News from our friend of WARO Jim Meachen re our Japanese friends

From Amateur Radio Newsline Report 2186 – 20th September 2019

In Japan, a dedicated group of YLs is helping cultivate a new group of operators. For that story we turn to Jim Meachen ZL2BHF.

Members of the Japan Ladies Radio Society believe that meaningful contacts on the air often start with meaningful contacts in person. That's exactly what happened at the Tokyo Ham Fair in late August when newly licensed YLs stopped by the group's booth for guidance on their shack or getting started on the air. The group's DX chair Yukiko Maki 7K4TKB told Newsline that the radio society had introduced a mentoring program for newcomers last year, so they were more than ready to help.

She told Newsline, "The objective is to help them enjoy amateur radio together, because we realize there are many YLs who do not know what to do next after obtaining their operator licenses, and sometimes they hesitate to ask for help in the male-dominated world of amateur radio." There is now a manual for beginners on how to make their first QSO and members follow up with contacts and give signal reports.

Yukiko told Newsline that the mentoring program is called "Wakaba Support," because Wakaba in Japanese means both "young leaf" and "newcomer." With hard work and the support of this new mentoring program, many of these young leaves can soon hope to blossom into active operators.

An interesting read from Marisa Tobella Los Andes

What is a dxpedition?

An expedition or Dxpedition is an operation carried out by an amateur radio operator or a group of them from an "exotic" or "weird" place, radically speaking due to their remoteness, their complicated or restricted access, or simply because they do not exist or are very few resident radio amateurs who practice DX.

But what is the grace of transmitting from these places you would think because we could spend our lives without them and nothing happens.

What happens is that there are programs leading to the obtaining of diplomas such as the IOTA program (Islands on the Air) or the DXCC (Dx Century Club), the first one divides radio amateurs in Chaser or island hunters and in Activators or expeditionaries (who perform the operations) if you wish to pursue and get these Awards (Diplomas) you will love knowing that a group of operators will put on the air a very elusive island that is just the one you need. In order to regulate the IOTA diploma program, a significant number of islands or groups of islands have been identified and numbered under the same name, for example: -

SA 018 Call area CE7 LOS LAGOS REGION SOUTH group (= Acui, Alao, Apiao, Caguache, Cailin, Caucahue, Chaulec, Chaullin, Chauques Isls [namely Anihue, Aulin, Buta Chauques, Cheniao, Mechuque, Tac, Taucolon], Chelin, Chiloe, Coldita, Colocia, Deserters Isls [namely Ahullini, Chuit, Chulin,

Imerquina, Nayahue, Talcan], Dona Sebastiana, Guafo, Guapi Quilan Isls, Guar, Laitec, Lemuy, Liliguapi, Linacre, Linguar, Lin Lin, Lipipe, Llancahue, Llingua, Maillen, Meulin, Pelada, Puluqui, Quehui, Quenac, Quenu, Queullin, Quinchao, Redonda, San Pedro, Tabon, Teuquelin, Tranqui

The DXCC program, which is a registered trademark of the American Radio Relay League, is also a program of permanent diplomas that offers diplomas in different categories according to the number of entities contacted and confirmed, modes and types of operation (mobile and QRP, CW, SSB, Etc.) The DXCC program maintains an official list of entities that may or may not be a country because for geo-graphical or political reasons some places count as a country, the case of Hawaii that despite being United States count as a different entity or the Chilean Antarctic or Easter Island that despite being Chilean territory count as different entities.

To qualify for some of the Awards (Diplomas of the DXCC program you must prove that you have contacted the entities indicated by physical QSL cards to check a Card Checker (radio amateur volunteers who check that everything is in order or electronically through the Logbook of the World (loTW)

How a Dxpedition works:

The group of operators or operator will try to spend as much time as possible on the air and will transmit in all bands and so that their respective licenses, the regulations of the country and the technical aspects allow them. Its objective is to contact as many stations and entities as possible and will be available to all radio amateurs in the world who wish to contact them.

And how do you participate?

Well the main thing is to have patience, to STUDY and LISTEN A LOT before you start talking silly. Inquire on the expedition's website about the bands and modes in which they will be active, and the dates between which the operation will take place. Help yourself with the reports of the Cluster to see if there are stations in your country that are making contacts, study the propagation reports for the date, listen carefully, normally the operators work in SPLIT when they have many stations calling them (they listen on one frequency and they transmit on another) do not do the crazy calling where there is no one to listen to them, have patience wait for your chance as the more powerful stations leave because they already "worked" the Dxpetition, when your possibilities increase. Many times the operators also divide and call with some requirement: for example Stations with Number 2 in the call, or callsigns, ending in M, or only South America stations, etc.

Listen and listen patiently your opportunity will come.

We gave them all the equipment we use in contests. The results exceeded our expectations. Pile-ups almost always occurred on any band where the girls appeared. At the beginning some of them had a bit of a problem, but you could see how they gradually learnt and then managed to cope with confidence. The operation took place every day from about 9 am to 11 pm. And twice an operator stayed overnight. During the whole time support was provided by OK2ZA Rudolf and OK2ZI Karel on the spot, so it was quite a difficult week for us. In addition, OK2ZA has launched www.ol88yl.com for girls where it was possible to monitor activity on bands, online log and apply for a diploma if the conditions were met. According to responses on DX-Clusters and in personal emails, the event was a success. Judging from participants' reactions they enjoyed the event and I will be happy to remember it. The location is in central Czechia, near Brno. This place is far from any residential area, surrounded by a river, a forest and fields. Their antenna set-up looks like as follows: Vertical 160m; Half-square 80m; Mono-band yagis for the higher shortwave bands: 2 elements on 40m and 2 elements on 30m (one antenna); 5 elements on 20m; 6 elements on 15m; 2 x 6 elements on 10m; UB 4 element for 20-6m on WARC bands and on 6m.

TOUR OF VALROMEY

Also known as the Junior Tour de France. It's the biggest Junior Tour on the World Calendar. The 4 Stage event is run over 4 day's with a total of 355k's, with 174 entries.

Overall placing's for the Kiwi Team: 6th, 30th (Ari), 70th, 89th, 91st

This was a great result for the Team, this being the first time competing with some of the top European Junior riders. Average Temp: 35 – 40 degrees, with climbs of up to 2,400m.



The Team then went on to do 4 One day events:

One day event: 72km Road race. Ari won this event.

One day event: 111km Road race. Ari won this event.

One day event: 70km Road Race.

Ari didn't do so well. Ran out of Steam, his get up and go, got up and left.
One of the other boys in the Team did well, winning this event.
One day event: 75km Circuit race. Ari won this event.

Day Four: This was a day of drama. There was a big crash, which Ari managed to avoid. He was leading the Pellaton and got stuck behind the Official vehicle that was following the Breakaway group on a very narrow piece of road and couldn’t get passed to get over to the leading group. He definitely had a Target on his back due to his amazing results on Day Three.

Ari finished 20th and took the “KOM” Jersey.

Ari finished 2nd Overall for the Vuelta Pamplona event and also took out the “King of the Mountain” Category. His results on Day Three saw him interviewed on Spanish TV and at least three articles in the Newspapers.

Ari made it into the Cycling NZ Team to take part in the World Championships 2019 being held in Yorkshire, England, commencing on 21st September – 29th September.

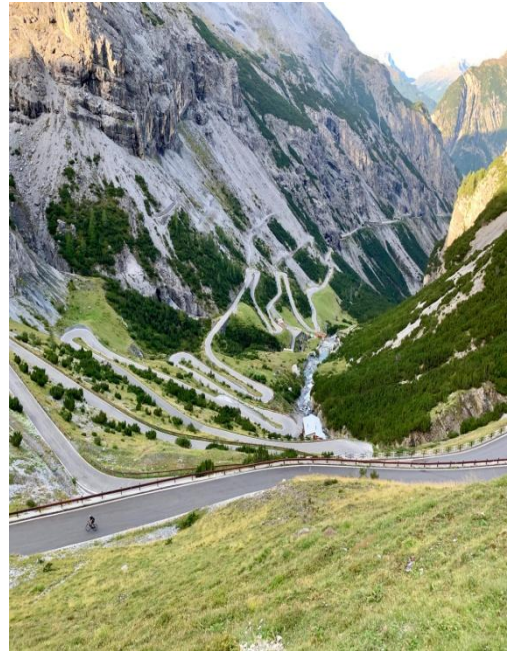
Ari will ride in the U19 Junior Road Race at the World Championships in Harrogate, England.
