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1. NOVEMBER SPRINT: Our November sprint is this coming Wednesday evening local time which is Thursday 0130-0330Z time. Please note your local time stays the same, but because of the switch back to Standard time, the UTC/Z time is different. I'm looking forward to processing 100 or more logs for the 8th month in a row. This month we won't have the distraction of a massive PJpedition. Hopefully we won't have the widespread QRN we had last month either. With both those factors, perhaps we'll have a chance at a new record participation (150 logs?) this time around.

Remember we are back to our normal frequencies for the sprints now after the deviation last month due to the PJpedition. We apologize to those who missed out on some QSO's last month because their rigs or license didn't cover the frequencies we had to use.

If you are entering one of our sprints for the first time, we welcome you and hope you will be a regular participant from now on.

Remember this is only a brief overview of the coming sprint. Be sure to read and understand the full general sprint rules and any specific rules for this month's sprint here.



2. OCTOBER CHALLENGE RESULTS: We're delighted to have entrants from Russia and Ukraine for our October (and November also) challenge. In fact not only have they entered, but walked away with our three certificates. Congratulations to RW3AI (941 pts.), RN4HAB (851), and UU7JF (496). They were followed in points order by RV3GM, W2JEK, K3WWP, K1IEE, KQ1P, AF4LB, VE3FUJ, KB1PBA, N8XMS. KE5YUM came up short of the required 50 points for a participation point, but we still thank Terry for submitting a report and are listing him in the results.

The October QSO Points challenge was another popular one compared to our overall records of participation in our challenges over the 6 years we've been doing them. We are still a little disappointed in the overall participation levels though. We know that some members are not into contesting or sprinting which is why we have these month-long challenges. They can be done at one's leisure whenever time permits one to be active on the air. We feel that none of them are too hard for any member to master. Submitting results is as simple as possible. Why not give a challenge a try. We're sure you'll like it and want to do more.

3. GENERAL CLUB NEWS:

With the explosive growth of, and interest in the NAQCC, we are rapidly approaching a problem. Lack of web site space. Our current web site host - Windstream - limits us to 10MB of space. It's becoming an effort to keep our web site size within that limit. We have had to resort to storing our past newsletters in .pdf form on K3WWP's SkyDrive site. That works, but is inconvenient if someone wants to look up a past newsletter. Now even with that measure we are soon going to have to take further steps to stay within limits. Some options include purchasing commercial web site space on Windstream so we can expand and still keep our site at that familiar location. We could also move the site to a free hosting service but that would involve a change of our familiar URL and many free services are only free because they put annoying advertisements on their hosted web sites. Another option would be to keep our present system on Windstream, but have someone with spare server space to give us room to have an archive portion of our site stored in that space. That would allow us to archive past newsletters, challenge and sprint results, and other such material there in .html form. A simple linking method could integrate our Windstream site with the archive site seamlessly. In a related matter, it would be great to have our own domain name such as nagcc.net or nagcc.org, but those domain names are owned by one of our members, and attempts to contact him about releasing them to the club have been unsuccessful.

What are your thoughts on the matter? I know in the past, a couple members have offered to host our site on their servers, but at the time we didn't foresee this problem

arising, and I don't even remember who you were now. If the offer still holds, and you think the dual host method keeping the main site on Windstream with the archive portion on your site would work, let us know.

• We have just finished posting the rules for our 13 2011 challenges except for actual word lists, number of required QSO's, etc. There are a couple changes worth noting. First of all, we are honoring the name 'challenge' more closely. In the past several of our challenges have been more like contests to see who could get the most of this or the fastest that, etc. In other words it was a competition among members rather than a challenge to specifically do this or that. In 2011 we are setting the bar at a certain height and anyone who 'reaches or gets over the bar' receives a certificate, participation point, and web site listing. Anyone who enters the challenge but doesn't make it to or over the bar gets a participation point and web wA6feJ site listing. Let's clarify that analogy with a couple specific challenge examples.

For an alphabet type challenge with say 10 words, everyone who successfully makes the 10 words gets a certificate, participation point, and web site listing. Everyone who makes 1-9 words gets a participation point and web site listing.

For other challenges that involve making QSO's or points, we tell how many QSO's or points you must make to get a certificate. Everyone who makes that many or more would then get the certificate, participation point, and web site listing. Everyone who makes less than the number of QSO's or points gets a participation point and web site listing.

We believe that is more true to the concept of a challenge. You challenge yourself to master the challenge, and it doesn't depend on what anyone else does as in a sprint or contest.

We've thought about this next change for the past couple years and are now putting it into effect. In the past, I (K3WWP) would just get in one contest and easily master the challenge in just a couple hours. Since then, others picked up on that trick also. That runs counter to the concept of a month-long challenge. So beginning in 2011, we are eliminating contest QSO's from most of our challenges. The exception being our annual FD challenge which is an extra June challenge.

We are going to try to find a good balance between setting the bar too high and making it too hard, and setting it too low and making it too easy to master a challenge. That may take some fine tuning as we go along.

Hopefully these changes will serve to increase the amount of CW activity on the bands during non-contest times especially.

Just a quick reminder we're continuing with the hidden call sign idea originally suggested by Bill KB3XS. 4. THE NAQCC ELMER PROJECT:

Elmer's tip: Many QRPers equate QRP with tiny little rigs, and honestly think that's what QRP is. However the definition of QRP says nothing about the size of the rig, but only the output power of the rig. If your rig puts out 5 watts or less of RF power, that's QRP. It can be a rig that fits in your shirt pocket or a 'boat anchor' rig you would need a wheelbarrow to haul it around.

Not much of a tip yet, but here it comes. To be the most successful in making QRP QSO's, the best rig to use is a mainstram rig with a lot of bells and whistles. It is so much easier to operate such a rig with its digital readouts, easy to use RIT, multiple bandwidth filters, memories, easy split frequency operation, and on and on. While some of the tiny dedicated QRP rigs may have some of these features, they are not all that intuitive or easy to use.

I would suggest if you do your QRP operating from home and it is in your budget that you get a good Kenwood, ICOM, Yaesu, Elecraft (to mention a few) rig that can be turned down to 5 watts, and use it for your QRP work. Only use the tiny QRP rigs for those portable operations at the park, out in the woods, on your fishing trip, or anywhere else you can't carry around a big rig and its power supply. You'll find the QSO's will come much easier for you.

Thanks to Stewart KE7LKW for that. We'll have details in the newsletter and in the Elmer section of the web site as they become available. We also had some other folks express interest, but never followed up any further. If that was our fault, please re-contact Tom again requesting a read receipt for your email and making it high priority. Send it only to Tom, no one else.

We have changed our call-up for the net, and our participants, K1IEE in particular, think it's better this way.

The call up is now:

CQ NQN DE N3AQC QNI

NQN being Naqcc Qrs Net and QNI being the formal net QN signal for folks to check in. After that, you send only your call once, and follow the lead of the NCS from there on. He will probably tell you to wait (AS), and call the net again to get more check-ins, then after enough folks check in, each will get a turn to make comments, etc.

From Tom WY3H - Our net frequency is 3575.0 and the net begins at 0130Z (8:30 p.m. EST). The net is quite informal and everyone is invited to check in. If anyone is not familiar with net Q-signals that's OK too (we really don't use them much except for QNI). The NAQCC would also like members to step up to volunteer as Net Control ops. 


5. CW CARTOON OF THE MONTH:
