Are You Prepared?

As we move into the Winter months and consider some of the extreme weather events of the past few weeks, it's not a bad idea to go over emergency plans and consider whether or not we are ready for a snow emergency. Winter offers special challenges and modifications to our "ordinary" emergency plans and the following notes are based on some winter camping experience.

Perhaps the most important rule of preparedness is to remember that our first responsibility is to ourselves and to our immediate family. We do no good if we go off "to help" without considering our abilities and our needs and without taking care of the people who depend on us. So perhaps it is best to consider first

how to prepare our homes and then to put together a kit to be taken if we have to evacuate or if we need to relocate to assist with communications. We'll assume that you have the usual radio "stuff" in hand and we will concentrate on the special considerations imposed by cold weather.

Water, Warmth, and Food are the first three requirements. We can only live for a few days without water. Without warmth our bodies will shut down, and without food we can't maintain our energy. Whatever supplies we put together, remember that water must be pure. Liquid supplies will also freeze in the cold, so a portable stove to thaw ice or snow and foods can be essential. Make sure that you know how to use the stove, that you have the correct fuel, and that you have a set of pots and pans that are sized for the stove and which have no projecting handles. Remember to keep matches handy in a waterproof container. Old-fashoned "strike anywhere" matches are best and keep in mind that many "waterproof" brands are safety matches that require the special striker on the box for ignition.

Snow and ice should never be ingested in any quantity because your body will expend much energy thawing these materials and bringing them to temperature. You should also consider that only fresh, clean snow is "safe". Suspect ice or snow must be boiled after thawing.

It is helpful to have a stock of prepared foods: Canned soups, meats, pastas and sauce can be prepared without much work. Crackers, hardtack, and "energy bars" will supplement them. Dehydrated foods are another possibility, but remember that they require water for preparation. Don't forget hard candies and chocolate for quick energy, but do notrely on them as a primary source of food. Likewise, very cold foods will demand energy from your body to bring them to temperature in your stomach while very hot foods and drinks can promote sweating and the loss of fluid.

For warmth, layering is best and remember that wooland synthetic fabrics are better than cotton if there is any chance you will get wet. Keep your feet warm and dry with several layers of non-cotton socks. Wool gloves (or mittens) will keep your hands comfortable and will continue to provide insulating value even if wet. A cap (especially a stocking cap) will prevent heat loss from your head and can be worn to bed.

With regard to radio equipment, portable equipment and temporary antennas with cables, connectors, and accessories should be packed in a bag along with tools, a multimeter, and electrical tape.

For power, don't forget appropriate cables and adapters. A cigar-lighter plug with several feet of colorcoded cable terminated in insulated alligator clips can be used to lash up a temporary supply. A supply of batteries is also recommended, but remember that terminal voltage drops with temperature, so you may need to keep you battery pack in a warm pocket. Gelcell power packs are another consideration. Battery power is temporary and you should plan alternate or replacement sources if commercial power fails. If you use a generator, use it outside and do not allow the exhaust to get in your house or to collect in enclosed areas — Carbon monoxide is an odorless and deadly gas! Speaking of generators, the time to test one is before an emergency. Make sure the engine starts, the oil is topped off and of an appropriate viscosity, and make sure that the fuel is treated with stabilizer.

A source of light is essential. For battery power, consider a LED Flashlight. The newer lamps are quite efficient and very bright. Consider too the kind of flashlight: a sturdy plastic case is much better in the cold than a metal case. Take extra batteries and keep a penlight in an inside pocket.

Personal medications and a First Aid Kit should be at hand. Remember, though, that liquids will freeze and plan accordingly. In a pinch, a small cooler with hot or jars of hot water rocks inside can be used to keep things above freezing so long as you renew the heat sources.

If you are forced to evacuate, personal papers, prescriptions, eyeglasses, phone lists, and some ready cash plus credit cards will be needed. Take a book and a deck of cards as well. Morale and comfort are important aspects of survival. Thinking ahead, planning, and maintaining calm and balance are always key to handling emergencies and responding effectively and efficiently to the unexpected.
