Empire State Building is a popular antenna spot

When you think of the Empire State Building perhaps you envision King Kong and Faye Wray high atop one of the world's tallest buildings.

As a ham operator, you may say, "Wow! What an antenna site."


Recently, eleven commercial FM radio stations in New York City moved a step closer to sharing the top of the Empire State Building as their antenna site.

Can you imagine the potential RFI problems with eleven stations on one tower site? It is no problem for a company called ERI Installations Incorporated, of Newburgh, Indiana.

ERI designed the combiners, filters and coaxial systems for the station's transmitters. The new system replaces an older system that was installed nearly 30 years ago. Installation is expected to be completed by March 1993.

The older system was used

primarily by several NYC television stations. But the TV stations decided to move. Where else? The World Trade Center. These moves occurred in the mid-80s.

For the past four-and-a-half years ERI's engineers have plotted and experimented with the design for the Empire State Building.

Not only will eleven stations have a prestigious perch for their patterns—but there is space for four more stations in the future.

ERI's Jim Kemman described in layman's terms (Not) how the system works. "We're using a steel tower with a square cross-section that tapers to a point. It's about six feet on the face. The radiating elements fit closely around the face. Screens surround the tower to provide electrical isolation of the case and the elements, and improve the pattern circularity."

If you're planning a trip to the Big Apple in the near future, make sure you visit the Empire State Building and be sure to take your HT. Hi, Hi.

The purpose is to give those who have studied for a new license or an upgrade to get their ticket back before Christmas (maybe, you can't predict what the FCC will do). But it would be a good way to convince Santa to buy you some new gear for a gift. Applicants must bring positive ID, their original license and a copy of the license, pencil with eraser, a pen and calculator if you intend to use one.

Carl, K8OWL, the Klub's Education Committee chairman, has announced the Klub will conduct practice code sessions on the 147.390 repeater on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 8:30 p.m. These are receive sessions only with an opportunity to check yourself for proficiency.

Speeds we now have in mind are 13 wpm, 7.5 wpm and 5 wpm. However, we are open to suggestions.

Those who have the capability to send modulated CW (*CPO or TNC*) could also try their fist at sending, too.

Though the sessions are conducted by the Klub, it is open to all hams who desire to improve their ability with the code. Listen to the '97-


