## **Survey Seeks Input** on Novice / Tech **Plus HF Spectrum**

The ARRL Novice Spectrum Study Committee is soliciting input from the amateur community on possible ways to optimize use of the present Novice and Technician Plus allocations on 80, 40, 15 and 10 meters. Survey results might form the basis for the ARRL to approach the FCC and request changes in the ways amateurs may operate within HF bands that contain Novice subbands.

The Novice Spectrum Study survey is available to ARRL members on the Web <a href="http://www.arrl.org/members-">http://www.arrl.org/members-</a> only/NoviceSurvey.html>;. Members will be able to complete and submit the survey only once. Nonmembers are invited to e-mail comments suggestions to novicesurvey@arrl.org.

The committee--chaired by International Affairs Vice President Rod Stafford, W6ROD--has been examining the status and usage of the present Novice HF bands with an eye toward determining what changes might be needed now that the FCC no longer issues new Novice licenses. The survey offers members a chance to express opinions and preferences on various options--including leaving things as they are. Respondents are invited to add comments and suggestions before submitting the survey.

Some 40.000 Novice licensees remain in the current FCC database, and that number is dropping by some 6000 licensees each year through attrition and upgrading. - via ARRL Letter Online 6/29/01

# DXCC announces 12 meter DXCC

The ARRL DXCC Desk has announced the addition of the 12-Meter Single Band DXCC. Applications will be accepted starting July 2, 2001. The 12-Meter DXCC certificates will be dated but not numbered. Twelve-meter credits will not count toward the DeSoto Cup competition until October 1, 2001, but they will be included in the DXCC Challenge totals. DXCC records as Adobe PDF files may be ordered via e-mail to dxcc@arrl.org . The 12-meter band was added to the printout on January 1, 2001, and DXCC records ordered since then contain 12-meter credits. # Amateur Morse Testing Changes Effective July 1

New Morse code exam standards go into effect Sunday, July 1, for all Volunteer Examiner Coordinators. The new standards call for Farnsworth character speed in the 13-to-15 WPM range and the end of multiple-choice questions for routine Morse code exams.

The National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators voted last July to set up the revised standards for the administration of Morse code examinations in the US after amateur restructuring established 5 WPM as the sole Amateur Radio Morse code requirement.

ARRL VEC Manager Bart Jahnke, W9JJ, points out the required change to the Farnsworth protocol replaces the 18-WPM character speed ARRL VEC has used since 1989. "Standard 5 WPM messages with 5 WPM characters are available as an accommodation," he said. "Standard (non-Farnsworth) speed messages are available upon special request from the ARRL VEC for ARRL VE teams." In addition, the Morse exam audio frequency range should be between 700 and 1000 Hz for routine exams.

Consistent with the revised standards, Jahnke said, ARRL VEC has set 15-WPM characters as its Farnsworth setting and 750 Hz as its audio-frequency standard.

Code practice transmissions from Maxim Memorial Station W1AW will reflect the new Farnsworth standard. W1AW Station Manager Joe Carcia, NJ1Q, says transmissions using the new protocol will begin Monday, July 2. "Any of our code transmissions at speeds below 18 WPM will drop from 18 WPM to 15 WPM character speed," he said. "We will maintain the standard method at speeds above 18 WPM-20 WPM at 20, 25 WPM at 25, etc."

wlaw/morse.html> also will be changed to mirror the WlAW transmission protocol. ARRL's Your Introduction to Morse Code cassette tapes and audio CDs also have adopted the new standards.

The new Morse examination standards also affect test administration. After July 1, Morse examinees will have to supply fill-in-the-blank answers for the 10-question Element 1 quiz. Multiple-choice type examinations no longer will be acceptable. Under the new testing regime, Morse code examinees must either correctly answer seven of the ten fill-in-the-blank questions or correctly copy 25 consecutive characters. - via ARRL Letter Online 6/22/01

The reception will be very informal, drop in any time for as long as you like. Soft drinks, coffee, and snacks will be available throughout the afternoon.



Radio Amateurs of Canada now offers a Certificate of Proficiency in Morse Code, for speeds of 12, 15, 20, 25, 30, 35, and 40 WPM. A certificate, also available in the French language, will be issued for each qualification. The \$5



charge covers printing, handling and postage. Industry Canada RIC-1 standards will be used. Accredited Examiners also may certify candidates who produce

The following are directions to the D Wing Recreation Room at Cypress Glen where the National Weather Spotters Training is to be held. Do not enter into Cypress Glen at the entrance we normally enter for BARC meetings (the main entrance). Go past that entrance and down the building a ways until you see a different and smaller circular drive. This entrance is the apartment wing entrance or the D wing entrance. Enter here and proceed to elevator straight ahead and on the left. Take elevator to first floor and exit. Keep veering right into the hallway. The recreation room is at the end of the hallway on the left.
