AREA HAMS WERE "RADIO ACTIVE" FOR SUMMER SRTs By Mark Abramowicz NT3V

For so many of us, summer is such a busy time with vacations, picnics, gardening, amusement park visits, relaxing with family, and enjoying the longer days and warm weather.

But all the summer activity didn't discourage local VHF "radio activity" by the ham community and participation in the monthly Reading Radio Club-sponsored Simplex Radio Tests conducted in July, August and September.

Three different locations throughout Berks County were identified as worthy candidates for testing 146.550 Megahertz Simplex.

For the Saturday, Sept. 13 SRT, Al Melnyk K3AJM led the team that set up on the back parking lot of Granite Point medical building in Wyomissing overlooking the Route 222 side.

Al was joined by Dave Fix, N3AMY, in handling net-control duties. Fifteen hams checked in but some needed relays to reach the net controls. Al and Dave used a vehicle-mounted mobile antenna for the Granite Point operation figuring the lack of any foliage at the location and the height of the spot would be good for RF signals to reach them.

But Al said he was disappointed with the results from the west and wants to revisit the site at some point in the future.

For the Saturday, Aug. 9 SRT session from the State Hill Boat Ramp overlooking Blue Marsh Lake, there were 20 check-ins. Al Melnyk K3AJM and Dave Fix N3AMY once again shared the net control duties.

Conditions were ideal and the elevation proved to be an effective transmit-receive point thanks to the external antenna positioned at nearly 20 feet above ground The July 18 Simplex Radio Test session was conducted along Skyline Drive from the overlook south of the William Penn Memorial Fire Tower.

The location is prime for covering the county and beyond. Al Melnyk K3AJM and Shawn Malone W3JZ shared the net-control duties and recorded 16 check-ins.

There will be no Simplex Radio Test for October to give local hams a chance to participate in the annual Pennsylvania QSO Party on Oct. 11 and 12.

While most of the activity will be on the HF bands – 40 and 80 meters for in-state contacts– there will be mobile and rover stations passing through Berks County on Saturday and Sunday and could be checking VHF simplex frequencies. So, keep the radio on and monitor for any activity.

The next Simplex Radio Test for Berks County will be conducted on Saturday, Nov. 8, 2025 at 1 p.m. EST local time. (yes, we return to Eastern Standard Time on Sunday, Nov. 2, 2025)

If you haven't checked in lately to the SRT, safety reflex test, mark your calendar and get your radio ready.

Our obligation as hams is to be prepared to assist the community in times of emergency.

The monthly Simplex Radio Test is a way to test our preparedness for simplex operation which would be the mode used in the event one or both of the Reading repeaters were disabled during an emergency.

W3BN Members Launch Club Discord Server

The Reading Radio Club Online Presence Committee is excited to announce the launch of a new Discord server, providing members with a new space to connect, share, and learn outside of our regular meetings and on-air activities. The server currently features several channels designed to cover a wide range of interests: general-chat for casual conversation, bot-commands for interacting with our custom club bot, VE-chat for licensing and exam discussion, swap-meet for trading or selling gear, POTA (Parks on the Air) for portable activations, Meshtastic for our mesh networking enthusiasts, cricket-chat for early risers to greet the morning and chat on the air, and learning-questions for members seeking help or guidance on technical topics.

A key highlight of the server is our custom bot, created by KC3LVS and hosted on a dedicated server. The bot allows members to quickly look up callsigns, check weather, access test prep materials and upcoming VE test sessions, monitor MUF (Maximum Usable Frequency), view solar-terrestrial data, and track APRS information. This makes the server not only a social hub but also a practical tool for operators in the field or at home.

Discord provides members with real-time chat, voice channels for impromptu ragchews, and the ability to share files, images, and links. It's accessible from computers, smartphones, or tablets, making it easy to stay connected wherever you are. Beyond just supporting current members, the server is an excellent way to attract new and younger operators to amateur radio. By offering a modern, familiar platform for discussion and collaboration, it lowers barriers for those new to the hobby and extends the club's presence beyond in-person meetings and on-air activities. It's a place where curiosity, learning, and mentorship can happen naturally, helping to grow the club's membership and foster a vibrant, engaged community.

The new Discord server is designed to strengthen our club community, provide easy access to resources, and support both new and experienced hams in their radio activities. Members are encouraged to join, explore the channels, ask questions, and make the most of the tools and discussions available.

PA QSO PARTY ROLLS OUT NEW INCENTIVES FOR 2025 By Mark Abramowicz NT3V

One of the most popular QSO parties in the nation – the PA QSO Party – is only days away!

The annual event begins on Saturday, Oct. 11, 2025 at noon EDT local time, takes a pause at midnight and resumes on Sunday, Oct. 12, 2025 at 9 a.m. EDT local time and concludes at 6 p.m. Activity is on SSB and CW.

It's called the "Friendly QSO Party" because it welcomes all operators regardless of contest experience to take part and have some fun.

PA (in-state hams) work those set up in the 67 counties that make up Pennsylvania. They also try to make contacts with as many hams as they can in the various ARRL sections, Canada sections, and some DX and islands.

For this year's event, the PA QSO Party organizers have rolled out a series of incentives to up the activity levels on 10 meters, 15 meters and 20 meters. Plaques will be awarded in a variety of entry categories to those PA stations who make the most contacts on 10 meters through 20 meters. At least 100 contacts must be made to qualify.

The idea is to draw more hams from around the country Canada and DX into the fun of the PA QSO party. There are already plaques and awards set aside for out-of-state entries in various categories.

Also this year, the PA QSO Party organizers will be recognizing in-state (PA) stations with special certificates for working 50 sections, and certificate endorsements for making sweeps in the various ARRL, Canada, and DX and Islands sections.

For example to qualify for the Northeast Sweep, you would have to work stations in all sections of the 1, 2, and 3 call districts. There will be recognition for doing the Southwest Sweep, Central Sweep, Western Sweep, DX and Islands Sweep, and Canada Sweep.

Even if you're a bit mic shy and don't feel comfortable finding a frequency to call stations, the second best way to score contacts is to start at the bottom of the band you select – say 40 meters – and work your way up the band contacting the stations already calling on frequency.

There is LOTS of activity on 40 and 80 meters (evening and night) and you'll be surprised to see how many counties you can work.

Switch to 10, 15 and 20 meters to find the various sections to the west and you'll find stations looking for PA stations.

It's easier to keep track of your contacts if you have a computer program to help you log them. I use the N3FJP logging program and like its features for the PA QSO Party.
