FCC Seeks Comments on Proposed Changes to Amateur Licensing Rules, Emission Types



Earlier this month, the FCC released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) -- WT Docket No. 12-283 -- proposing to amend the Part 97 rules governing the Amateur Radio Service. On October 24, a summary of the NPRM was published in the Federal Register and the FCC is seeking comments on it. http://transition.fcc.gov/Daily Releases/ Daily_Business/2012/db1002/FCC-12-121A1.pdf>

Specifically, the Commission is proposing to modify the Amateur Radio Service rules to grant examination credit for

expired and beyond-the-grace-period-for-renewal Amateur Radio operator licenses; to shorten the grace period during which an expired amateur license may be renewed; to revise the time a call sign is not available to the vanity call sign system correspondingly, and to reduce the number of volunteer examiners needed to administer an amateur license examination. The NPRM also asks for comment on amending the rules to permit Home 7032 on 1108 Mumford Road in remote test administration, and proposes to amend the Amateur Radio Service rules to allow amateur stations to transmit certain additional emission types.

Comments must be filed on or before December 24, 2012 (60 days after publication in the Federal Register); reply comments must be filed on or before January 22, 2013 (90 days after publication in the Federal Register). Postage Rates to Increase in January



The US Postal Service has announced that as of January 27, 2013, the cost to mail first class letters, postcards and packages within the US will go up. The cost to mail a first class letter will be 46 cents, while the cost to mail a postcard will be 33 cents, an increase of 1 cent for each. This is the third increase for postcard postage in less than two

years; in April 2011, the USPS boosted the postcard stamp price from 28 cents to 29 cents, and from 29 cents to 32 cents in January 2012. The USPS will also introduce a First Class Mail Global Forever Stamp in January. This new stamp will allow customers to mail 1-ounce letters anywhere in the world for one set price of \$1.10. Sable Island DXpedition cut short due to Hurricane Sandy

Brightleaf ARC member, Murray, WA4DAN, and Ron, AA4VK, set their operation from Sable Island from October 22 to October 31. The weather forecast for Monday looked good at that time. The only concern were the beach conditions. Rain was forecast for the day before landing which could have affected the "beach runway".



Travel to Sable Island is always problematic. Often, when conditions in Halifax are good, conditions at Sable Island are not good and visa versa. Also, the "old" Britten-Norman Islander aircraft is not equipped with modern-day instrumentation, which limits the conditions under which it is safe to fly between the mainland of Nova Scotia and Sable Island. They were unsuccessful in two previous attempts to visit Sable Island.

They were set up and having a great time when Bernie, WA4MOK, and Dave, W4YDY, talked to Murray on 15 meters. Both contacted him from home and mobile. The signals were S9 plus on October 26 just before 5 PM but conditions changed a couple of hours later and he disappeared. He was working a lot of European stations.

Ron AA4VK and Murray WA4DAN were forced to leave Sable Island around 1915 Z on Saturday, October 27 due to the dangerous East Coast storm. The effects of the storm were already being felt on the island as the sand landing area was flooding due to the rising tide and large breakers.

The following is from Murray's email. "Naturally we were very disappointed to cut short the DXpedition by four days. We had little choice as we could have been stranded on the island for weeks. Traveling to Sable is always a challenge no matter what time of year it is. We certainly have first-hand knowledge of this! During the 4.5 days of the DXpedition, Ron and Murray logged approximately 13,000 Q's. This DXpedition was highly focused on 10,12 and 15 meters where the most demand existed. Our mono-band yagi's and vertical antennas performed very well in the very strong winds. We had to double stake the guy lines for the antenna masts.

We would like to thank Gerry Forbes, the officer-in-charge on Sable Island, and Maritime Air for safely getting us off the island.





How WITN-TV went on the air in 1955 by W4YDY

This is a true story of some of the trials and tribulations of the 1955 beginning of WITN, Channel 7, Washington, NC. Most of the story is on the WITN history page at http://www.witn.com/station/ misc/27442154.html. The first chapter was in the September 2012 issue. - W4YDY

Every DXer knows the HMS Bounty and Pitcairn Island, VP6: In 1789, the HMS story of Bounty -- a small three-masted sailing vessel sent by Britain's Royal Navy to the Pacific on a supply expedition -- was roiled by tension between its crew and its captain, William Bligh. After landing in Tahiti and taking on a cargo of breadfruit, the Bounty set sail for the West Indies; it never reached that destination. Instead, Master's Mate Fletcher Christian led the men in a mutiny. eventually allowing Bligh and his ter an arduous journey, they reached safety at the Dutch-owned port of Kupang. 

As Hurricane Sandy Wreaks Havoc on East Coast, Hams Heed Call to Help
