American Red Cross Hails "New Partnership" with **ARRL Following Puerto Rico Deployment**

The American Red Cross (ARC) this week thanked ARRL and its "Force of 50" hurricane recovery volunteers who deployed to Puerto Rico earlier this month, and it suggested a new level of partnership now exists between the two organizations. ARC Senior Vice President, **Disaster Cycle Services Harvey** Johnson this week wrote ARRL President Rick Roderick, K5UR, and ARRL CEO Tom Gallagher, NY2RF, to express his organization's gratitude for "all your amazing volunteers for the unwavering commitment demonstrated during the response to this unprecedented disaster in Puerto Rico." Johnson said the team's actions "made a significant difference" in the lives of those affected.

"This mission marked an exciting new path for our two organizations with it being the first time we deployed ARRL volunteers to a Red Cross relief operation," Johnson wrote. "I continue to hear incredible stories about how the ARRL volunteers supported individuals, communities, and partner organizations during their time in Puerto Rico." The ARRL and the American Red Cross have a long-standing memorandum of understanding (MOU) to cooperate in emergencies and disasters.

"It was a complex cooperation in an austere environment, and the mission certainly had its challenges," Johnson continued. "While we have much to learn from this new experience and areas to improve upon, we remain committed to working with you, ARRL, and your cadre of talented volunteers."

Johnson singled out for special praise ARRL Emergency Response Manager Mike Corey, KI1U, "for his leadership in planning and managing the mission."

"Mike was fast acting and thoughtful, constantly working to make the mission effective through transparency and collaboration," Johnson said. "We simply could not have achieved the outcomes without him."

Johnson said the ARC looks forward to working together with ARRL to "serve those impacted by disasters."



The end of Yakkey-Dee-Yak from Dave (or President) columns may be coming to an end before long. My first column was started in 1969 when I was railroaded into being editor of the first Raleigh Amateur Radio Society News.

I was told it would only last a few months to get it started. That lasted for 4 ¹/₂ years. Moved to OKC for a couple of years and railroaded the newsletter duties over to Charlie Swindell, WB-4DCM. He still reminds me of that when I see him occasionally.

The next time I did a column, it was Yakkey-Dee-Yak from the President in the Oklahoma City Collector and Emitter. Past issues are at http://w5nor.org/ ce/. My column can still be seen for the first months of 1977. It was a newsletter that included eight Amateur Radio clubs. Seven were in Oklahoma City. I was President of the Aeronautical Amateur Radio Club, W5PAA, in 1977 until I moved back to North Carolina. The club is located at the FAA Aeronautical Center that includes the FAA Academy.

The Center is located on the West side of Will Rogers International Airport. It was during that time that I received the Second Station call sign, K5NC. The FCC dropped all Second Station calls and mine expired in 1982.

I decided to keep W4YDY instead of K5NC. The '5' made it confusing to many and I think it would to this day. I used it for the first 6 months of 1982 and it just wasn't comfortable.

Yakkey-Dee-Yak was better than No Count! I really blew it when I volunteered to be the editor of Ham Chatter in 1977. So now I have been writing the column plus many other stories for over 20 year for this newsletter. That's a total of over 25 years of columns. I think I have done enough.

I'm still sending the newsletter to the printer, picking them up and carrying copies to Batteries Plus & Bulbs and to Sheppard Library. Also still writing updates to the w4amc.com web site that the club approved for me to start in 1996. Then there still the roster that ended up with me for the exact reason I don't know. Murphy's been hanging around with me to much lately.

Some may have heard that I was having trouble with Embargmail/Centurylinkmail that was flagging my email to those addresses as spam. It cleared up about 5 or 6 weeks later. I complained to then with no luck but they must have had a lot of other complaints 'cause they finally fixed it! I am still sending out notices to the club as requested. Also I have a list of about 50 non-members that are on the notification list for Ham Chatter each month.

I'm not trying to hold on to it so someone needs to get the list from me in case I have computer trouble, etc.

Then my antenna system decided to go South! High SWR on most bands. Seems like the beam is working again but don't have any luck from 160 meters to 40 meters. 30 meters works a little bit at times with strong signals. I think I have some bad connections in my coax runs of about 180 feet. I just hope it's not the ones that's underground. Got to get to work on that. Seems like there's always something else that I had rather do at the times I can work on it.

The new mode, JT8, is the big thing now. Loaded it up at the end of October and seeing a lot of signals on most all bands but haven't figured out the transmission end yet. Got it controlling the -transmitter frequency but can't get the Push-To-Talk to key the transmitter. I have 4 digital programs that key the rig properly with PTT but the JT8 program fails. Also don't know it the audio for transmission is working since I haven't been able to key the transmitter. It may be something with my interface between the radio and computer that I built in 2000 when I got on PSK.

I just need to take some time reading the instructions and watching some videos online. Back to the drawing board!

I recently read an article on the https://www.doomandbloom. net/ website titled "Vehicular Terror: The Easiest Blueprint To Create Mayhem" which talks about vehicular events such as those in London, Niece, Berlin and the recent NYC attack.

Joe Alton, M.D., AKA Dr. Bones, writes articles on survival and preparedness, often citing recent events. Please take some time to visit his website as you make plans to protect yourself and loved ones. As part of his recent article "Dr. Bones" discusses the need to be "situationally aware" at all times, citing parts of an article titled "Just Terror Tactics" published by the English-language ISIS magazine "Rumiyah".

In the article in Rumiyah, tactics are discussed for the best use of vehicles as a weapon. I won't reprint it all here, I would not do the information justice. It needs to be read in full for maximum effect. The part that struck me most was: The writer also suggested attackers weld steel

blades onto the front of an SUV: "They do not need to be extra sharp because with the speed of the truck at the time of impact, even a blunter edge would slice through bone very easily.

You may raise the level of the blades as high as the headlights. That would make the your blades strike targets at the torso level or higher." Here in Eastern North Carolina, and probably most coastal areas, we are used to seeing rod holders and cooler mounts on the front of trucks. Stop for a minute and think about how similar rod holders can appear in a flash to steel blades onto the front of an SUV. If you passed one driving down the highway how long would it take your subconscious to process what it had seen? Would it be in time? Many of us practice situational awareness to some degree.

Join Us For Skywarn Recognition Day 2017

Hal Austin, NC4HA, here. For those who don't know me, I'm the Skywarn/amateur radio focal point here at the National Weather Service Forecast Office in Newport. I would like to extend an official invitation to you and your club to come to our office and participate in Skywarn Recognition Day 2017. This annual event is being held from 7pm Friday December 1, until 7pm Saturday December 2.

We will operate only for the hours of 7am through 7pm on Saturday. This is the best way to concentrate our human resources.

In addition, we will hold a Basic Spotter Class at 10am in our conference room.

All bands and modes of operation are allowed. Our office ham shack, WX4MHX, has three radios, an Icom IC-V8000 on a directional beam pointed at the Columbia NC repeater, a Kenwood TM-733 2m/440 MHz on a vertical, and an Icom IC-706MK II HF rig. You're also welcome to operate in any other way you like. Our conference room has two "portholes" in the wall, so if you'd like to bring your own equipment you can easily run cables outside to a portable antenna. This has been popular and worked well in past events. If your club would like to do this, you're welcome to come the day before to set up and test your equipment if you'd like. It will be completely safe to leave it here, since we're staffed 24/7. You can operate from our parking lot, or if you have a mobile command trailer, you can set up next to the building and run your power cords through the

portholes to electric outlets inside. The sky's the limit!

"Force of 50" Volunteers' Puerto Rico Hurricane Recovery Mission Ends

The 22 "Force of 50" radio amateurs who deployed to Puerto Rico earlier this month as American Red Cross volunteers have ended their mission and will be back on the US mainland by week's end. They had been in Puerto Rico for about 3 weeks.

"The Force of 50 volunteers demonstrated an extraordinary range of skills possessed by this accomplished team," said ARRL CEO Tom Gallagher, NY2RF. "There was no task that they wouldn't tackle. It also demonstrated the generosity of these volunteers, who not only performed their roles as communicators, but also engaged the population with their many acts of personal kindness."

Val Hotzfeld, NV9L, who filed situation reports documenting the team's activities, said the volunteers accomplished everything they went to Puerto Rico to do, "and then some." She said that the Red Cross felt they had exceeded all expectations.

"We opened a lot of peoples' eyes when we started going to the ESF-2 communications task force meetings. They had no idea of our capabilities," Hotzfeld told ARRL. "When they heard what we'd accomplished, we were swarmed; everybody was wanting us."

Hotzfeld said the volunteers' initial mission was to provide a way to gather outbound health and welfare messages and put them into the Red Cross's Safe and Well System using Winlink. However, the mission changed once they were on the ground when they discovered the needs were much greater.

"No one had any communications, so the mission morphed to communications," she said. "But, we did both." She said the Red Cross recognized the value of ensuring communication for hospitals, and other volunteers handled Safe and Well messages.

She said the volunteers possessed a wide range of talents, from medical to mechanical, not just communications. For example, Andy Anderson, KEOAYJ, set up the helicopter landing pad at Guajataca Dam, Hotzfeld said, and provided communications where there was none.

Ten SHARES (Shared Resources) HF Radio Program operators will replace the Amateur Radio volunteers who had worked on behalf of the Red Cross. These SHARES operators are federal employees who happen to be radio amateurs and volunteered for the duty in Puerto Rico. Hotzfeld said they will be stationed in four different zones, with two operators at headquarters in the San Juan Convention Center. "The hospitals did not want us to leave," Hotzfeld said. "They were begging us to stay." She noted, though, that the hospitals also have access to satellite telephones. "I was so proud of our guys," Hotzfeld said in summary. "They were rock stars."
