

Area Hams Make the News

t's one thing to be in the news, but to make the news is another matter. Recently, area amateur radio operators have done both.

The local newspaper carried a story in their pages of Kenny, WA8LLM's, efforts and accomplishments with the Digital Amateur Radio Emergency Network (DAREN) and the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES).

DAREN is a packet-oriented chain of digipeaters and nodes spanning the entire state, top-to-bottom and from edge-to-edge. The system is set up for only NTS-type messages.

Valley Girls Net on 146.970 Thursdays at 9 p.m. There are many other features like mailboxes, bulletin and message boards, etc. There is a statewide DAREN net on Saturdays on 145.670 Mhz (simplex). Also, there is a local DAREN net on '67, while the RACES net is conducted on the 147.255 (plus) machine.

RACES and Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) operators were given some well-deserved print space in the September issue of QST.

The service provided by operators, in this area, during the Blizzard of '93 was grouped with other reports of activity across the country. The ARES and RACES operators joined forces to man the airwaves—and some even braved the ravages of the storm—to make deliveries and assist motorists and other emergency services and organizations.
