a couple of pieces of rope to get familiar with the Carrick Bend will pay dividends on the day that the knot is needed in a hurry.
