4. THE NAQCC ELMER PROJECT - FROM K5DUZ and N3IJR: - (From K3WWP) Karl ran his first slow speed net last Sunday evening amongst QRN and QSB on 80M. He had only one check-in, but at least the net is underway. The next net will be Sunday evening, April 12 at 8:30 PM EDT which is Monday at 0030Z in UTC time on 3.575 MHz +/- QRM.

In conjunction with the net and our Elmer project in general, President Tom WY3H and I discussed the following matter. We felt that since before anyone can be really successful at operating QRP/CW, they must first be proficient at copying and sending CW in actual on-air situations. That may be obvious, but I say it as a prelude to explaining our decision. While all of our sprints, challenges, awards, and other on-air activities will continue to be strictly at QRP power levels, we are going to make one exception to that. We will now allow those club activities that involve learning and improving CW skills to use QRO power levels. That includes our slow speed net run by Karl and any future Elmering activities that exist only to help members learn and improve CW skills. With summer QRN coming and the current poor conditions on the bands from our currently soundly sleeping Sun, copying CW signals at QRP levels is possibly just too difficult for newcomers to the mode. Once they become more proficient at copying CW at QRO levels, then they will be ready to take on the bulk of our club's QRP activities.

We felt we could be unique in our Elmer activities by having them at QRP levels, since we do not want to knowingly do exactly what other clubs may be doing, but after much soul-searching and discussion, we felt this is the only way to help and be fair to our members who are not all that experienced in using CW.

We'd like your comments on this matter, pro or con.

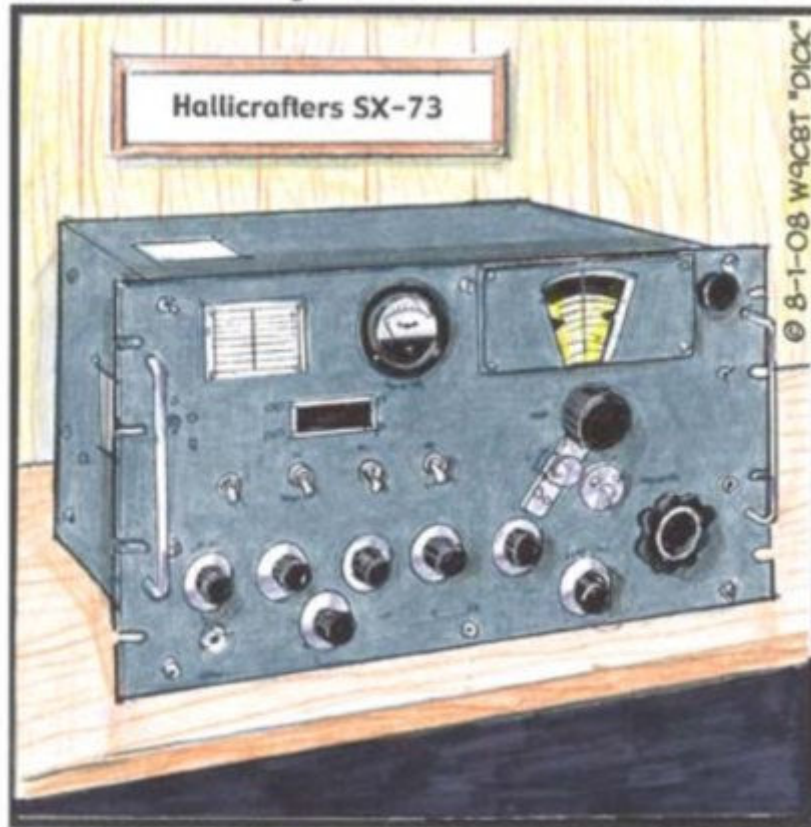

● **From Geoff W1OH #0039** - On April 25, in celebration of International Marconi Day (IMD), the Marconi Cape Cod Radio Club, KM1CC, will operate from the Coast Guard Station, Eastham, MA from 9 AM to 4 PM EDT (1300-2000Z). This is a global event in which ham radio operators from around the world will make contact with KM1CC and other special event stations to honor the birthday of the "Wizard of Wireless," Guglielmo Marconi - April 25, 1874.

More info on IMD is available at <http://www.gb4imd.org.uk/>. CW (and phone) will be used from the main operating positions at the Coast Guard Station. The Coast Guard Station may have Internet access for spotting via <http://www.dxsummit.fi/>

KM1CC CW operating frequencies for IMD, April 25, 2009 UTC:

80M 3.535 40M 7.035 20M 14.035 17M 18.080

In addition, also on Saturday, April 25, a separate QRP portable station will operate from 9 AM EDT until at least 3 PM EDT (1300-2000Z+) from the Marconi Station site. This will be setup and operated by W1OH with help from W1CRK, located at the display shelter on the site overlooking the Atlantic Ocean. Operation will be CW only on approximately 7.045, 10.116, and 14.060, and possibly 3.560 Mhz. The call for the QRP operation at the Marconi Station site will be KM1CC/CC, since the original call of Marconi's station here was CC. Some operation may take place on Friday evening, April 24, using the KM1CC call from the Coast Guard Station in Eastham, and possibly a mobile operation using KM1CC/IMD at the Marconi Station site in Wellfleet. KM1CC/IMD may also operate early Saturday morning near the Marconi Station site. Only operation during April 25 UTC will count for IMD award certificates, but KM1CC QSLs will be available for all contacts.

This should be a fun event, and will include many other operations from old Marconi Station sites. If you look up the IMD website <http://www.gb4imd.org.uk/> website, look for info on the "award stations" to see a list of participating special event stations, including all three calls from Cape Cod. All QSL requests for the Cape Cod operations should go to KM1CC at the QRZ.COM address. KM1CC/CC will be one of the few QRP stations in this event, I suspect. I hope to work you on April 25 from KM1CC/CC.

● **From John K3WWP #0002** - I visited the Marconi site on Cape Cod back in the 1970's on a cold windy day in September with drizzle falling. The weather didn't diminish the awe and reverence I felt to be standing on the spot where CW was used to 'cross the pond' for the first time via the radio waves. Everyone who loves CW as I do should visit this spot if they are in the area.

When I gave Geoff the opportunity to preview the newsletter to check the accuracy of the above item, he read my paragraph above and emailed me back some interesting info about the Marconi site. It saddened me to learn that the fury of the Atlantic Ocean is slowly reclaiming the land upon which the site stood and in the process destroying a very significant part of radio history. Unfortunately there is virtually nothing that can be done to stop the process, even considering the vast sums of money being tossed around by the Federal Government. The Atlantic is just too powerful a force. So if you want to visit this historic site, best do it before too many more years pass.

I know a lot of you have web sites and a link there to my personal ham radio web site, "K3WWP's Ham Radio Activities". My URL was recently changed against my will by my web site host Windstream. The change is a simple one, but must be made or your link will not work. Also if you have my site in your favorites or bookmarks (thanks!), the change must be made. In the majority of cases, just changing the word "alltel" to "windstream" in the URL will do the trick. However if you have a very old link with "www.alltel" (instead of "home.alltel") or "~johnshan" (a tilde ~ in front of johnshan) in it, the main part of the URL
